

from the Enemy having left Egra, and marching into the Palatinate: If the Enemy does not abandon Egra entirely, there will be a little Corps left thereabouts.

Dresden, Oct. 30. The Intelligences which we have concerning the Situation and Motions of the Army under M. Broglio in and about Prague, are so imperfect and contradictory, that no certain Judgment can be formed upon them. Great Numbers continue to disband from M. Maillebois's Army; and the Town of Leipzig is full of them. We hear that General St. Ignon is at Lobochowitz with four Regiments of the Austrian Troops, M. Festeritz at Beraun with his Corps, and that Prince Lobcowitz was at Mies the 27th, with the Detachment left by the Great Duke under his Command.

Hubertsbourg, Nov. 5. Marshal Broglio arrived here Yesterday about Two in the Afternoon, paid his Court to their Polish Majesties and the Electoral Prince, visited Count Bruhl, and, before Four, continued his Journey to Leipzig; from whence he is to proceed, as we hear, to take the Command of the Army now under Marshal Maillebois. It is mentioned in Letters from Nurembourg, of the 30th past, that the Head of Marshal Maillebois's Army was then arrived at Amberg, and that his Rear has been greatly harrassed in the Retreat by the Light Troops of the Austrians, and that Sickness and Desertion were become pretty general through his whole Corps.

Hague, Nov. 6. By a Letter from an Officer in the Great Duke's Army, dated the 27th past from Weidenhausen, we hear his Royal Highness had enter'd that Morning into the Upper Palatinate, to follow and annoy Marshal Maillebois, having left a strong Detachment of Ten Regiments of Foot and near as many of Horse in Bohemia, under the Command of Prince Lobcowitz, to observe the French still at or about Prague.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
