Petersbourg, April 27.

THE Court of Russia has received repeated Advices from the Governours of Astrachan and Kiliar, as likewise from the Russian Resident at Constantinople, that the late Motions of Schach Nadyr towards the Russian Frontiers, were only Feints to conceal his true Intention of attacking the Turks. There are actual Advices at Constantinople from the Governour of Bagdat Achmet Bashaw, that he expected a Visit from the Sophi, who was in full March towards him, while other Persian Forces approached Tauris and Erivan. Since the Arrival of this News at Constantinople, the Alarms at the Persian Motions increase; Councils have been held upon Councils; six Men of War are ordered up the Black Sea; the Captain Bashaw is to go in Person, and the Port hastens the Dispatch of the Provision Vessels for Trebisond. The Bashaw of Bagdat wants both Money and Provisions, and Trebisond, which is not far from thence, is in a bad State of Defence.

Naples, May 7. Frequent Conferences are held at Court, in Consequence of the Dispatches that are brought here by Couriers from Spain, Don Philip, and M. de Gages, concerning the present Situation of Affairs in Italy: Great Diligence is used to put the Ports of Castello a Mare, Salerno, &c. in a State of Defence, by raising Batteries; and Cannons have also been mounted upon the additional Part of the Mole lately finished, which has been furnished with the necessary Provisions, &c. Strict Orders have been given to forbid the Exportation from Abruzzo, of all Sorts of Provisions, of which they are getting together great Quantities in that Province, and, by the Dispositions that are making, it appears as if they intend to canton a large Body of Troops at Rieti. The King has conferred the Title of Marquis on M. Castagnola, for him and his Male Descendants, in Consideration of his Services. This Court is gone into Mourning for three Months for the late Elector Palatine, as also for three Weeks for the deceased Princess of Bavaria.

Rome, May 11. On the 8th Cardinal Borghese set out from hence for Naples, to assist at

the Ceremony of Christening of the Princess of Naples, which is to be performed with great Pomp.

Florence, May 14. From M. de Gages Head Quarters at Rimini, they inform us, that on the 5th instant, he received a Courier from his Court, with Notice that the King of Spain, to reward the Officers, who had distinguished themselves at the Battle of Campo Santo, and at the Operations in Savoy, had made a Promotion of three Lieutenant Generals, fourteen Major Generals, fifteen Brigadiers, four Colonels, two Lieutenant Colonels, and distributed 16 Commanderies, and six Pensions amongst them, and honoured the Duke d'Atreisco with the Golden Fleece, and M. Paccoco with the Golden Key. On the 7th Instant, in Consequence of the Arrival at Rimini, of the Dutches of Modenaj from Venice, by Sea, on the 4th Instant, Prince Craon received an Express from M. de Gages, requiring the Regency's Leave for the Passage of her Highness thro' Tuscany on her Journey to France: On the 8th a Council was thereupon held, when an Etatette was dispatched to that General with the Regency's Consent, and Directions were given to the Post-Master General and to Marquis Rinuccini, jun. who set out from hence on the 9th, the former to Arezzo, to attend that Princess's Journey thro' Tuscany, and the latter to Perugia, to compliment her Highness on the Part of the Regency. This Princess, 'tis said, will embark at Lerici for Antibes, a Gally from the Republick of Genoa being arrived there the 9th to attend her. On the 12th the Marquis de Villa Ermosa, Lieutenant General, passed thro' this City on his Journey from Spain to M. de Gages Army. The 12th and 13th Instant, the Members of the Regency, foreign Ministers, Nobility and Military Officers, appeared in their rich Habits to solemnize on the 12th, the Coronation of the Queen of Hungary, and on the 13th her Birthday, on which Occasion in the Evening there was the usual Fireworks, and Cannons fired from the Castle.

Hanover, May 13, N. S. Yesterday Morning his Majesty reviewed in the Court of the Palace two Troops of Horse Grenadier Guards lately raised, which consist of about 160 Men, Officers included, who made a very fine Appearance.

Hanover, May 17, N. S. On Saturday last the King, accompanied by his Royal Highness the Duke, and attended by the whole Court, went to the Linder Common, about an English Mile distant from this City, where Brigadier General Klincanthorom's Regiment of Foot passed in Review before his Majesty; as did Yesterday Morning those of Lieutenant General Wrangel and Colonel Maidel's. They all made a very fine Appearance, and performed their Exercises with great Regularity. These three Regiments are to march for the Rhine the Beginning of the next Month.

Prague, May 21. Prince Lobcowitz continues at Schwandorff. Letters from before Egra of the 17th, mention, that that Day 25 Burghers and two Dominican Friars came out of the Town out of mere Want and Necessity. The Mortality continues, 20 or 30 die a Day, and it is thought that Town must soon fall into our Hands. Hohenemb's Corps is 15000 Men, Prince Charles 30000, Prince Lobcowitz 17000, and 2500 before Egra; from hence they will be reinforced with 3000, one Regiment of which is marched already; the Croates and Hussars arrive daily at the Army. The Desertion of the French is very considerable since the News of the Defeat at Braunau. The Remains of the Imperial Army is assembling under Seckendorf at Munich. When Prince Charles, in returning from Braunau, arrived at Eggenfelden, where the French had had a considerable Quarter all the Winter, he found only thirty Inhabitants alive. The Curate affirms, that he had buried in the four last Months, 2400 French. His Highness has found no Opposition as far as to Dingelsing, where 4000 French are posted. General Daun is sent with a proportionable Body to dislodge them. The French at Ratisbon, Stadt-am-hoff, and Amberg, have been in the utmost Consternation upon the first News of the Loss of La Croix, and of the Defeat of the Bavarians. Their main Force is supposed to be entrenching at Platling near the Mouth of the Isar, and at Deckendorf; which Position, on each Side of the Danube, is the same as the Duke d'Harcourt was in last Year. This Court is charged with above 10000 Prisoners in Hungary. Those who belong to the French, are neither fought for upon the Foot of the Cartel, nor in any wise subsisted by their Court. This Court goes to Lintz on the 16th of next Month, and proposes to be at Vienna on the 3d of July. We have certain Advice here, that the Enemy having abandoned Burghausen, the Burghers have delivered up the Keys thereof to the Austrians.

Hambourg, May 25, N. S. Letters from Stockholm advise, that the Day for the Election, which the Burghers and Peasants had insisted should remain fixed for the 20th past, N. S. was with Difficulty got to be deferred till the Return of the Courier from Petersbourg with the Ultimatum of that Court; which, as it was expected in a very few Days, could only occasion a short Delay.

Berlin, May, 25. N. S. On Monday next there will be a Body of 20,000 Men reviewed about a Mile from this Place. The King of Prussia came here this Morning, and 'tis said his Prussian Majesty will stay eight or 10 Days to entertain Prince William of Hesse, who is expected here to Morrow.

Maestricht, May 27, N. S. This Day the Second Division of Hessian Troops, in the Pay of Great Britain, consisting of the Regiment of Foot Guards, Prince Maximilian's Regiment of Foot, and the Artillery, commanded by Colonel Woelff de Gadenberg, passed the Maeze at this Place; and, after halting one Day, will pursue their March towards the Rhine.

Liege, May 28, N. S. Yesterday the Third Division of the Hessian Troops arrived at Tongres, where after one Day's Respite, they will continue their March and pass the Maeze at Maestricht.

Hague, May 31. N. S. The Town of Zierickzee, which was the only one in Zealand that opposed the March of the 20,000 Men, has now consented to it, and delivered the Payment of her Quota in the Money Subsidy to the Queen of Hungary for the last Year.

War Office, May 18, 1743.

Whereas several of the Soldiers belonging to the Highland Regiment of Foot commanded by the Rt. Hon. Lord Sempil, have mutiny'd and deserted with their Arms and their Highland Regimental Cloaths, and are supposed to be marched Northward; It is the Lords Justices Direction that all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Constables, and other Civil Magistrates do use their utmost Endeavours to secure all or any of the said Mutineers and Deserters in some County Goal, or other Prison, according to the Direction of the Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and to give immediate Notice thereof to the Secretary at War, as directed by the said Act. And all such Persons as shall so apprehend any of the said Mutineers and Deserters, shall receive Forty Shillings for each Man, over and above the Reward given by the said Act to such Persons as shall apprehend Deserters.
