ON Sunday last M. Hockholtz, the Queen of Hungary's Resident at this Court, had an Audience of the Empress at Peterhoff, in which he notified to her Imperial Majesty the Coronation of her Hungarian Majesty as Queen of Bohemia. M. Koppin, who was formerly the Duke of Mecklenburg's Minister at Stockholm, arrived lately at this Court with a Commission from the Duke of Mecklenburg; but her Imperial Majesty, not thinking fit to enter into it in the present Situation of Affairs, has been pleased to dismiss the said Gentleman with a present of 2000 Rubles.

ADVICES lately arrived from Persia, confirm not only the Sophi's Retreat, with his Troops out of Dagistan and the Parts adjacent to the Russian Frontiers, to the other Side of Derbent and farther, towards Persia, but that he was actually marching through the Stepp, or Desert of Mungali, in the Month of March last. His Army was considerably diminished by the extreme Cold and Want of Provisions: A great Number of Horses, Mules and Camels, died also on the Way, so that not only common Soldiers, but many Officers were forced to travel on Foot, and the Sophi was obliged to stay some Time in the Mungalish Desert to put his Troops in Order again. From thence he marched in the Month of April to Tewris, with his whole Army, and proposed to continue his March to the Turkish Frontiers, and make the first Attack upon the City of Erserum, as he was fully determined to declare War against Turkey, and had already made such Preparations for it, Couriers having been dispatched into all the Provinces of the Empire, to furnish more Troops, Horses, Artillery, Provisions, and other Necessaries, as soon as possible. On the other Hand, the Turks are making the necessary Preparations; their Troops are already upon the Frontiers, both on the Side of Babylon and Erserum, and are daily reinforced.

Extract from General Keith's Relation of the first Operations of this Year's Campaign, and the Action between him and the Enemy's Gallies by the Island of Corpo, on the 19th of May, under the Command of Vice-Admiral Falkenberg.

UPON my Arrival, the 13th of May, with the Sixteen Gallies and two Bombarding Praums under my Command, at the River Cor-

po, the Enemy's Fleet of Gallies, which was then by the same River, drew back with the greatest Precipitation twenty Werst into the Sea, where it was augmented with some Barks; but our Gallies and Praums were detained the next Day at the Mouth of the River by a contrary Wind, which blew so strong for two Days, that our Praums could not go forward. During which Time, the Enemy might have come with a fair Wind to attack us.

On the 18th towards Evening, the Enemy came nearer to us, wherefore I placed our Praums at the Mouth of the River by a Pass, and the Gallies immediately behind them, to wait for the Enemy, who was that Evening within three Werst of us, but not resolving upon any Enterprize, came to an Anchor. Whereupon I sent a Lieutenant Colonel with Three hundred Men to guard the Pass for our Gallies; and four Field-pieces, and afterwards four Eight Pounder Galley-pieces were planted on a Battery on the Shore.

The next Day the 19th at Sun-rise, we saw the Enemy's Praum and Gallies just before us, but the Vice-Admiral's Galley, and the Right Wing, kept behind an Island just by. The same Day in the Afternoon, the Enemy's Fleet, consisting of twenty Gallies and one large Praum was put in order against the Mouth of the River Corpo, by the Island of that Name, to venture upon an Attack. The Enemy began and continued for three Hours a hot Fire upon us with their Cannon; against which our two Praums chiefly fired, there being so little Room, that only a few Gallies could act behind the Praums; but for that Reason there was the brisker Fire from the Cannon planted on the Shore, which, with the Praums and Gallies together made Fourteen hundred and seventy four Shot. After this three Hours Engagement, the Enemy, tho' superior in Number, had not only gained no Advantage, but was forced to retire back to Sea with no small Damage. The Enemy's famous great Praum, called the Hercules, ceased firing two Hours before the End of the Engagement, and was drawn out of the Line. It was also observed, that two Flag-Officer Gallies retired twice out of the Line, probably to repair some Damage received; and as we saw that one Galley was towed by another in the Retreat, one may conclude, that the Enemy's Fleet of Gallies must have suffered no small Damage and Loss of Men; for as they were driven back they retired with such Precipitation, that the third Day after the Action they could scarcely be discerned from our Light-House; and as we found the Anchor of the Hercules Praum with the

the Cable cut, it seems she had not Time to get it up.

On our Side the Loss, in this hot Engagement, was very small, having not above thirty Men killed and wounded; which was partly owing to our being advantageously posted in good Order by a Fort for our Defence against the Enemy. The good Conduct and Bravery of the Commanders of both the Praums, the Sea Lieutenants Pronzischew and Soimonow, and their whole Equipage, which acted also very bravely, cannot be sufficiently commended.

Immediately after, I pursued the Enemy farther, and am now posted by Aland, waiting for Field Marshal Lacy, to act with united Force.

The Field Marshal is already arrived with his Gallies at Tweremund, not far from Anguta, where her Imperial Majesty's Fleet of Ships, under the Command of Admiral Gallowin, joined him. From thence they are going together to Anguta and farther, to join General Keith, and we expect shortly other Advices of their Operations.

We have the following Account of the 24th of May from Lieutenant General Stoffel, who commands her Imperial Majesty's Troops in East Bothnia, that the Swedish Major General Freudenfeld, with the Swedish Troops under his Command, had been six Weeks in those Parts, not far from the City of Ula, and had not ventured upon the least Enterprize against the Russian Troops; but as soon as he heard of their marching that Way, he retired with so great Precipitation and Fear, that he burnt the Bridge behind him, sunk some Cannon in the Water, and left on the Way many Waggons and other Things that were too heavy to carry off with Speed.

Stockholm, June 28, O. S. Yesterday Morning died here Major General Senator Adlerfeldt, of the Wound he had received in the Affair which happened with the Dalicarians the 22d Instant. Major General Stahl is set out for Kiel to compliment the Duke Administrator, in the Name of his Swedish Majesty, on his being elected Successor to this Crown. The King and Senate have taken the Resolution to send immediately an Ambassadour Extraordinary to the King of Denmark.

Hanau, July 13, N. S. Yesterday Morning at Break of Day the French Army broke up, and marched in a very hasty Manner from the Mayn. As the Austrian Hussars are not yet arrived, some of our Independent Companies were sent after them, and took some Baggage from them, and brought in the Prince of Craon's Son Prisoner, who lay wounded in a Village which they had abandoned. Fifty seven Deserters came in Yesterday from the French Army, who say, that the Orders for their March were given on a Sudden, and that since the Battle there had been a vast Desertion; that it was talk'd in the Army that they were to go to Worms, and that they were to take four Marches without stopping. We have certain Intelligence that they have continued marching all this Day, and they seem to point towards Oppenheim. By Letters of the 10th from Heidelberg, we hear that a good Body of Hussars are in that Neighbourhood, and that the Elector Palatin has

quitted his Residence at Manheim. We expect to hear from Prince Charles To-morrow; and reckon that he is within seven Marches of us this Day; Both the Armies having been Victorious, are in the highest Spirits. His Majesty is in perfect Health, after a slight Indisposition of two Days, occasioned by the immense Fatigue he has gone through. The Duke of Cumberland's Fever has entirely left him, and his Royal Highness is out of all Manner of Danger.

Hanau, July 17, N. S. We have certain Advice, that the French Army under the Command of Marshal Broglio, pass'd the Rhine, on Friday last at Spire, and that the Army under Marshal Noailles were to pass the same River as this Day about Oppenheim and Worms.

Vienna, July 6. We hear that the Town of Braunau has surrendred upon Capitulation; the Garrison to be disarmed, and not to serve for a Year and a Day; and that the Queen's Forces are likewise in Possession of Reichenhall. Marshal Broglio, when he left Donawert, threw all the Magazines into the Danube; he took with him seven Days Provisions, and had got four Matches of Prince Charles from Schellenberg, but the Hussars were up with his Rear, and it is thought certain here, that though he should escape the grand Army, which is pursuing him, he cannot carry 15000 Men back into France.

Copenhagen, July 13, N. S. The Fleet lies still in the Road, without any Orders to sail.

Litge, July 16, N. S. This Day Brigadier General Howard, at the Head of three English Regiments,

Regiments, and that of the Scotch Highlanders commanded by Lord Sempil, with about 250 Waggons loaden with the Clothing and Stores for the British Army, arrived at Tongres, where they will halt To-morrow, and pass the Maefe the next Day at Maestricht in their Way to the Army. A Dutch Officer arrived here Yesterday from General Colleyar, Governor of Namur, in order to settle with our Government all that may be necessary for the March of two Dutch Regiments through this Principality from Namur to Arnheim, one of which will begin to march on the 18th Instant, and the other the Day following.

Hague, July 19, N. S. The 3d of next Month, N. S. is fixed by the Council of State, for the First Divisions of Horse and Foot to pass the Frontier of the Republick, and enter into Westphalia, in order to join the Allied Army in Germany under the Command of the King of Great Britain.
