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*Dresden, June 10.*

**W**E have positive Advices from Prague of the Junction of the Troops under Prince Charles and Prince Lobkowitz, and that they had fallen on an advanced Corps, supposed to be of 5000 Men, which the French had posted at Teyn on the East Side of the Moldaw, with Intention, as is imagined, to have taken Tabor, and drove them from it with great Slaughter; the Duke de Boufflers however escaped by Flight with two Regiments, but some Cannon and all the Baggage is left behind. Marshal Bellisle arrived here the 8th Instant, and returns To-morrow Night or Tuesday Morning at farthest to Bohemia. Marshal Seckendorff arrived here Yesterday, and sets out in a few Days either to Franckfort or Bavaria; and M. Montijo is expected here in a few Days.

*Naples, May 8.* On the 23d past the Marquis de Monestarolo, the King of Sardinia's late Ambassador at this Court, set out from hence to go to Rome, on his Return to Turin. On the 1st Instant the King of Spain's Name-Day was celebrated at Court with great Solemnity, the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and Military Officers, were to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion, and in the Evening there was a triple Discharge of the Cannon of the Fortresses and Gallies. On the 2d, six small Brass Cannon, and 24 Waggon with new Regimentals for the King's Troops, were sent to the Army in the Romagna. Orders have been given to fit out the four Gallies in this Port by the Middle of the present Month of May.

*Rome, May 12.* On the 27th past Cardinal Tencin had an Audience of the Pope, on his Design to set out for France to take Possession of the Archbishoprick of Lyons, and was to have been conducted to Marseilles by two of the Pope's Gallies; but on the 7th he was taken ill, and has been obliged to put off his Departure. On the 28th the Marquis de Monestarolo arrived here from Naples. On the 2d Instant he was by Cardinal Alexander Albani introduced to an Audience of the Pope, and 'tis said he is to be charged with the Embassy from the King of Sardinia at this Court. On the 5th Count Ferretti returned to this City, after having assisted as the Pope's Commissary at the Passage of the Neapolitan and Spanish Troops through the Ecclesi-

astical State. On the 9th M. Saporiti had an Audience of the Pope, in which he presented his Credentials as charged with the Affairs of the Republick of Genoa. On the 12th the Queen of Hungary's Arms were put over the Church del l'Anima, and over the Door of Cardinal de Guidice's Palace.

*Rome, May 16.* The Ministers of the King of Sardinia, after having received a Courier from their Master, acquainted the Pope, that his Majesty had discovered that strict Engagements had been entered into by the Duke of Modena with the Court of Spain, and that his Design was to consign his Troops and Fortresses to the Duke of Montemar, for whose Army he had also laid up great Magazines of Victuals in his Dominions. The said Ministers also assured the Pope, that the King of Sardinia had taken in Time the effectual and necessary Measures to prevent the dangerous Effects of the Designs of the Court of Modena. The Pope, after having held a secret Conference with the Cardinals Valenti, Aldrovandi, and Corradini, ordered fresh Instructions to be dispatch'd to the Cardinals Legates of Bologne and Ferrara, to be upon their Guard, with regard to Fort Urbano, and the Town of Ferrara, to prevent the Spaniards taking Possession of them. The Pope has granted a Brief to the Queen of Hungary, to empower her to raise upon the Clergy of her Dominions in Italy the Tenth of their yearly Revenues.

*Florence, May 22.* On the 6th the Marquis d'Ormea set out from Parma to Rivalta to execute a Commission with the Duke of Modena, on the Part of the King of Sardinia. On the 12th, 13th, and 15th Instant, the Spanish and Neapolitan Troops began to move in full March from Fano, Pesaro, Rimini, Forli, Faenza, &c. with a large Train of Artillery, and on the 16th, 17th and 18th drew to the Seala and Confortino in the Neighbourhood of Bologna, where they made a Halt, and are extended along the River Reno. M. de Montemar lodges at a Country-house of Guaranta Giffieri, as does M. de Castropignano in one of M. Caprara; and the General Officers are distributed in the Convents in the City. The Troops commit considerable Damages in the Country, by consuming the green Corn for want of Forage for their Horses. Count Stortiglione, (a Piemontese) Aid de Camp to M. de Castropignano, was, by Direction from the Court of Naples, order'd into a Confinement, 'tis said, on Suspicion of carrying on a Correspondence prejudicial to the Interest
