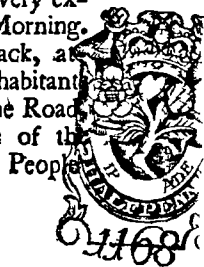
**T**HE Marquis de Botta received Yesterday, by an Estafette, his Letters of Revocation, but does not intend to present them 'till some Days before her Czarish Majesty's Departure from this Place, which is fix'd towards the Middle of next Month, her Majesty proposing to celebrate the Anniversary of her Accession to the Crown, the 25th of November, at Petersburg.

*Florence, Nov. 3, N. S.* General de Gages has acquainted the Pope, that he had received, by a Courier, particular Orders from the King of Spain to evacuate all the Ecclesiastical State, which he would comply with without Delay. This was likewise confirmed by the Courier dispatch'd to the Pope from the Nuncio at Madrid. They are very attentive at Rome to see how that General will go about to execute his Orders. 'Tis certain that there are at Imola, Faenza, and other Towns of the Romagna, Spanish Commissaries, who are making Provisions as if their Army was to return soon into that Province, to take Winter-Quarters there. Letters from Bologna of the 30th of October say, that General Gages having been informed, that a Detachment of the Queen of Hungary's Troops had taken Post at Crepolano, whereof some Parties very much troubled his advanced Guards, sent the Night between the 27th and 28th of October, a Detachment of Foot and Carabiniers to dislodge them, who engaged the Hussars, and killed and took some of them Prisoners; which however did not hinder, at the same Time, another Piquet of Hussars from carrying off a Spanish Lieutenant-Colonel near the Chartreuse of Bologna. The next Day the Austrians received a stronger Reinforcement; and took Post again at Crepolano, and even all the Horse of Count Traun's Army is now on that Side of the Panaro, to be nearer at hand, so as to be able to follow the Spaniards, in Case they should have a Mind to enter Tuscany at Scarica Basino (first Post of the Territory of Bologna, coming from Florence.) A Spanish Courier, charg'd with three Thousand Sequins for the Army, was carried off, and there is no News of him. General Gages, to keep a free Communication between Florence and Bologna, has sent 400 Foot and 30 Horse into the County of Cartiglion de Gatti, where there

is a Road leading from the Graffagnana into the Mountainous Part of the Bolognese. Several Officers of that Detachment are arrived at Verfica, (a Free County of the Empire of the Florentine Family of Bardi, situated in the highest Parts of the Appenine Mountains belonging to Tuscany) to buy Victuals there, and reconnoitre the Roads, through which one may in a few Hours come to Prato; but having been informed, that at a small Distance there were Piquets of Tuscan Militia, and that others were coming to reinforce them, and that Prato and Pittoya were garrison'd, they return'd to Castiglion de Gatti, after having left at Verica 25 Soldiers, and taken Possession of the Defiles, upon Pretence of hindering their Deserters from passing on to that Side, or the Parties of Austrian Miquelets of the Graffagnana from going that Way into the Bolognese. The 25th a Detachment of the said Miquelets and Croats of the Garrison of Montalfonso of Graffagnana, appeared in the Town of Massa Carrara, and carried away all the Horses and Servants, which the Duke de Montemar, in his Way to Genoa, had left there. By meer Chance they mis'd his Silver Plate, which was in the same House. The Spaniards have put small Detachments of their Soldiers into all the Places of the Bolognese, bordering on Tuscany, and they do not seem to fear much the Grand Duke's Militia posted on our Frontiers. The Regency has put a Stop to the Transport of the Artillery which was to be conducted to the Fortrefs of San Martino, to take off all Pretext, which might induce General Gages to send a greater Number of Soldiers to the Frontiers of this State.

*Chambers, Nov. 5.* The Badness of the Weather, and the severe cold Nights we have had of late, have induced the King of Sardinia to cantoon his Troops in the Villages near this Town and Montmeillan, which last continues the main Post and Rendezvous, in case the Spaniards should make the least Motion, or attempt to advance towards Savoy. His Sardinian Majesty would not leave Montmeillan till the whole Army was cantooned, and he had more than once visited all the Posts himself very exactly, after which he arrived here this Morning. His Majesty entred this City on Horseback, attended by a great Number of the Inhabitants who were gone out to meet him on the Road, and in the midst of the Acclamations of the

People, who expressed their Joy upon seeing their Sovereign. Of all the Reinforcement which the Spaniards boasted of, they have as yet received but two Battallions and about 300 Miquelets. The former are such wretched Troops, that a Gentleman of this Place, who met them on the Road between Montpellier and Lyons, says, that the Sight of them was sufficient to shew the Shifts and Misery Spain is reduced to by this War. They affect to spread in their Army that the Court of Madrid intends to send 30 Battallions, of which they own that 16 are to be raised immediately, but pretend the others to be forthcoming, tho' we do not hear by our Letters from Languedoc that any Part of them has yet entered the Kingdom of France. In the mean while their continuing encamped causes a great Sickness amongst them, and has already filled the Hospitals at Grenoble, where it is said, they have actually above 1500 Men laid up.

*Chambery, Nov. 9.* On Wednesday Morning the 7th Instant, about 2 o'Clock, the King of Sardinia received an Estafette from General Schuieberg, who commanded at Montmeillan, with an Account, that he was that Minute informed by the Vaudois, who were posted on the Top of the Mountains, that they observed a general Motion in the Spanish Camp, which was actually breaking up, and that it was observed they had already brought their advanced Posts nearer Savoy, and were in all Appearance preparing to attempt something. This Account was confirmed by another Estafette from the same General at Five in the Morning; upon which the necessary Orders were sent for reinforcing the Posts that were most exposed and threatned, and his Sardinian Majesty's Horse-Guards and the Garrison here were ordered to be in Readiness for marching immediately thither: However this was suspended upon the Informations brought by one of the King of Sardinia's Aid de Camps, that the Spaniards finding their Design was discovered, and the necessary Measures taken on our Part for receiving them, were retired and quiet in their former Camp. To avoid any Surprise, the King of Sardinia, after consulting with his Ministers and such of his Generals as were here, determined to encamp his Troops again, and to move himself towards Montmeillan or St. Jouare, which is within a League of this Place, and accordingly the necessary Orders were immediately sent to all the Troops, and his Majesty set out himself Yesterday Morning for his Camp. It is reported that the Spaniards received another Battalion of the Reinforcement they expected, the Day before Yesterday.

*Vienna, Nov. 10.* The French, under the Command of Marshal Maillebois, were, by our last Accounts, moving upon the Naab towards Ratisbon. The Grand Duke was upon the 4th Instant at Arshau, three Hours to the North of Straubing. Count Seckendorf is still at Althain, and M. Berenclau at Scherding. There have fallen heavy Rains in the Upper Palatinate. Count Harrach died on the 7th at Night.

*Copenhagen, Nov. 20.* Lieutenant General Ravenfeldt is appointed Governor of Rens-

burg, in the room of Lieutenant General Gortorius, who enters into the Service of the Emperor. The former having been ordered to the Fortress of Closterburg, to be at that Post by Lieutenant General M. Rappstorff, whose Regiment of Cuirassiers is to be given to M. Rappstorff, Lieutenant Colonel of the Horse Guards.

*Hlubertsbourg, Nov. 21.* The Marquis de la Chastardie is expected here To-morrow from Dresden.

*Hague, Nov. 27.* We hear from Bavaria, that on the 15th Instant, a Detachment of Austrians made themselves Masters of a Post upon the Isler, called Landau, and took about four Companies of French Grenadiers in it, which M. Balincourt, who was detached to join Count Seckendorf, had sent before him, and thrown into that Place, in order to facilitate his own Passage over that River; but that this Incident had not prevented M. Balincourt from passing the Isler the same Day, a League or two higher up. Some Letters likewise mention, that the main Body of the French Army under the Marshal Broglie, who took the Command thereof the 17th, were passing the Isler the same Day, but this is not much credited.

*Whitehall, 1 November 18.*

This Day was signed here by the Plenipotentiaries appointed by His Majesty, with M. Andrieu Minister and Plenipotentiary from the King of Prussia, a Treaty of Mutual Defence and Guaranty, between the King and his Prussian Majesty.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
