Stockholm, June 7.

THE Day before Yesterday, in the Evening, Captain Graman arrived here Express from Abo, with the Czarina's Answer to the last Proposals made from hence: By this Answer we hear that the Czarina agrees to restore Nylandia, but in lieu of it, insists on a District in the Province of Savolax, called Nyflot: And in 12 Days, this Court is promised a very exact Plan of the new Barrier, which the Czarina proposes to form on that Side. The Grand secret Deputation, jointly with the Senate, met this Morning to confer on these new Offers, and To-morrow the States, in Plenum, will take them into Consideration. Here are Reports, as if several thousand Dalicarians had taken up Arms, and were in full March towards this Town.

Ratrbon, June 16. Prince Charles arrived the Day before Yesterday at Siegenbourg. The French lost a great many Men near Gieffeld. The Austrians intend to throw a Bridge over the Danube, and for that Purpose they have already got together 150 Boats. M. de Plettenberg and M. Palm, the two Austrian Envoys, with a Commissary of War, are at present at Nuremberg, with a Commission from the Queen of Hungary to the Circle of Franconia.

Ratisbon, June 17. Prince Charles is advanced from Siegenbourg to Gieffensfeld, and it is reported that he is preparing to send a Detachment of 16000 Men to the English Army upon the Mein. We are assured that his Imperial Majesty will very soon return to Francfort.

Ratisbon, June 18. It is said that the Queen of Hungary has now no less than 17200 Prisoners of War. We are assured that Braunau is taken, and we have it from good Hands, that Egra is also taken. This Moment we hear, that the French were in full March from Ingolstadt to Donawerth.

Coblentz, June 17. On the 15th Instant the Hanoverian Train of Artillery, and the Rear of their Cavalry, passed the Rhine at Neuwied; and Yesterday the first Division of the Hessian Troops passed the Rhine at the same Place, and continued their March to join the Confederate Army upon the Mein.

Mentz, June 22, N. S. The last Post brought nothing material from Bavaria. The Austrians are at last Masters of Egra. We just now hear, that the French under Marshal Noailles, have seized on the Castle of Bieuberg, belonging to the Circle of Franconia, jointly with the Count of Erpach, and some others, and that they found 80 Pieces of Cannon in the said Castle.

Aschaffenberg, June 23, N. S. On Sunday the 16th, at Eight in the Evening, the King set out from Hanover, and arrived here on Wednesday the 19th in the Afternoon: His Majesty in coming thro' the great Cities and Villages was received with all Marks of Demonstration of Joy. On Thursday the 20th, his Majesty view'd the several Camps, as he did likewise the Day following. Yesterday being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Accession to the Throne, there was a great Appearance at Court of the Nobility, General Officers and others, to pay their Duty to his Majesty, and to congratulate him on that Occasion. In the Afternoon his Majesty rode along the Line of the Army, and the Troops being drawn out, he was saluted by the Artillery, and with three running Fires from Right to Left of the whole Army, and then return'd to the Castle of this Place. On Wednesday his Royal Highness the Duke arrived here; and the next Day the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret. Saturday the Honourable Thomas Villiers, Esq; his Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary, arrived here from Mentz, and return'd thither again this Morning.

Hague, June 28, N. S. From Bavaria we hear, that the French Army under Marshal Broglie lay incamped between a great Morass and the Danube, about half Way between Ingolstadt and Neubourg; which last Place, belonging to the Elector Palatin, has, it is said, refused Admittance both to Imperialists and French. The Detachment under M. Segur, which was sent from the French Army upon the Rhine to the Assistance of Marshal Broglie, have posted and intrenched themselves upon the Schellenberg; and some Advices add, that the Palatin Regiments, who were with M. Segur, have taken their Leave of him. In the mean Time, Marshal Seckendorf, with his Corps, was got to Donawerth; whilst Prince Charles had marched the 20th Instant from Gieffensfeldt to Pueck, and designed, as was thought, to proceed to the Lech over-against Donawerth, General Nadafti having already taken Post at Rain upon that River, and Prince Lobcowitz being ordered to repass the Danube, and join his Highness upon the Lech.
