*Vienna, November 14.*

**W**Hile the French were at Kelheim and Thunerdorf only, and Seckendorf still at Bruneau, the Great Duke, after having taken the Castle of Wintzer with 70, and the Town of Declendorf with 350 Prisoners, encamped on the 10th Instant at Nieder Altach with the Right Wing, the Center, and the Corps de Reserve; where having finished the Bridge the same Day, his Royal Highness ordered General Geiseruck with 18 Companies of Grenadier Regiment of Horse, all the Warasdiners, and 20 Companies, to pass the Danube the next morning, which was done without the least opposition, and General Damnitz was ordered to lead the Right Wing of the Postirung, which is to extend to the Confines of the District of Landau, while the Head Quarters is to be at Landshut. Parties are already sent out to interrupt all immediate Communication between Seckendorf and the French, the latter have however sent a Reinforcement to Straubing. Prince Lobcowitz is at Konigsaal, and has by this Time a Bridge over the Muldau. It is assured that the French are all retired into Prague.

*Geneva, Nov. 16, N. S.* This Republick is under great Apprehensions upon Account of the Neighbourhood of the Spanish Army in Dauphiny. One Jacant de Moudon, a Native of Berne, having undertaken to raise a Regiment for the Service of the Duke of Modena, which was intended to pass into that of Spain, the Magistrates of Berne have seized and confiscated his Estate, and have arrested five or six Officers who had engaged with him. He is himself retired into the Country of Gax, and is soliciting to have a Place assigned him in France for assembling his Men.

*Liege, Nov. 19.* About ten Days ago the French began to plant double Ranges of Pallisadoes about the Towns of Givet and Philipville, which Places, as well as Avenues and Recroi, are strongly garrisoned. At Givet they have received 2000 Sheep and 100 Oxen from Auvergne, which are salted and laid up in their Magazines, and 15000 Sheep are arrived from Ger-

many at Philipville, which are to be divided amongst the several Garrisons upon the Frontier.

*Dresden, Nov. 25.* We hear nothing yet of the taking of Leuthmeritz and Teutschchen, which Prince Lobcowitz some Time since had invested, and which he will probably be Master of in a few Days, they being neither of them in a State of Defence, though the only Posts the French have in those Parts out of Prague. It is assured from Bavaria, that after the Taking of Landshut, where the Austrians made 400 Prisoners of War, no Hopes remained of Seckendorf's joining the French, or being succoured by them, and that the Great Duke, at the Head of Part of his Army, was gone to attack him, whilst Khevenhuller, with about 14 Regiments, went to meet Count Saxe, who advanced towards Deckendorf with a Corps of near 10,000 Men, and would be followed, as was given out, if any thing could be done, by Marshal Broglio, with the other 17,000, which are all that the French have remaining, according to the last Letters of Marshal Maillebois, and the Duke d' Harcourt's Armies. The aforesaid Count Saxe has received from the Court of France a most gracious Refusal of the Dismission he had asked on Maillebois's Retreat from Bohemia, and their Disagreement.

*Hague, Nov. 30. N. S.* The Report of M. Maillebois having passed the Iser the 17th, is now confirmed. He has taken Post at Dingelsing, and they write that the French have already demanded three Millions of Rations from the Emperor's Country. Seckendorf had repassed the Inn, but is said to have left Brunau in a Posture of Defence.

*Paris, Nov. 23.* According to our last Letters received from our Army in Bohemia, the several Parties which M. Bellisle had distributed along the Elbe, were returned to Prague, except a Body of 800 Men at Leuthmeritz, whose Retreat had been cut off, as well as their Communication with Prague. M. de Bellisle was at that Time actually in the same Camp which M. Broglio had before the late Siege. We have a very sad Account of the Diminution, Sickness, and Distresses of all Kinds, of our Forces in Bavaria.

*The following Ordonnance has been published here,  
October 30, 1742.*

By the KING.

**HIS** Majesty judging it necessary, in the present Circumstances, to make an Augmentation of 30,000 Men in his Militia, he has caused a State to be drawn up of the Repartition upon the Provinces, which is to be annexed to the present Ordonnance for the Raising of them, first and preferably in the Capital Towns and others which have been hitherto exempted, and proportionably, as they may be wanted, in the other Towns and Parishes of the Open Countries of the Provinces and Generalities of the Kingdom, so as there be not raised, on the Inhabitants of the Country, more than what the Towns shall be absolutely not able to furnish; and consequently he has ordained and does ordain what follows.

Article I. The Intendants of the Provinces and Generalities of the Kingdom, and the Officers whom it may concern, shall proceed forthwith, in all the aforesaid Towns, to take the exact Numbers of all the unmarried Men who are Artificers, or Sons of Artificers, small Tradesmen, and working People, from the Age of 16, and upwards to 40, of the Stature of at least five Foot, and strong enough to bear Arms; whereof there shall be Lists drawn out, containing their Names, Callings, and Descriptions.

II. Upon the Examination of the said Lists, the Intendants are to fix the Number which each Town will be able to furnish, and they shall make a Repartition of them upon each Parish of each Town.

III. If it shall happen, that in any Parish of the Towns there should not be a sufficient Number of unmarried Men to furnish the Number of Militia, set by the Repartition, his Majesty in that Case wills, that the same shall be supplied by married Men of the Age and Quality prescribed, who shall draw Lots jointly with the unmarried Men, without being excused upon any Pretext whatsoever. And in regard to the Parishes of the Country, his Majesty means, that the Dispositions contained in the third Article of each of the Ordonnances of the 12th of November 1733, and 25th of August 1734, be put in Execution according to their Form and Tenour.

IV. The said Intendants, or their Sub-Delegates, shall give Notice, as well to the Syndics and Church-Wardens of the Parishes, as to the Companies of Tradesmen and Artificers, of the Days on which they shall have fixed the Assembling of all the married and unmarried Men, contained in the Lists, in order to the drawing Lots, in Presence of the said Intendants, or their Sub-Delegates, and other Persons by them appointed, and the Chiefs of the Parishes, among the said married and unmarried Men of the Age and Stature above laid down, for furnishing the Number, at which the Parish shall be found to be set in the Repartition, without suffering any Delay; so as on the 1st

of February next, at farthest, those, on whom the Lot shall fall, may be assembled.

V. If at the Time of the said Assemblies for drawing Lots, there should happen any Disputes, they shall be decided, upon the Spot, by the said Intendants, or their Sub-Delegates, or other Officers appointed for that Purpose.

VI. Immediately after drawing Lots, there shall be framed *Verbal Proseses*, containing the Manner in which they shall have proceeded, the Number of married or unmarried Men, that shall have presented themselves at the Assembly, as also their Names, Statures and Callings, and the particular Description of those, on whom the Lot shall have fallen; and the said *Verbal Proseses* shall be sent to the Secretary of State, who has the Department at War.

VII. His Majesty expressly forbids those, on whom the Lot shall fall, to absent themselves, upon any Cause or Pretext whatsoever, without Leave from the Intendant, or his Sub-Delegate, or other Officers appointed for that Purpose, upon Pain of exemplary Punishment.

VIII. His Majesty wills that the married or unmarried Men, who having been named to draw Lots, shall not have presented themselves upon the Notice which shall have been given them, as also the unmarried Men of the Country who shall have retired into the Towns, in order to withdraw themselves from the Militia of their Parish, together with those who are reputed Vagabonds, or People without any Calling or Settlement, shall be declared Militia Men of Right, in discharge of the Parish, of the Town, or the Country where they shall be found, without being allowed to draw Lots jointly with the other unmarried Men.

IX. All the said married or unmarried Men, declared Militia Men by Lot, or for the Reasons abovementioned, shall be obliged to serve six Years, without straying from the Battalions and Companies wherein they shall be incorporated, without a Furloe, upon Pain of being prosecuted and punished as Deserters, according to the Rigour of the Ordonnances: His Majesty moreover willing, that at the Expiration of the said six Years, an absolute Discharge be granted to them.

X. As to the Time of the assembling of this Augmentation of the Militia, as also of their Cloathing, Arming and Equipping, his Majesty reserves, to himself, to explain his Intentions hereafter: Meaning nevertheless that on the Terms of the 12th Article of the Ordonnance of the 12th of November 1733, which his Majesty will have executed according to its Form and Tenour, there shall be furnished by the Parishes, to each Militia Man, the small Utensils and Money expressed in the said Article, which shall be forthwith laid up in Store, and kept ready to be delivered to the Militia Men, at the first Assembly which his Majesty shall be pleased to appoint.

XI. His Majesty does not mean to comprehend in the present Ordonnance, the Sea Towns and Villages that contribute to the Guarding of  
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the Coast, and who have been declared exempt from the Militia, by preceding Ordonnances. His Majesty willing moreover that his Ordonnance of the 25th of February 1726, containing the Establishment of the Militia, and the subsequent ones, from which he does not mean to derogate, except in regard to what shall be therein found contrary to the present Ordonnance, shall be executed according to their Form and Tenour. His Majesty Commands and Orders, the Governors and his Lieutenant Generals in his Provinces, the Intendants of the said Provinces, to be careful each for his own Part, and according to what is prescribed to them, that the present Ordonnance be exactly observed and put in Execution. His Majesty also Orders the Governors of his Towns and Places, all Bailiffs, Stewards, Provosts, Judges, their Lieutenants, and other his Officers whom it may concern, to be assisting in a due Execution hereof.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
