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Prague, February 26.

Publick Notice has been given here, that the Queen our Sovereign had fixed the 11th Day of May for receiving the Homage of the States of the Kingdom of Bohemia, in this City, and the Day following, being the 12th, for her Majesty's Coronation. Our former Governor, Count Ogilvie, is returned hither from Vienna, and re-established in his Command. The Enemy having diminished their Loss in Bohemia, to the Number of a few hundred Men, we have had a true Specification published here of the Prisoners taken from Marshal Belleisle's Army since the first of November, not reckoning those that were killed either by the Cold, or by our Soldiers in the Pursuit, and the Number of the said Prisoners is, four Colonels, three Lieutenant Colonels, three Serjeant Majors, one Commissary, 65 Captains, 114 Lieutenants, 11 Ensigns and Corporals, and 4858 common Soldiers, in all 5057.

Vienna, March 6, N. S. On Saturday Morning, the 2d Instant, his Excellency Marshal Khevenhuller arrived here from Bavaria, and waited immediately upon her Majesty, of whom he had a long Audience. The Danube being now entirely free from Ice, and the Bridges over it rebuilt, some of the Queen's Harbingers are already set out for Prague to provide Lodgings there, and upon the Road, for the Court. Several other Dispositions are making for that Journey, and many of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction are setting out every Day.

Hambourg, March 12, N. S. The warlike Preparations in Denmark are pursued with great Vigour. Orders are given to erect Magazines of Corn, &c. in several Places of the Danish Holstein, and such Carriages to be held in Readiness as shall be necessary to transport the heavy Artillery.

Hambourg, March 19, N. S. We learn from Dresden, that during the Absence of several of the Austrian and French Generals, who have been called to Vien-

na and Versailles, to assist at the Councils of War, which are to take into Consideration the respective Plans of Operation for the ensuing Campaign, the Armies in Bavaria and in the Upper Palatinate, as well as the Troops which are garrisoned in Egra, and those which form a Kind of Blockade before that Fortrefs, remain in a State of Inaction.

Copenhagen, March 16, N. S. The Fleet is now in good Forwardness, and Orders are actually gone to Norway and the Coasts of Jutland and Holstein to bring hither Five thousand Seamen, who, together with those established here, and others to be had about this Island, are thought sufficient to man the Squadron appointed to be fitted out.

Liege, March 19, N. S. General Pontpietetin is upon his March from Lierre with the 2d Column of his Britannick Majesty's Hanoverian Troops, whereof the Regiment of Soubiron arrived Yesterday at St. Tron upon the Frontier of this Principality, and To-morrow that Regiment will pursue its March in order to pass the Maeze at Roermunde.

Paris, March 20. Two Battallions of the French Guards began their March Yesterday for Metz and Saar Louis, and the rest are to follow by Divisions every third Day.

Hague, March 22, N. S. Baron Mardenfeld set out this Morning for Helvoetsluys, in order to embark To-morrow on board the Packet-boat for London. Sir Everard Fawkenor, who arrived here the Day before Yesterday, is also preparing to do the like on board the Packet-boat next Wednesday. The Deputation of the States of Zeland, consisting of one Member from each of the six Towns, and the Secretary of the Province, having notified their Arrival to the States of Holland, were Yesterday complimented on that Account by a Deputation of this last Province. In the Morning at 11 of the Clock, Count Wassenauer Obdam, President of the Body of the Nobles of Holland, assisted by ten Members of the Towns of that Province, which were preceded by 14 Messengers of
