Mentz, May 4, N. S.

WE hear that the French suffer'd a great deal by Fatigue in their March and Return to and from Egra, and that there is still a Mortality amongst them about Nuremberg. They are in continual Motion towards Spire, tho' there are not as yet above 7 or 8000 of them on the other Side of the Rhine. It was suppos'd that some would arrive at Franckenthal and Oberheim on the 3d, as they have already had Ovens built at those Places; but it is assur'd that there are none towards Creutznach and Bingen, or any marching that Way.

Mentz, May 7, N. S. According to all Accounts from Amberg, the French are moving towards the Danube; those belonging to M. Noailles's Corps have not lately made any considerable Motion, but are endeavouring to buy up what Provisions and Forage they can on both Sides of the Neckar

Copenhagen, May 7 A Placard is published here, dated April 2 1743, which prohibits the Exportation of all Sorts of Horses from the Kingdom of Denmark the Dutchy of Sleswick, and the several Parts of Holstein, as also from the Lordship of Pinneberg and the County of Rantzau, till the 31st of July next; yet they who desire to export Horses bred in their own Studs, may still do it by virtue of a special Pass from the Chamber of Finances. The Court is at present wholly taken up with the Reviews, which begin To-day. Three Dutch Men of War are arriv'd in the Sound, being a Part of those appointed to protect the Trade.

Hague, May 14, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arriv'd here this Morning, and intends to stay here a Day or two. Lord Carteret is expected To-morrow. The Province of Zealand sent in her Content Yesterday to the Propositiion of Holland, for the March of 20,000. Men to the Assistance of the Queen of Hungary; so that there are now four Provinces for that Measure, and but one, viz. Utrecht, that has declared itself against it; and it is not doubted, but this Affair will be finally concluded in a few Days at the Assembly of the States General. There are Letters in Town which mention Prince Charles's having pass'd the Inn, and oblig'd the Bavarian Troops to abandon their Posts in the Bishoprick of Saltzbourg.

Whitehall, May 7.

On Wednesday Morning a Messenger, dispatched by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret, principal Secretary of State attending the King, arriv'd here with an Account, that his

Majesty landed at Helvoetsluy, in perfect Health, on Monday Evening about Six of the Clock. And Advice is since come, that the next Morning about Eight his Majesty proceeded on his Journey to Hanover.

On Thursday their Excellencies the Lords Justices met at the Cockpit, and open'd their Commission, when they were pleas'd to appoint Andrew Stone and Edward Weston, Esqrs. to be their Secretaries.

His Majesty having been graciously pleas'd, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrent Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Chreque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; and that all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be inform'd of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above mention'd, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governours of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them, on the 31st Day of May next: This is to give Notice thereof, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allow'd, may send or bring to this Office, by the 31st of next Month, the Affidavit required by the Rules, in order to their being continu'd upon the Pension or Bounty.

Stamp-Office, April 21, 1743

Whereas by an Act of Parliament of the sixth Year of his late Majesty's Reign, it is (among other Things) enacted, That if any Person should, after the 1st Day of August 1720, sell, or expose to sale, any playing Cards, the same not being at the Time of such selling, or exposing to sale, actually stamp'd on the spotted or painted Side, and also inclos'd in Paper and Thread seal'd and stamp'd as by an Act of the tenth Year of her late Majesty Queen Ann (which charges the Duties on Cards)
