we are told, male farther Propositions to the Mediators, in orden to a Peace, but the Dutch feem to con ting in their former obtinacy, as it they had refolved not to give car to whatever realonable and jult Overtures mould be made to them.

Amiter dam Oct 6. From Hirecht we have advice, t' at the Duke of Luxem! urg had caufea great part of those Forces which ho had brought togetl er, to march towards Jamnel, and fome Letters fieak, as if the Sigur Pu, late Governor of Na.rden, had been condemnau by a Council of War, and Beheaded, but with uncert in y. We conot now doubt, but that we thall ere long fee Spain actually in a Avar with the French; for our Letterstion Flanders tell us, that all things there fem to be prevaring for it.

Hague, OF. 3. The 29 palt to wards evening the Prince of Crange parted hence for Bergen op Zoom, that night he Lodged at Dors, and the next Morning early continue this journey from hence; his Highneis before his departure Commanded Monfieur de Hamen to march with four Regiments of Foot towards Frief-1.nd, to joyn there with the Forces Commanded by Whid c by order of his Highneis, in the mean time, on-tin c here. The first intend his Highneis arived at Wux, near Bergen op Zoom, where he found 17, Reginents of Holfe, and 7 of Foot, in all about 12000 Men; Colonel Dampfield is brought Prifoner hither, and in the mean time his Process is training. The Stares have ordered 5000 Gill ers to be prefented to Lieurenant Admiral de Russer, 4090 to the other respective Lieutenant Admirals, 2000 to each Vice-Admiral, and 1000 to each Rear-Admiral, by way of Grauity for their good Services; (1000 Gilders being as much as 100 pound Steeling ) From Utrecht we hear, that the Sieur Pis, late Governor of Naerden, hath been brought Prifoner thither, being accured of not having done his, Duty in the defence of that place. From Zeyland they write, that they had these 20 Capers ready to put to Sea, and that fome which had been abroad in the late bad weather, were come in extreamly thattered.

Ditto, Off. 6. Yestercaythe Count de Dhona Died here of the Wounds which he received at Maeffricht, during the Siege of that place. The Deputies of the re-fpective Admiralties have of late halfeveral Conferences with the Deputies of the States General, concerning the Maritime affirs. Colonel Bampfield is acquit. ted by the Councel of War. Count Walder is parted hence towards the Leger. Yesterday his Highney's the Prince of Orange was to meet the Count de onterey , Governor of the Spanish Ned herlands, about three Leagues from Antwerp; This occasions a zeneral, if-course, thur the Crown of Spain is about declaring War against the French, and that this Conference is in other to take joynt refolutions for the managing the War. From Swol they write, that the late violent ftorms had raifed the Waters fo high in all those parts, that they had made feveral Breaches in the Dyke, which the Bithop of Munifer Had made near Coverden, to anoy that place, and had done very great milchief, near 600 Boors and Souldiers having been drowned, befides other people; the dammage hath been almost equal to both Parties, and it is faid here, that the Bithop has fuftained as great a lofs by this accident as we. The States are not yet come to any final refolution concerning the Pole Money they are about to raife.

Ditto, Offob. 10. The Prince of Orange having been Ditto, Octob. 10. The Prince of Orange having been at Antwerp to confer with the Count de Montercy, who is at prefent there, returned yesterday again to the Leger at Rosendale; and this day it is faid, the Army will break up from thence, though with great incertainty as to their intended march, fome reporting that they will take their way towards Liege, but others with nore probability fay, they will march for Bra-

bant, jojovn with the Spanish Troops, and fo jayntly to make fome attempt upon the French. The States have ordered that 12 Fiegars onely thall be out this feafon for the winter Guard, to be Commanded by Monficur Van Nels. From Antwerp they write, that the Count de Monterey had fent for the Magilita es of the Town, and ordered them to caule a Bridge of Boats to be made over the Scelde, for the paflage of his Trrops, as there may be occasion, but that they had refused it. fiying, that if fuch a Bridge must be made, ir ought to beat the Kings charge. We hear likewife of another Bridge which is intended to be made over the River at Venio.

Animerp, Of. 5. Yesterday morning his Excellency the Count de Minterey went hense, attended with his Guards to meet the Prince of Orange, about five Lengues frem hence, at a place called Camethout, where they had a Conference all the morning, and having Dined together, the Count de Monterly returned hither towards evening, and the Prince of Oringe to Bergen-op-Zoom, and to morrow it is faid this Highnefs is expected here a In the mean time we talk of nothing clfs but forming an Army to be Commanded by the Prince of Orange. The Prince of Gond tics thill with his Forces about Audraard, having with him in all about 12090 Men. The news we had here fome days fince, of the victory obtained by the Imperialists, proves altogethet falle.

Bruffels, Oft. 10. The fourth inftant was an interview between the vrince of Prange and the Count de Monteray at Camphout, and that evening the Prince returned to Breds, and the Count de Monterey to Aniwerp; The 7 inftant towards evening, this Highnefs arrived at Animorp, his Excellency going our of Town in his Coach. tollowed with feveral inferes to meet him; at his coming into the Town, the Burgers were drawn up in Arms, through a double lane, of which his Highness passed to his Lod ing, wherea Company of Spanish Foot were ordered to keep 2 guard; that evening his Highness was Complimented by the Magiltrates, and the next morning vifited by the Count de Monserey, with whom having had feveral Conferences, his Highnefs parted again about three in the afterngon for Rofenduel. The Count de Monterey; and all others here, gave the Prince the Title of Royal Highnely. The States of Brabaat have conferred to rake the 29 penny of all Rents, Revenues, on perfonal Effates, which hath been paid five times almost within this 12 months, hextreamly are the People here burthened with Taxes
