Westminster, June 16.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for establishing an Agreement with the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, for advancing the Sum of One Million six hundred thousand Pounds towards the Supply for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and forty two.

An Act for granting to his Majesty the Sum of Eight hundred thousand Pounds, to be raised by Annuities, transferrable at the Bank of England; and for ascertaining the Customs and Duties upon Quicksilver, taken as Prize during the present War; and for the further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act to exclude certain Officers from being Members of the House of Commons.

An Act to indemnify Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices, Employments, and Promotions within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpose.

An Act to empower the Justices of the Peace, of a Liberty or Corporation, to commit Offenders to the House of Correction of the County, Riding, or Division, in which such Liberty or Corporation is situate.

An Act to prevent the Counterfeiting of Gold and Silver Lace; and for settling and adjusting the Proportions of fine Silver and Silk; and for the better making of Gold and Silver Thread.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the seventh Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, for repairing the several Roads leading from the Town of Ledbury, in the County of Hereford, to the several Places therein mentioned; and for making the said Act more effectual.

An Act to explain and amend two Acts of Parliament, one made in the ninth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled, An Act for repairing the Highways from Sheet-bridge, in the Parish of Petersfield, to the Town of Portsmouth, in the County of Southampton; and another Act made in the twelfth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, for en-

larging the Term in and by the said Act granted, and for other Purposes therein mentioned; and for enlarging the Term and Powers by the said last-mentioned Act granted.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for repairing the Roads leading from Cirencester Town's End to St. John's Bridge, in the County of Gloucester.

An Act for continuing the Powers granted by three several Acts of Parliament, one for repairing the Road from Stump Cross to Newmarket Heath, and the Town of Cambridge; another for repairing the Road from Foulmire to Cambridge; and the third for explaining, amending, and rendering more effectual the said two former Acts; and for enlarging the Terms granted by the said two former Acts.

An Act to render more effectual an Act made in the ninth and tenth Years of the Reign of his late Majesty King William the Third, intituled, An Act for erecting Hospitals and Workhouses within the Town of Colchester, in the County of Essex, for the better employing and maintaining the Poor thereof.

An Act for securing to John Byrom, Master of Arts, the sole Right of publishing, for a certain Term of Years, the Art and Method of Short Hand invented by him.

And to Twenty-two Private Bills.

Naples, May 29, N. S. On the 16th Instant Count Stortiglione, Native of Piedmont, Colonel of the King's Army, and Aid de Camp of M. de Castropignano, arrived here from the Army in the Romagna on his Parole, in order to justify himself on the Suspicion laid to his Charge of having a private Intelligence with the Sardinian Ministers, prejudicial to the Interest of Spain. On the 24th their Majesties came to the City from Portici, to assist at the Function of Corpus Christi; after which they return to Portici, where they propose to remain till the Middle of June.

Rome, June 2. Cardinal Borghese, 'tis said, is to perform the Function of the Embassy Extraordinary of the new Emperor in lieu of Cardinal Tencin, on account of his Journey to France.

Florence, June 10. On the 29th past the Spanish and Neapolitan Troops decamped from the Prati della Sanoggia, and are posted, the Right Wing at Castel Franco, near the River Muzza, and the Left at Piunazzo, where they are fortifying

itying themselves, extending about four Miles to the Confines of St. Cefareo, where M. de Montemar has his Head Quarters. Frequent Skirmishes happen between the Picketts of Michelets and Hussars. A Party of 50 of the latter made an Incurfion under the Walls of Bologna, seized the Baggages of a Spanish and Neapolitan Officer, and made Prisoner the chief Enginier of the Spaniards; in Consequence of which, M. de Montemar, to secure the Road from that City to the Panaro, and the Supply of Forages to his Army, has order'd a Detachment of 500 Dragoons to patrol continually on that Road. They are in great want of Forage, for which the Country is put to great Distress. Several Transports with Wheat, &c. from Sicily and Ancona are lately arrived at the Foci del Po in the Adriatick Sea, for the Use of the Spanish Army. On the 2d Instant a Discovery was made of a Conspiracy of about 150 of the Great Duke's Soldiers in Garrison in these Fortresses, most of them Deserters, who had agreed to desert again in a Body to the Spanish Army. The Ring Leaders have been put to close Confinement. On the 3d a Te Deum was sung at the Church of the Annonziata, at which the Ministers, Nobility, &c. were present; and in the Evening, as well as the following, there was the usual Fire-works, &c. on Occasion of the Delivery of the Queen of Hungary. On the 9th passed through here a Courier from Naples to Spain, by whom we learn, that the Spanish Troops were encamping in the Neighbourhood of Antibes, where Don Phillip likewise remained.

Villa Franca, June 7. Vice Admiral Matthews arrived this Day with the Namur, and two 80 Gun Ships, and two other 80 Gun Ships are hourly expected.

Vienna, June 12.

Relation of the taking of Piseck, June 8, N. S.

The 6th, it being impossible to approach the French Army at Vodnian by reason of their advantageous Situation, and that they retired with great Precipitation in the Night-time towards Piseck, the Queen of Hungary and Bohemia's Army, which for three Days had been without Tents or Baggage, and consequently wanted some Rest, stopp'd the 7th at the Camp of Vodnian, from whence they marched again the 8th, by Break of Day, in the same Order they came thither, viz. 19 Troops of Carabineers and Grenadiers, and 21 Troops of Grenadiers on Foot, formed the Vanguard, and the Remainder of the Army followed in four Columns as far as Kestran, a Village near the River Watawa. Major General Count Nadafti was sent before with 600 Hussars chosen out of several Regiments, and several Officers, and being arrived at Stiechna, they passed the said River, and marched to Piseck, which was but within a small League. The Army arrived late at Stiechna and Kestran, by reason it was a long March, and filled with Defiles. General Nadafti having in his March kept on the Hills, saw all the Enemy's Army on the Road to Prague, which marched between Three and Four towards Czischova; whereupon General Nadafti ordered a Body of Hussars to follow them, which fell upon their Rear Guard, annoyed them very

much, and took Abundance of Baggage. General Nadafti being informed that the Enemy had left a Garrison of 500 Men in Piseck, he immediately ordered the Place to be invested on this Side the Watawa, and summoned it by a Trumpet, who having reported that the Garrison refused to surrender to Hussars, the General made them alight, and posted them in Shallops that were without the Town, from whence they obliged the Enemy to quit the Stone Bridge. In the mean while Field Marshal Baronay, Major-General Tripps, and Prince Esterhazi, arrived with the Remainder of the Hussars and the Waradins, Part of which they sent in Pursuit of the Enemy's Army, which they followed as far as Czischova. On the other Hand, the Croates posted themselves so advantageously, that they immediately made themselves Masters of a fortified Gate, and obliged the Enemy to retire intirely into the Town. The Hussars of the Body under the Command of Nadafti having got on Horseback upon the Bridge, entered the Town Sword in Hand, whilst the Croats did the same on the other Side, and all the Garrison, consisting of 500 Men, including one Lieutenant-Colonel and 40 Commission'd Officers, were made Prisoners of War. The Hussars and Croats were so furious, that their General Officers with Difficulty hindered them from massacring them all. They also got a vast Booty, as well from the Spoils of those Officers, as of the Baggage which the Enemy's Army had left behind. We have not lost one single Man in all this Action. The Body of Hussars of Baronay continually pursued the Enemy's Army, and took almost all their Baggage Waggons; so that their Army is now without any Equipage. What occasioned the precipitate Retreat of the Enemy from Piseck, seems, among other Things, to have been, General Tripps's having been already sent before on the 7th to Vodnian, with 400 Hussars and 300 Croats, with Orders to post himself on the Hills of Zelebow, and to make as great Fires as he could, and the Enemy having had Occasion to send a Trumpet to our Army, Baronay was ordered to escort that Trumpet with his whole Body, which made the Enemy believe it was the Vanguard, and that our Army followed; so that being frightened by the Fire they had seen, they thought our whole Army followed them, whereas it was only the Body under the Command of Nadafti. All the Generals, Officers, Hussars and Croats, have greatly distinguished themselves by their Courage and good Conduct during the March. Our Army was hardly arrived at the Camp at Kestran, but we were informed there were still some French at Steckna, whereupon some Companies of Grenadiers were sent thither, to whom 70 French immediately surrendered themselves Prisoners. This Morning our Army marched from Kestran, and arrived in the Evening at the Camp before Piseck. We have already given Passports to 50 Deserters, and they come in every Moment. A Patrol that was sent after the Enemy just now reports, that they pursued them three German Miles; that they drew up in Order of Battle at Midnight, but that an Hour after they went off in such Confusion and Precipitation, that it was not possible to follow them any longer. We

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were only told that they made their Flight directly to Prague; and we are since also informed, that the Enemy's Infantry is intirely dispersed on the Road, and a Detachment has been sent to carry off as many as can be met with. The Prisoners we have made hitherto from Piseck, amount to above 1500 Men.

Copenhagen, June 19. Yesterday a Fleet of Dutch Merchant-men, near an hundred Sail, passed by this Place for the Baltick, under the Convoy of three or four Men of War. This Morning the Guards and Grenadiers arrived from Holstein, and the rest of the Troops belonging to this Garrison are expected here Tomorrow.

Dresden, June 20. We have nothing from Bohemia, but that the Austrians draw nearer Prague, and have taken all the Posts and Magazines behind them, and that the French may want Provisions in the Town, so perhaps will capitulate sooner than they would be otherwise obliged to do, for they are very advantageously posted, and, it is said, they have just received some of the Recruits they expected; but their Number is but inconsiderable, when compared with that of their Enemy.

Ghent, June 12, O. S. Yesterday being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Accession to the Throne, all the British Troops put on their new Cloathing, and in the Afternoon were drawn out upon the Ramparts. By a particular Order from Count Harrach the Cannon in the Town and Castle began to fire at Seven in the Evening, and fired three Rounds of Forty-one each, which was answered by three running Fires from the British Troops. At Night the Governor and the Officers of Distinction were entertained at Supper by Major General Howard, and great Joy was expressed every where.

Dublin, June 11.

This Day being the Anniversary of his Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, the Great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out on Oxmantown Green. At Noon their Excellencies the Lords Justices met at the Castle, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
