*From the Queen of Hungary's Army in Bavaria, May 11, N. S.*

**T**HE Baron de Lutwitz, Colonel in our Service, having entered Bavaria from the Tyrol, immediately invested the Castle of Aurbourg, and upon the Garrison's refusing to surrender, they being in Expectation of Succour, he began to batter it the 6th. In the mean while the Succour arrived, consisting in 300 Foot, fourscore Horse Grenadiers, and 500 Marksmen, and, with the Assistance of the Garrison, which sallied forth to receive them, repulsed the Croats. But these last having rallied, the Enemy was obliged to retire with a considerable Loss, and was pursued into the Mountains by the Croats, who were provoked, by the Resistance they met with from the neighbouring Boors, to set fire to several Villages. After their Return, the Castle was bombarded, and surrendered upon Condition that the Garrison should remain Prisoners of War, though the Officers were allowed to retain their Equipages, and Swords. Their Number amounted to 133. Baron Lutwitz then took Possession of the Castle, which was very much damaged by the Bombs, and put a Garrison into it. On the 8th the Enemy, who was posted near Armstorf, and Zierenbach, marched for Genghofen. They have burnt the Bridge near Merckel, and are retired towards Oetting, but have not as yet formed themselves into a Body.

*Prague, May 25.* Prince Charles having had Advice from Tiespach, that a Body of French Troops, consisting of between five and six thousand Men, were at Dingelsing on the Iser, he detached General Daun, with a Body of Grenadiers, Horse and Croats, and some Haubitz, with Orders to attack them, whilst he followed with the rest of the Army. Upon the General's Approach to the Town, he summoned the French to surrender, which they refusing, he fired upon the Town with his Haubitz, and soon after several Houses appeared to be on Fire. Thereupon the Grenadiers and Croats scaled the Town, and entered it Sword in Hand. The French were in the utmost Confusion, and retired with great Precipitation; but before they could burn the Bridge on the Iser, the Austrians found means to kill and destroy about 700 of them, part by the Sword, and part by pushing them into the River. In the midst of this Disorder, notwithstanding the Care and Endeavours of General Daun to stop the Fury of the Flames, near two thirds of the Town were consumed. This happened upon the 17th. As soon as the Austrians had got Possession of this Town, Prince Charles detached General Daun to Landau, to attack the French that were there, and who were augmented by part of the Garrison of Dingelsing, and he himself followed at three of the Clock in the Morning of the 18th. On General Daun's Approach

he summoned the French to surrender, which they refused; whereupon the General got every thing in Readiness to attack the Place Sword in Hand, and was fixing the Petards, when on a sudden the French Garrison set fire to the Town, and retired with the greatest Precipitation, having also burnt the Bridge. When the Austrians got into the Town, they found only one House and the Church standing, all the rest of the Houses having been consumed by the Fire; and the Inhabitants were in such Distress, that Prince Charles distributed Necessaries to them, for the French had plundered it for two Days successively, and had not left the least thing of Value in it. From hence we marched to Ober-Pherring, in order to approach the Danube and attack Deckendorf, in order to keep that River clear, and have a free Communication with Prince Lobcowitz. Upon our Approach we found that the Enemy had begun to set fire to Deckendorf, as we are assured they have also done to Natterperg, on the other Side of the Iser. The Inhumanities of the French, have so alienated the Minds of the Bavarians, that, as last Year we could scarce find a Spy; at present they assist us to the utmost of their Power. Part of the Garrison of Dingelsing is retired to Landshut, where there were before some Bavarians, whom they obliged to go out of the Town. General Nadastr has marched within Sight of the Gates of Munich, where he took a French Captain Prisoner. By all Accounts the Loss of the Enemy before Braunau was much greater than we at first imagined. General Geiseruck is left before that Town with a Body of 9000 Men, and General Honenembs is marching with the rest to join the grand Army. Count Seckendorff, after having abandoned Wasserbourg, is endeavouring to get together the Remnants of the broken Bavarian Troops about Munich, in order to form a Corps. Prince Charles had before Dingelsing 32000 Men complete. He has ordered the Pontons from Villshoffen to Deckendorf. It is uncertain whether the Enemy are retired to Straubing or Ingolstadt, but this is certain, that we could not discover a regular Body together. It is thought they will intrench themselves under the Cannon of one of these Places. We shall follow them in a few Days. By this Success we are in Possession of all the Country, from the Inn to the Iser. Our Croats, Maroshers, Tibischers, and other Horse and Foot arrive daily at the Army. We shall throw a Bridge over the Iser, so that if the Enemy stop at Straubing, Prince Lobcowitz, by jointly operating with us, may enable us to surround them. The French during the Winter have destroyed all the Subsistence in this unfortunate Country, as Want and Distempers have a great Number of the Inhabitants. Letters from Ratibon and Augsbourg, mention the Loss of the Enemy at Braunau, to have been, by their own Confession, above 6000 Men.

The News of the taking of Dingelfing and Landau, was brought hither by Capt. Gastheim, of Diemar's Regiment, Aid de Camp to Marshal Khevenhuller, preceded by four Postillions. General Tornaco of Prince Lobcowitz's Corps, is advanced towards the Danube, and is not far from Deckendorf.

*Prague, June 2.* We have Advice that the Enemy has all on a sudden abandoned Wasserburg, where our People got a considerable Magazine with six great Cannons, and all that belongs to them. But what is of more Importance, is the News we received Yesterday by a Courier, that her Majesty's Troops have taken Deckendorf, and in it 350 Prisoners, and made themselves, by Force, Masters, not only of the Bridge of the Town over the Danube, but also of the floating Bridge, after having repulsed the French, who had already begun to break down the First. By all which, we lost no more than 60 or 80 Men. Prince Lobcowitz, who was just come to Prince Charles, was present, by Chance, at this Action. Part of the Baggage of the Prince of Conti is fallen into our Hands, and we hear there are about 5000 French behind Deckendorf, who, it is thought, can hardly escape.

*Masfricht, May 29. N. S.* This Day the third Division of the Hessian Troops, in his Britannick Majesty's Pay, consisting of Prince George and Prince Frederick's Regiments of Foot, under the Command of Col. Mansback, passed the Maeze at this Place, and will be succeeded To-morrow by the fourth Division.

*Hoechst, May 30. N. S.* General Honeywood arrived Yesterday at Konigstein, with the Regiment of Blue Guards, which will encamp To-morrow. All the British Cavalry will be up by the 2d or 3d of next Month. Our Artillery arriv'd in the Camp upon Saturday last, and all the British Foot and Dragoons are now actually incamped, except two Battallions left at Neuwied to guard the Bridge there. The Bridge of Boats, which was prepared at Francfort, is now brought down to this Place, in order to be in Readiness to be laid over the Main, wherever it shall be thought proper.

*Ostend, June 2.* The Transports from Ireland got into this Harbour last Night and to Day: The seven Companies of Brigadier Howard's Regiment marched out this Morning, and were relieved by Lord Rothes's: The Battallion of Sinclair's marches for Bruges To-morrow.

*Hanover, June 2, N. S.* Upon the 30th of May the King reviewed, upon the Plain of Linden, the Regiments of the Infantry of Bothmer and of Crug, which will set out upon the 6th Instant for the Army, with the other six Regiments of Infantry which his Majesty sends thither. This Corps is to be at the Main by the 27th Instant: It will be commanded by General Druchleben. Upon the 2d the King gave an Audience to Count Flemming, Envoy Extraordinary from Poland, who arrived here a few Days ago; as also to M. de Mardefeld, Envoy from the Bishop of Lubeck. Major Brietenbach, who commands the Squadron of Horse Grenadiers lately raised, has received Orders from the King to go to the Army.

*Hague, June 4. N. S.* The States of Holland have given Directions for the Payment of that Province's Quota, in the Subsidy of 16000 Florins for last Year to the Queen of Hungary. Baron Reischach had sent to Prague, with the King's Resolution of the 17th of May

last, concerning the March of the Auxiliary Body of Troops, returned last Saturday, and brought Orders from the Queen to that Minister, to press the said March as much possible towards the Main. We had an Account to Day, from Hanover, of the Arrival of the Lord Carteret there. The Duke of Richmond set out for Utrecht Yesterday Morning, as did M. Wafner for Hanover to Day. As Baron Cronstom is expected here this Night, and the States of Holland, who adjourned themselves till Friday next, will resume their Assembly that Day, it is thought that the Dispositions for the intended March of the Dutch Auxiliary Troops, will then be adjusted. We hear that the French are drawing their Army together at Platling, situated upon the Confluence of the Iser with the Danube, and that being apprehensive of Prince Lobcowitz, they have begun to remove their Magazine from Stadt am-hoff to Straubing, for greater Security.

Lord Sempil, have mutiny'd and deserted with their Arms and their Highland Regimental Cloaths, and are supposed to be marched Northward; It is the Lords Justices Direction that all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Constables, and other Civil Magistrates do use their utmost Endeavours to secure all or any of the said Mutineers and Deserters in some County Goal, or other Prison, according to the Direction of the Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and to give immediate Notice thereof to the Secretary at War, as directed by the said Act. And all such Persons as shall so apprehend any of the said Mutineers and Deserters, shall receive Forty Shillings for each Man, over and above the Reward given by the said Act to such Persons as shall apprehend Deserters.
