Moscow, December 20. Her Imperial Majesty has constituted M. Nariskin, her Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Great Britain, one of the Lords of her Bed Chamber, and sent him the Golden Key. By the Ukaufe or Ediēt published here by her Imperial Majesty the Day before her Departure, she prohibits all her Subjects to wear any Gold or Silver Lace, Embroidery, or Brocade, and permits only those of certain Ranks to wear Velvets or rich Silks. This Ukaufe is to take Place the 1st of January next, but her Impe-

rial Majesty is graciously pleased to permit her Subjects to wear out all the prohibited Sorts of Apparel, provided it was made up before the Publication of the said Law, and that it be sent to the proper Offices to be sealed, or stamped, for the Prevention of any Abuse or Evasion. The Frost having been extremely sharp the last Week, we hear that fifteen Persons belonging to the Empress's Retinue were frozen to Death on the Road, and that many more had their Hands, Feet, or other Parts of their Bodies frozen.

Florence, Dec. 18. The Austrian and Sardinian Troops remain in their Posts as mentioned in our last, as do the Spaniards in theirs in the Bolognese; the latter have of late extended their Cavalry to Imbola, Faenza, &c. for the Convenience of Foraging, by the Scarcity of which they suffer extremely, the Hussars having of late seized several Boats laden with Hay, &c. belonging to them. They have of late reinforced their Picquets at the Pianoro, on the Confines of this State with the Bolognese. The State of Bologna has borrowed a second Sum of One hundred thousand Ducats of the Republic of Genoa, to enable them to bear the extraordinary Expences they are put to, on account of the Subsistence which they are obliged to furnish to the Spaniards. In Consequence of the Directions which M. de Braitwitz received last Week from the Great Duke, the Tuscan Troops that were posted at Prato, Pistoia, Poggio a Caiano, &c. are ordered to remove thence to Firenzola, where M. de Braitwitz, with a Body of Troops, proposes to fix his Head Quarters, on which Account, two Battallions of the Lorraine Regiment of Foot Guards are ordered to be ready to march from hence, and the third Battallion, now at Prato, is to proceed to the same Place. Messieurs de Braitwitz and du Chatelet are to follow some few Days after.

Florence, Dec. 25. The freshest Accounts from Lombardy contain nothing material; the Spanish, Austrian, and Sardinian Troops continue in their Winter Quarters; the former have countermanded their Horse from Faenza and Forli back to Immola and Castel St. Pietro, and the latter, by the Posts already occupied, endeavour to deprive the Spaniards of the necessary Forage, of which they are in great Want. Some Days ago a considerable Party of Spaniards (among which were some Recruits) that were left sick at Foligno, joined M. de Gages's Army. Another small Party that is recovered at the Gulph of Spetia, are also to join the said Army. The Preparations for removing the Tuscan Troops from Prato, Pistoia, and Florence, to the Neighbourhood of Firenzola, are for the present suspended.

Vienna, Jan. 14, N. S. From the latest Informations it appears, that no less than 15000 Men marched out of Prague with M. Belleisle, of which 4000 were Horse; 4012 with their Officers have been let out by Capitulation, and only 2133, without their Officers, are kept Prisoners of War.

General Post Office, London, July 3, 1742.

Whereas divers Persons, thro' Ignorance or Carelessness, frequently put Letters into the General Post Offices, and the Receiving Houses both in Town and Country, directed on board of Ships, and to Foreign Parts, without paying at the same Time the Postage, as ought to be done; And whereas Letters and Packets are often put into the said Offices with Money and Rings inclosed, and in Fraud of his Majesty's Revenue, divers Persons presume to send Letters with false and counterfeit Franks.

This is to acquaint the Publick, that no Letters under any of the Circumstances aforesaid have any Right by Law to be forwarded.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
