### Vienna, November 14.

Hile the French were at Kelheim and Thunerdorf only, and Seckendorf ftill at Bruneau, the Great Duke, after having taken the Caftle of Wintzer with 70, and the Town of Decl endorf with 350 Prifoners, encamped on the 10th Inftant at Nieder Altach with the Right Wing, the Center, and the Corps de Reterve ; where having finished the Bridge the same Day, his Royal Highness ordered Ge-1 Geiferuck with 18 Companies of Grenan Regiment of Horfe, all the Warafdiners, dĸ I I'rs, to pass the Danube the next nd 20 rni 1g, ich was done without the leaft p i or, and General Damnitz was ordered the Right Wing of the Postirung, which to extend to the Confines of the District of

Landau, while the Head Quarters is to be at Landshut. Parties are already fent out to interrupt all immediate Communication between Seckendorf and the French, the latter have however fent a Reinforcement to Straubing. Prince-Lobcowitz is at Konigfaal, and has by this Time a Bridge over the Muldau. It is affured that the French are all retired into Prague.

Geneva, Nov. 16, N.S. This Republick is under great Apprehenfions upon Account of the Neighbourhood of the Spanish Army in Dauphiny. One Jacant de Moudon, a Native of Berne, having undertaken to raife a Regiment for the Service of the Duke of Modena, which was intended to pais into that of Spain, the Mag strates of Berne have feized and confifcated his Eftate, and have arrefted five or fix Officers who had engaged with him. He is himfelf retired into the Country of Gax, and is folliciting to have a Place affigned him in France for affembling his Men.

Liege, Nov. 19. About ten Days ago the French began to plant double Ranges of Pallifadoes about the Towns of Givet and Philipville, which Places, as well as Avenues and Recroi, are ftrongly garrifoned. At Givet they have re-ceived 2000 Sheep and 100 Oxen from Au-verne, which are falted and laid up in their Ma-and Diffreffes of all Kinds, of our Forces in Bagazines, and 15000 Sheep are arrived from Ger-1

many at Philipville, which are to be divided amongft the feveral Garrifons upon the Frontier.

Dresden, Nov. 25. We hear nothing yet of the taking of Lcuthmeritz and Teutschen, which Prince Lobcowitz fome Time fince had invefted, and which he will probably be Master of in a few Days, they being neither of them in a State of Defence, though the only Posts the French have in those Parts out of Prague. It is affured from Bavaria, that after the Taking of Landshut, where the Austrians made 400 Prisoners of War, no Hopes remained of Seckendorf's joining the French, or being fuccoured by them, and that the Great Duke, at the Head of Part of his Army, was gone to attack him, whilft Khevenhuller, with about 14 Regiments, went to meet Count Saxe, who advanced towards Deckendorf with a Corps of near 10,000 Men, and would be followed, as was given out, if any thing could be done, by Marshal Broglio, with the other 17,000, which are all that the French have remaining, according to the last Letters of Mar-shal Maillebois, and the Duke d' Harcourt's Armies. The aforefaid Count Saxe has received from the Court of France a most gracious Refufal of the Difmiffion he had asked on Maillebois's

Retreat from Bohemia, and their Difagreement. Hague, Nov. 30. N.S. The Report of M. Maillebois having passed the Ifer the 17th, is now confirmed. He has taken Post at Dingelfing, and they write that the French have already demanded three Millions of Rations from the Emperor's Country. Seckendorf had repaffed the Inn, but is faid to have left Brunau in a Pofture of Defence.

Paris, Nov. 23. According to our last Letters received from our Army in Bohemia, the feveral Parties which M. Bellifle had distributed along the Elbe, were returned to Prague, except a Body of 800 Men at Leuthmeritz, whole Retreat had been cut off, as well as their Com-munication with Prague. ### The following Ordonnance has been published here. October 30, 1742.

## By the KING.

HIS Majefty judging it neceflary, in the prefent Circumstances, to make an Augmentation of 30,000 Men in his Militia, he has caufed a State to be drawn up of the Repartition upon the Provinces, which is to be annexed to the prefent Ordonnance for the Raifing of them, first and preferably in the Capital Towns and others which have been hitherto exempted, and proportionably, as they may be wanted, in the other Towns and Parishes of the Open Countries of the Provinces and Generalities of the Kingdom, fo as there be not raifed, on the Inhabitants of the Country, more than what the Towns fhall be abfolutely not able to furnish; and confequently he has ordained and does ordain what follows.

Article I. The Intendants of the Provinces and Generalities of the Kingdom, and the Officers whom it may concern, fhall proceed forth-with, in all the aforefaid Towns, to take the exact Numbers of all the unmarried Men who are Artificers, or Sons of Artificers, Imall Tradefmen, and working People, from the Age of 16, and upwards to 40, of the Stature of at least five Foot, and strong enough to bear Arms; whereof there shall be Lists drawn out, containing their Names, Callings, and Defcriptions.

II. Upon the Examination of the faid Lifts, the Intendants are to fix the Number which each Town will be able to furnish, and they shall make a Repartition of them upon each Parish of each Town.

III. If it shall happen, that in any Parish of the Towns there should not be a sufficient Number of unmarried Men to furnish the Number of Militia, fet by the Repartition, his Majefty in that Cafe wills, that the fame shall be fupplied by married Men of the Age and Qua lity prefcribed, who shall draw Lots jointly with the unmarried Men, without being excufed upon any Pretext what foever. And in regard to the Parishes of the Country, his Majesty means, that the Difpofitions contained in the third Article of each of the Ordonnances of the 12th of November 1733, and 25th of August 1734, be put in Execution according to their Form and Tenour.

IV. The faid Intendants, or their Sub-Delegates, shall give Notice, as well to the Syndics and Church-Wardens of the Parifhes, as to the Companies of Tradefmen and Artificers, of the Days on which they fhall have fixed the Affembling of all the married and un-married Men, contained in the Lifts, in order to the drawing Lots, in Presence of the faid Intendants, or their Sub-Delegates, and other Perfons by them appointed, and the Chiefs of the Parifhes, among the faid married and unmarried Men of the Age and Stature above laid down, for furnishing the Number, at which the Parish shall be found to be fet in the Repartition, without fuffering any Delay; fo as on the 1st of February next, at farthest, those, on whom the Lot shall fall, may be affembled.

V. If at the Time of the faid Affemblies for drawing Lots, there fhould happen any Difputes, they shall be decided, upon the Spot, by the faid Intendants, or their Sub-Delegates, or other Officers appointed for that Purpole.

VI. Immediately after drawing Lots, there fhall be framed Verbal Proceffes, containing the Manner in which they fhall have proceeded, the Number of married or unmarried Men, that shall have prefented themselves at the Affembly, as also their Names, Statures and Callings, and the particular Defcription of thofe, on whom the Lot shall have fallen; and the faid Verbal Process fhall be sent to the Secre-

tary of State, who has the Department at War. VII. His Majefty exprelly forbids thofe, on whom the Lot fhall fall, to abfent themfelves, upon any Caufe or Pretext whatfoever, without Leave from the Intendant, or his Sub-Delegate, or other Officers appointed for that Purpofe, upon Pain of exemplary Punifhment.

VIII. His Majefty wills that the married or unmarried Men, who having been named to draw Lots, fhall not have prefented themfelves upon the Notice which shall have been given them, as also the unmarried Men of the Country who shall have retired into the Towns, in order to withdraw themfelves from the Militia of their Parish, together with those who are reputed Vagabonds, or People without any Calling or Settlement, shall be declared Militia Men of Right, in discharge of the Parish, of the Town, or the Country where they fhall be found, without being allowed to draw Lots jointly with the other unmarried Men.

IX. All the faid married or unmarried Men, declared Militia Men by Lot, or for the Reafons abovementioned, fhall be obliged to ferve fix Years, without ftraying from the Battalions and Companies wherein they fhall be incorporated, without a Furloe, upon Pain of being profecuted and punished as Deferters, according to the Rigour of the Ordonnances: His Majefty moreover willing, that at the Expiration of the faid fix Years, an absolute Discharge be granted to them.

X. As to the Time of the affembling of this Augmentation of the Militia, as also of their Cloathing, Arming and Equipping, his Majefty referves, to himfelf, to explain his Intentions hereafter: Meaning nevertheless that on the Terms of the 12th Article of the Ordonnance of the 12th of November 1733, which his Majefty will have executed according to its Form and Tenour, there shall be furnished by the Parifhes, to each Militia Man, the fmall Utenfils and Money expressed in the faid Article, which fhall be forthwith laid up in Store, and kept ready to be delivered to the Militia Men, at the first Allembly which his Majefty shall be pleafed to appoint.

XI. His Majesty does not mean to comprehend in the prefent Ordonnance, the Sea Towns and Villages that contribute to the Guarding of the

the Coaft, and who have been declared exempt from the Militia, by preceding Ordonnances. His Majefty willing moreover that his Ordonnance of the 25th of February 1726, containing the Establishment of the Militia, and the fubsequent ones, from which he does not mean to derogate, except in Regard to what shall be therein found contrary to the prefent Ordonnance, fhall be executed according to their Form and Tenour. His Majefty Commands and Orders, the Governors and his Lieutenant Generals in his Provinces, the Intendants of the faid Provinces, to be careful each for his own Part, and according to what is prefcribed to them, that the prefent Ordonnance be exactly obferved and put in Execution. His Majefty alfo Orders the Go-vernors of his Towns and Places, all Bailiffs, Stewards, Provofts, Judges, their Lieutenants, and other his Officers whom it may concern, to be affifting in a due Execution hereof.
