The 20th of July, the General arrived at Fort William, and fent his Boats and Rangers as far as the River St. John, who returned the next Day, being the 21st of July, and brought Advice, that the Enemy wes quite gone ; upon which the General gave necellary Orders for the Repairing Fort William, and on the 22d, returned to Frederica. A few Days afterwards the Men of War from Charles Town came off St. Simon's Bar; and Captain Thompfon, with fome Voluntiers from Carolina, our Guard Schooner, and two Gallies, came into St. Simon's Harbour; and Captain Hardy of the R/e Man of War, receiving a Mellage from the General by Lieutenant Maxwell who went on board him, fent for Answer, That he would take a Cruize with the rest of the King's Ships.

But the General apprehending the Spaniards, upon recovering their Fright, might return with more Courage and better Conduct, continued Captain Thomson's Shup in the King's Service, and fent Expresses over Land, to the Northern Provinces on this Occasion.

The 19th of July, the General was on his Majefty's Ship the Bridgewater, commanded by Way to Fort William. Captain Rogers, fell in with a Spanish Privateer at half an Hour paft Nine o'Clock in the Forenoon, which, being to Windward, bore down upon the Bridgewater. Captain Rogers kept close upon a Wind, under double reeft Topsails and Courses. At Eleven o'Clock the Privateer hoifted an English Enfign, and fired a Shot at the Bridgewater ; whereupon Captain Rogers hoifted a Dutch Enugn, haul'd up his Mainiail, and back'd his Maintopfail ; buts finding foon after that the Privateer made Sail from him, he haul'd down the Dutch Enfign, hoifted English Colours, and gave her a Broadfide; upon this the Privateer took down her English Enfign, hoifted Spanish, and made all possible Sail from the Bridgewater, and fired her Stern Chafe Guns Captain Rogers crouded Sail after her, and ply'd her with his Bow Chafe Guils till Three in the Afternoon, Awhen he came np with her, and gave her another Broadfide, which she returned; but Captain Rogers then finding that the thot from him, deferr'd firing any more till he came close up with her. About Nine, being close under her Lee Quarter, he gave her another Broadlidey and Small Arms, upon which the called for Quarter, and Captain Rogers has brought her into Ply-mouth. She is called the Santa la Rita, alias, El Neptuno, carried 140 Men, with 18 Carriage and 8 Swivel Guns, and came out of Bils boa a few Days before the was taken.
