St. James's, October, 30.

HIS being the Anniverfary of the King's Birth Day, his Majefty re-ceived at Noon the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Perfons of Distinction. On this Occasion the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired, and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

Naples, Oct. 9, N.S. All Sorts of Ammunition and military Stores have been fent from the Arfenal to Caffel St. Elmo. A Battery of Cannon has been added to Caftel Nuovo, which commands the Entry of the Gally Mole; and the Train of Artillery, which was fent from hence to Brindifi for the Use of the Neapolitan and Spanish Armies when in Lombardy, has been diftributed amongst the Fortressien on the Sea Coast, where a proper Diffribution of Troops has alfo been made, in order to the well guarding of the Coafts of this Kingdom. Great Discontents appear amongst the People in this City, both on account of the extraordinary Price of Provisions, and of the burthenfome Impositions laid upon them. The young Princess is booked upon to be in a fair Way of Recovery. *Rome, Oct.* 13. In the last Week all the Servants of Cardinal Tencin were difmissed, and

one of his Gentlemen went about to the College of Cardinals with Excufes for not having taken Leave on his Departure from this City. There are many People employed in this State to inlift Soldiers to compleat both the Spanish and Neapolitan Troops, which they execute with Success. A Report is fpread about, that Orders have been directed from the Spanish Court to that of Naples, to reftore the five Regiments, whereof two are of Horfe and three of Foot, which the King of Spain lent to Don Carlos when established in the two Sicilies, and it was talked that Part of thefe Troops were actually in March to join M. de Gages, of which however there is yet no Certainty. A Troop of an hundred Horfe, from Orbitello, pafied by this City on their March to M. de Gages's Ar-my. We hear that the French King has appointed M. St. Abbin, Bishop of Cambray, his Minister at this Court.

Florence, October 20, Since M. de Gages's taking upon him the Command of the Spanish Army, he has raifed an Italian Regiment of Light Horfe, composed of Sniuglers very well acquainted with the By-ways, in order to make head against the Queen's Hussars, and he has appointed one Vimercati, a famous Adventurer and Bankrupt, to command them. He has raifed likewife One thousand Foot, most of them of the Romagna, to make use of against

the Croats and Sclavonians. The Van-guard of the Spanish Army, confishing of 2500 Men, arrived the 12th from Imola to Castel San Pietro, and was followed the 14th by the whole Army. The former advanced that Day to San Lazaro. The 15th the whole Army quartered in the Neighbourhood of the Town of Boulogne, and General Gages lodged in a Palace of the Family of Belloni, without the Gate of Castiglione. The i6th the Spaniards posted 16 Soldiers at each Gate of the Town of Boulogne, upon Pretence of preventing Defertion. Three Companies of Grenadiers of the Spanish and Walloon Guards have taken Possession of the Bridge of Rheno. The Army, confifting of 17000 Men, is canton'd in the Houfes round about Boulogne, from the Roman Road to that of Modena. They feem to be fecure of not being attacked, fince they have canton'd their Forces in fuch a Manner, that it would require a confiderable Time to affemble them. It is faid they dedemand from that City a confiderable Sum of Money to indemnify them for the Officers Baggage, which the Hullars carried off from the Convents where they were deposited when the Duke de Montemar retired towards Riminia Count de Traun has caufed all the Foirage in the Low Country of the Boulognese about the Panaro, which Cardinal Alberoni had gather'd together for the Use of the Spanish Army, to be carried off, and having ordered all the Huffars to return to his Army, he has entered his former Camp at Buenperto, having also taken Possible Camp at Dataperto, naving and taking Possible Po between Ambrogio and Spilemberg, having alfo posted some Men on this Side the River, at a Place named Bazano over-againít Spilemberg, feeming as if he intended to fortily himfelf there. General Braitwitz, who commands the Troops of Tuscany, has garrisoned the Fortress of San Martino, in the Mugello, towards the Boulog-nele, with fome regular Troops and Militia, which will be reinforced with a greater Number ; he has likewife put a more numerous Garrifon into the Fortrefs of Terra del Sole in the Grand Ducal Romagna, and 200 Troopers in the Town of Prato, and he takes all possible Precautions to cover this Country against any Invasion from the Enemy. The Electress Dowager Palatine has been taken ill of a Fever, and St. Anthony's Fire in her left Arm: She had flighted the fame, and went Abroad three Days following, but is now again confined to her Bed.

Whitehall, October 30. On Thursday last about One o'Clock, his Majefty, with his Royal Highness the Duke, and their Royal Highnefles the Princefles Amelia, Caroline and Louifa, came from Kenfington to St. James's, to relide there during the Winter Sealon.

And the fame Day th ir Royal Highneffes the Prince and Princels of Wales came to Carlton Houfe from Cliefden.

London, October 29.

Yesterday Robert Willimott, Esq; Lord Mayor Elect for the Year enfuing, was fworn at Guildhall, when the Chair and other Enfigns of Mayoralty were furrendred to him in the accuftomed Manner.

This Day the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Recorder, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-Side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending; and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the feveral Compunies in their respective Barges, adorned with Streamers and Pendants, to Weftminster; and having walked round the Hall, and folemnly faluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed, and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Fryers, and from thence in Coaches with the ufual Solemnity to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided, at which were prefent the great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of his Majefty's most Honourable Privy Council, the Judges, and other Perfons of Quality and Diffinction.
