Moscow, August 26.

E have Advice that Vice-Admiral Bredal, with a Squadron of Seven large Ships of War and Nine Frigats, coming from Archangel and Kola, has palled the Sound; and it is probable that by this Time he has joined the other Russian Squadron in the Baltick.

From the General Quarters in Bavaria near Ober Altach, Sept. 12.

Lieutenant Colonel Trenck, having got Poffession of Vichtach, was detached by Felt Marshal Khevenhuller to go to Cham, and endeavour to make himself Master of it, as being one of the best Towns in Bavaria. The aforefaid Gentleman having marched immediately, went thither to fummon the Commandant of the Place Colonel Count Kunigl, who was there with a Battalion of Bavarians, and gave, him to understand, That being comprehended in the Capitulation of Lintz, he ought to quite the Town and gravinto the open Country of the Town, and go into the open Country of the Palatinate, conformably to the faid Capitulation; which he refusing, Count Khevenhuller wrote him a Letter; after which, he demanded fome Time to reflect upon it, which Baron Thenck granted him. In the mean time two Men of Baron Trenck's Detachment having advanced too near the Town, they fired at them, and wounded one dangerously, having shot him through the Body: The Benegers having committed this first Hossility, Baron Trenck demanded Satisfaction for it. To which Colonel Kunigl having answered, That it had been done without his Knowledge, and con-trary to his Orders. Trenck inhited upon a cathegorical Antwer, whether he would exact custe the Place or not: Which the other has wing refuted. Trenck made force Motions as if he intended to go away; which occasioned great Joy in the Town, and immediately Mu-lick was heard from all their Towers. In the

mean while Lieutenant Colonel Trenck went to another Side of the Town, and fell into the Suburbs, where indeed they fired briskly on him, but without discouraging him. Whilst he was employed in setting Fire to the Suburbs, and that they were firing at him from all Sides of the Town, one of those Houses catched Fire; which Lieutenant Colonel Trenck perceiving, he gave Orders to fire against this House, as well with Muskets as small Field Pieces, in order to drive away those who were endeavouring to put it out. The Wind; in a short Time, increased the Flames to so great a Degree, that the whole Town was quickly reduced to Ashes, little more than one Church being left The Commandant not being able to walk, having the Gout, remained in the Town with his Grenadiers, but the rest of the Garrison were gone out on the opposite Side. But as foon as Lieutenant Colonel Trenck was informed of it, he purfued them, and made them an Offer of Pardon; which they accepted of with Joy, having directly laid down their Arms; and entreated, as a Favour, to be received into the Queen of Hungary's Service, having excused themselves for their Ignorance about the Capital Capita tulation of Lintz, some of their Officers having told them, that it was no longer in Forcer With this Battalion they took five Pair of Colours, and found in the Town Eleven Pieces of Cannon. The Pandours got an immense Booty by the taking of this Place, the Inhabitants of all the adjacent Country having lodged their Effects in its Consecutive. feets in it for Security,

Naples, Septemper 4. N.S. This Court, in Confequence of the late Suspicion of an Insurrection in this City, in order to please the lower sort of People, has caused a Reduction on the Price of Flower, and the Supprelling of the Duties on several Sorts of Entables: They are however carrying on Processes against many suspected People, and are repairing and putting in Order the Fortifications of the Castles for all Events.

Leghorn.

Leghorn, September 7. On the 4th failed from this Port for Villa Franca, Commodore Martin, with the Squadron under his Command, to join Admiral Matthews, having left in this Port Captain Osborne, with three of His Britannick Majesty's Ships, for the Assistance of the British Factory established at this Place.

Rome, September 8. On the 3d the Governor of Orbitello arrived here privately; and after a long Conference with Cardinal Aquaviva, returned immediately to that Place. On the 4th Count Mahoni, General of Horse in the Service of the King of Naples, who arrived here lately from the Army in the Romagna, fet out from hence for Naples. In the last Week two Battalions of the King of Naples's Troops passed by Viterbo, on their March to reinforce the Garrison of the Presidii. The Chevaliers Cantagalli and Roncalli had an Audience of the Pope, as Deputies of the City of Foligno, to represent the Hardship to which that Publick was exposed, by the Supply of Forrages to the Spanish Army; requiring, at the same Time, Relief to support so burthensome an Expence. On the 3d a Congregation of Eight Cardinals was thereupon fummened before the Pope to consult on this Head, as well as concerning the Supply of 2000 Rubbi of Corn required by the Spaniards, which was absolutely resused on Account of the Scarcity in the Country; and on the 4th a Courier was dispatched by the Secretary of State to the Court of Spain, with the Pope's ferious Representations, for obtaining a speedy Removal of the Spanish Troops from the Ecclesiastical State.

Genoa, September 12. N. S. This Morning arrived the usual French Courier from Paris, who brings Advice, that Don Phillip, with Part of his Army, were at Chambery, where they detained him one Day, and examined all his Letters for the Court of Turin.

Turin, September 16. N.S. This Court has received Advice from Bologna, as well as from Rome, that the Spanish Army was preparing to return into the Romagna, and drawing nearer the Panaro, in order to which Commissaries had been already sent to several Parts, for providing Subfistance for them. Proper Orders have been fent by this Court to Count d'Apremont, to attend Marshal Traun at Buonporto near Modena, and to concert with him what may be necessary for opposing any Attempt the Spaniards might make for passing the Panaro, for which the 14 Battalions and the four Regiments of Horse and Dragoons, which the King of Sardinia has left in Lombardy, join'd to the Troops of the Queen of Hungary, that amount to at least 12000 Men, including the Croatians, are thought to be fully sufficient, especially in this Season of the Year. The Infant Don Phillip was expected the 11th at Chambery with his

whole Retinue. The Spanish Troops are in the Valleys of Savoy and Tarentaise, where they commit very great Disorders.

Florence, September 16. On the 7th M. del Borgo, Knight of the Order of St. Stephen, was, by Order of the Regency, arrefted at Piía, and conducted to the Fortreis of Volterra, for talking difrespectfully of this Government. Marthal Traun, with the Austrian Troops, continues in the Modanese, Mirandola, and at Buon Porto. Last Week the Theatre at Siena was by Accident burnt down.

Vienna, September 19. N.S. Count Esterhasi has Orders to repair forthwith from the Army to the Court of Dresden. His Royal Highness the Great Duke was on the 15th Instant at Beraun. It is hoped that the Junction with Count Khevenhuller will be made on the 25th Instant, at or about Furth, between Chamb and Waldmunchen.

Hague, Oct. 2. On the 22d past M. Maillebois is said to have been at Plana, and the Great Duke at Hayd, whilst Khevenhuller lays at Waldmunchen, and Count Saxe was advancing round by Egra to gain the Elbe and Moldau, and to try to throw a large Convoy of Provisions, which have been got together at Prina, into Prague. The young Duke of Deux Ponts, the Duke de Brisac, and M. Beauveau, have found Means to save themselves with Two hundred and fifty Horse, under Favour of a Sally made by 19,000 Men from the Town.

This Morning an Express arrived from Holland, with Advice, that the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret, who embarked on board the Packet Boat at Harwich on Monday last, at Three of the Clock in the Asternoon, landed at Helvoetsluys on Thursday last, and was preparing to proceed for the Hague.
