

*Schinding near Egra, Nov. 3. N. S.* On the 31st inst, 600 French marched from Egra in order to dislodge a small Corps of Hussars posted at Liebenstein, a Village in the Precinct of that Town, but the Hussars made their Escape in Time, and the former got nothing but two Horses by this Expedition. The Great Duke's Army was divided into four Corps; the first, which consists chiefly of Light Horse, was actually in Pursuit of the French in the Upper Palatinate, and Orders were given to some Regiments of Cuirassiers to go on the same Errand. The second Corps was in the Neighbourhood of Plan; the third near Schlackenwerth; and the fourth, on its March towards Prague. The French in Egra, as some Burgesses who have left the Place report, expect to be blockaded. The Saxons continue in their old Posts on the Frontiers, only the Uhlans are marched away; and Bodies of Infantry, of 30 Men each, supply their Place in all the Villages the most exposed. The Communication is again open with Voigtland, but nothing is suffered to be bought up there for the French.

*Hamburg, Nov. 9.* Yesterday, in the Evening, were celebrated the Nuptials of the Princess Anne of Holstein, and his Highness the Prince William of Saxe Gotha; at the Ceremony, there were only present those, who were immediately attached to the Courts; but to-night, the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction who reside here, will be admitted to pay their Compliments, and are to be invited to stay Supper.

*Hague, Nov. 13.* The Elector of Cologne, as Bishop of Munster, has made a fresh Complaint to the States of a pretended Violation of his Territory on the Frontier of Groningue; where some Peasants Houses, claimed both by the Republick and that Prince, as situate within their respective Jurisdiction, have been taken down by Order of the States, to extend and secure the Fortifications of their Fortres of Bourtang. By a Letter from an Officer in the Great Duke's Army, dated the 1st Instant from Retz, there is an Account of his Royal Highness's intending to pass the Regen the next Day, and to incamp at Rotting, in order to march on directly to the Danube; and by others of the 5th Instant from Ratisbon, we hear, that the Austrians did actually reach Rotting the 2d, as was proposed. The same Letters of the 5th from Ratisbon, mention the Avant-guard of Maillebois's Army having arrived at Statamhoff on the 4th, and to have advanced and taken Post at Thunaustauff upon the Danube.

General Post Office, London, July 3, 1742.

Whereas divers Persons, thro' Ignorance or Carelessness, frequently put Letters into the General Post Offices, and the Receiving Houses both in Town and Country, directed on board of Ships, and to Foreign Parts, without paying at the same Time the Postage, as ought to be done; And whereas Letters and Packets are often put into the said Offices with Money and Rings inclosed, and in Fraud of his Majesty's Revenue, divers Persons presume to send Letters with false and counterfeit Franks;

This is to acquaint the Publick, that no Letters under any of the Circumstances aforesaid have any Right by Law to be forwarded.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
