Whitehall, June 29, 1743.

Last Night Mr. Over, one of His Majesty's Messengers, arrived at his Grace the Duke of Newcastle's Office, with the following Advices from the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret, Dated at Hanau, $\frac{20 \text{ June,}}{1 \text{ July,}}$ 1743.

THE King having received certain Intelligence that the Marshal de Noailles intended to endeavour to prevent the Junction of the Hessian Troops, under the Command of Prince George of Hesse, and the eight Hanoverian Battalions under that of General Druchleben, with the main Body of the Army, sent Orders to Prince George, and to the said General, upon their March, to halt at Hanau, and determined to join them with the whole Army; accordingly, on the $\frac{28}{29}$ in the Evening, his Majesty gave Orders that the Army should hold itself in Readiness to march the next Morning early, and about Four the Troops began to file off in two Columns, when the Duke de Noailles, perceiving this Motion, immediately ordered a Detachment of his Army to march along the Mayn towards Seligenstadt, where the French Infantry passed that River over two Bridges, and the Cavalry forded it a little above the said Village, with a Design to oppose, with all his Force, the Junction of our Armies, his Artillery forming the Arriere Guard. As soon as it was in Reach of annoying our Army, it began to play upon us about half an Hour past Ten in the Morning, and took us in Flank. This Fire lasted near two Hours, and though

we erected some Batteries in order to silence those of the Enemy, yet they did not discontinue firing. Notwithstanding which, our Army continued its March, and by Perseverance arrived in a little Wood, behind which the French Army was ranged in Order of Battle; their Right Wing was covered by the Mayn, and supported by a Battery erected near Maynfling, on the other Side of the River. The Left extended itself towards the Hills, and had behind it a little Rivulet and the Village of Dittengen. The French Army, amounting to near 30,000 Men, was drawn up in two Lines and an Arriere Guard; it was commanded by the Duke de Noailles, the Duke de Chartres, and several other Princes of the Blood were present; and the Household Troops made the Center, supported by the Infantry.

The King having given his Orders to the respective Generals of the Army, with the greatest Calmness and Resolution, placed himself on the Right Wing at the Head of the British Infantry, on Foot, Sword in Hand. Our Army drew up in Order of Battle, as well as it could, in the Wood, and extended itself as far to the Front of the Enemy as the Ground would allow.

On the Right of our Army, at the Entrance of the Wood, the Hanoverians erected a Battery, which flanked the Enemy, and did great Service in the Heat of the Action; another was erected by the English on the Left, and a Third by the Austrians in the Center.

Such were the Dispositions of the two Armies till about Twelve o' Clock, when the Army was advanced to charge the Enemy. The Troops of the French King's

King's Household attacked with great Vigour our Center, which gave Way a little, but soon rallied, repulsed them, and drove them before them till they beat them out of the Field. Annexed is a List of the Prisoners, many of which are Officers and Persons of Quality; a great Number were killed and wounded; and some Standards and Colours taken; and after this Defeat of the Household Troops, the French Army perceiving itself attacked on all Sides, quitted the Field of Battle, passed the Rivulet behind it, and posted itself in Order of Battle upon an Eminence commanding the Plain: But notwithstanding this advantageous Disposition, upon our Troops marching towards them with Resolution, and in Order, they abandoned that Post, retired to Kleinevelsheim, and at last retreated in great Disorder towards the Village of Seligenstadt, where they repassed the Mayn with Precipitation and Confusion; several were drowned, and a great many died of their Wounds in the Pursuit. The great Number of the killed, that was found dispersed on all Sides, shews, that their Loss must be considerable, and it is computed at about 4000 Men killed, wounded, drowned, and taken Prisoners. On our Side our Loss is computed to be near 1500 killed and wounded. Among the first is Lieutenant General Clayton, who was killed upon the Spot, equally regretted by the King, the Officers and Soldiers; amongst the last, his Royal Highness the Duke, commanding with great Bravery at his Post of Major General, received a Musket Ball, which went through his Leg; the Duke D'Aremsberg received one in his Breast; but neither of these Wounds is thought dangerous. Colonel Peers had a dangerous Shot in the Throat: Major General Monroy of the Hanover Troops, and his Son, had each a Leg shot off by the same Cannon Ball; but none of the Three are despaired of. Brigadier Huske was also shot in the Heel; but though the Bone is broken, his Wound is not thought dangerous.

The British Troops, and all the Forces of the Allied Army, who were engaged in this Action, behaved with the utmost Resolution, Bravery, and Intrepidity.

Their Excellencies the Lords Juftices in Council.

Their Excellencies the Lords Juftices in Council were this Day pleafed to order, that the Parliament which ftands prorogued to Thursday the Fourteenth of July next, fhould be further prorogued to Thursday the Twenty Fifth Day of Auguft following.

The Following is the Translation of a Letter from the Emperor to the Circle of Suabia.

C H A R L E S the VIIth.

To the Directors of the Circle of Suabia.

WE having taken the Refolution to feparate our Imperial Army from the French, hitherto our Auxiliaries, and to declare at the fame Time our faid Army to be a true Imperial Army of the Empire; and with this View to order them to enter into the Territories of the Empire, which, purfuant to the Orders given to our Com-

manding General, is to remain there without any farther offensive Operations of War, (and which we hope will be entirely laid afide by the Party hitherto engaged in War againft us) and confequently without the leaft Inconveniency or Moleftation to any Perfon whatfoever.

We therefore would lofe no Time in acquainting you with this our Refolution, and to defire you at the fame Time, not only to fuffer our faid Imperial Troops to enter into the Territories of your Circle, but to allow them a fafe Refidence, to furnifh them with neceffary Provisions and Forage, and to fhew them your farther good Will and Difpofition to affift them, which will be moft agreeable to us, and gratefully acknowledged. And we remain, &c. &c. Dated at Augfburg, June 25, 1743. Carl.

Stockholm, June 14. O. S. Yefterday came an Account that all the Ruffian Gallies had paffed the Swedifh Fleet near Hangoud, and that the faid Fleet finding they could be of no farther Ufe for the Guard of that Port, had quitted it, and put to Sea, which News has occafioned a general Confternation here. The King and Senate, and the four Orders of the Diet, have named each two Deputies, who are to go to the Dalicarlians, and to try to quiet them. They march in three Columns, one of which is already arrived at Wefteras fifteen Swedifh Miles from hence.

Stockholm, June 17. The Confternation in which People are here, grows daily greater. The Evening before laft, and Yefterday Morning the Troops, which had been fent fome Weeks ago to Aland, returned to this Town, having been obliged to abandon that Ifland, on the Approach of the Mufcovites, who have taken Poffeffion of it again, and we expect every Day to hear that they are landed on the Coafts of Sweden. The Dalicarlians, to the Number of 35000 Men, are advancing towards this Town, fully determined to infift on the Punifhment of all thofe who are the Authors of the prefent Calamities. In a Plenum which met Yefterday, the Peafants fent a Deputation to the Nobles, defiring, that no violent Meafures might be taken againft their Brethren the Dalicarlians, fince they would only ferve to create greater Troubles and Confufions in the Nation.

Hanau, July 3, N. S. We have good Intelligence from Darmftadt, that 2200 wounded French have actually paffed thro' that Place, and that there were above 2000 at Seligenftadt; and that the French declare in their Camp, that their Lofs amounts to above 5000 Men. The Lofs in the combined Army amounts to about 800 Englifh, 700 Austrians, and 500 Hanoverians. We have been join'd by 12000 excellent Troops fince the late Battle.

Liège, July 5. N. S. Our Advices this Day from Germany, fay, that the Marfhal de Broglie arrived with all his Army on the 28th of June

at Northingen; and that the 6000 Hanoverians, and the 6000 Hessians, have joined the Grand Army of the Allies at Dornigheim; that the Head Quarters are at Hanau, and that the King is lodged in the Castle of Kesselstadt, within a League of Francfort.
