Moscow, November 29.

N Friday last her Czarish Majesty attended at Divine Service in the Cathedral, and afterwards went to her Palace in the Kremelin, where she distributed to 1500 poor People, 1500 Purses, made by herself and her Maids of Honour, each

containing 10 Roubles.

Moscow, Dec. 2. On Tuesday last, being the Feast of St. Andrew, her Czarish Majesty, followed by his Imperial Highness the Great Duke, and sourteen other Knights of St. Andrew, dress'd in the Robes and Collar of the Order, went to the Royal Chapel, and after Divine Service, conferred the Order of St. Andrew upon Czarowitz Brackarr, a Georgian Prince. Her Majesty dined in publick with the Knights of the said Order, and the Evening concluded with a Ball and an Illumination. It is said the Czarina will set out on her Return to Petersburg the 12th or 13th Instant, and that her Majesty intends to celebrate her Name-Day the 18th at Novogrod.

Stockholm, Dec. 7, O. S. On the 1st of this Month the Funeral Obsequies of the late Queen of Sweden were performed here with the greatest Pomp and Magnificence. On the 30th of November the Notification of the Funeral was published to the People with the Sound of Drums and Trumpets, and declared to the four Estates of the Kingdom, then sitting, by two Gentlemen of the King's Bed-Chamber, who thereupon chose Fifty out of the Nobles, and Twenty four from each of the other three Estates, to attend his Majesty in the Procession. The same Evening the Grand Marshal of the King's Houshold, attended with the Senators, repair'd to the Church of Ridder Holm, and took her Majesty's Coffin out of the Royal Vault where it had been deposited ever fince her Majesty's Death, and placed it under a magnificent Mausoleum, erected for that Purpose, the whole Church itself being covered with black Cloth, and adorned with emblematical Figures and Images suitable to the Occasion. Immediately thereupon a Corporal with 24 Drabans, two Gentlemen of the King's Bed-Chamber, and a Captain of the King's Guard,

were appointed to watch over her Majesty's Cossin during the Night. The next Morning, being the Day of the Funeral, all the Regiments in the Town took Possession of the chief Posts there and in the Suburbs, and particularly of the Avenues leading to the Church. In the mean Time the Regalia were carried to the Church by Six of the King's Chamberlains, and deliver'd to the Marshal of the King's Houshold, who laid them upon a Table cover'd with black Velvet at the Right-hand of her Majesty. Immediately the Lieutenant Colonel of the King's Drabans, and the Lieutenant Colonel of the King's Guards, plac'd themselves at the Sides of the Mausoleum. And the Feldt Marshal Hamilton, the Governor of the City, and fix Prefidents, ranged themselves under the Canopy; on the left Side of whom stood the Senator Adlerfeldt, bearing the King's Banner. At Two o'Clock the Bells in all the Churches began Tolling. At Three o'Clock the Procession com-menced in the Manner following: First, the King's Pages, preceded by one of their Gover-nours. Next, the Marshal of the Houshold, with his Staff covered with Crape, having two Heralds before him dreffed in long black Cloaks. Then the Gentlemen of the Court, the chief Officers of the Army and Extra Capita, the Deputies, from Pomerania and Wismar, and his Majesty's Hessian Officers. Next to them, and immediately before the King's Person, the Grand Marshal with his Staff covered. His Majesty next, guarded on each Side by 24 Drabans, and surrounded by the Chief Officers of his Army, the Master of the Horse, and the Keeper of the Game, having his Train supported by three Lords of the Bed Chamber. Immediately after his Majesty came the Senators in long black Cloaks, two and two. After them the Marshal of the Diet holding his Staff of Office covered, preceded by two Heralds, at the Head of the Nobility. Then the Deputies of the other States with their Speakers. During the Procession and while his Majesty was placing himself, the Musick, consisting of a great Number of Instruments and Voices. played. At the ceasing of which the Archbi-shop of Upsal began the Funeral Oration, and her Majesty's Personalia. Which being finished, here
