**O**N the 23d of November last, arrived Capt. Broderick in the Shoreham from Carolina, with seven Transports (having Col. Durour's Detachment of 500 Men on board) together with the Sufannah Ordnance Store-ship, in Convoy, and the Hawke Sloop that came from her Station to strengthen the Convoy in the Room of the Spy. On the 3d Instant, arrived his Majesty's Ship Falmouth, with her Convoy from England, of five V'ctuallers, and a Naval Store-ship.

*Stockholm, March 8, O. S.* It is generally reported that Mess. Rudelius and others, who have been taken up by Order of the Secret Committee, are accused of being the Authors and Distributors of a Libel, in which there are very indecent and injurious Reflections upon the Court of Denmark, and at the same Time recommending the Duke of Deux Ponts as the only proper Candidate whom the Nation could think on for a Successor to the Crown. We hear that General Diederon's Arrest, is on Account of some Transactions in Finland, it appearing, as is said, by the Proceedings of the Court Martial sitting upon the two Generals, that M. Diederon gave his Vote for retiring from Fredericksham. Several other Officers have been taken up for their Misbehaviour during the last Campaign in Finland.

*Berlin, March 23, N. S.* The 21st Instant his Prussian Majesty set out for Breslau, and is expected to return hither on or about the 5th of next Month.

*Liege, March 29.* There are some Advices here, which mention that the French are at Work in widening the

Road, repairing the Bridges, and mending the Causeway, between Givet and Dinant, and that 4000 Cart Loads of Stones have been sent down the Maeze, from Charleville to Givet, for this Service; and it is reported upon the Frontiers, that the French intend to march a Body of Men into the Pais de Liege. It is said that the Town of Sedan, which lies upon the Maeze, above Givet, is so full of Troops, that two French and three Irish Regiments are quartered upon the Burghers, and that fifteen hundred Artillery Horses are ordered from Doway to Sedan.

And it is to be observed, that on Failure of such Payment of the above Rates, no Letters to such Foreign Parts can be forwarded from this Office, and that for all Letters directed to Foreign Countries, by the Way of Holland, France, and Flanders, as above, sent to this Office to be forwarded from any Parts of the Kingdom of Great Britain, distant from London, or from any Parts of Ireland, the usual Inland Postage to London, is also to be paid over and above the Foreign Postage.
