At the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lord George the Second, of Great Britain, &c. King, holden in and for the said City and County, in the Guildhall of the said City, (by Adjournment) on Wednesday the 24th Day of May 1743, before Sir Abraham Elton, Bart. Mayor of the said City, John Rich, Esq; Jacob Elton, Esq; and William Jefferis, Esq; Aldermen, and others their Associates Aldermen of the same City, Justices assigned, &c.

WHEREAS this City, and County of the same City, have sustained great and unreasonable Expences, by means of Vagrants (in their Passage from adjacent and other Counties and Places, to the Places to which they are to be passed) being illegally brought to Houses of Correction in this City, and County of the same City, not being the next direct Way to the Place where such Vagrant or Vagrants are ordered to be sent, nor lying in the most direct, or proper Road towards the Place to which the Person or Persons so conveyed are ordered to be sent, or nearest to such Road, contrary to the Directions of an Act of Parliament made in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty: Therefore to prevent such Expences for the future, and to the End that the Directions of the said Act of Parliament may be duly observed, This Court doth order and direct the Governor, or Master, Governors, or Masters, Keeper, or Keepers of all and every Houses, and House of Correction, within this City, and County of the same City, not to receive any Vagrant, or Vagrants conveyed or sent from any adjacent or other County, or Place, to some other County, Town, or Place, in his or their Passage thither, unless this City, and County of the same City, shall actually be the next direct Way to the Place where such Vagrant or Vagrants are ordered to be sent, or shall lie in the most direct or proper Road towards the Place to which the Person or Persons so conveyed are ordered to be sent, or nearest to such Road. And to the Intent that this Order may be generally known, It is farther ordered, That the same be forthwith published in such Manner as the Governor of the Corporation of the Poor in the said City of Bristol shall think fit.
