A Dutch Officer arrived here Yesterday from General Colleyar, Governor of Namur, in order to settle with our Government all that may be necessary for the March of two Dutch Regiments through this Principality from Namur to Arnheim, one of which will begin to march on the 18th Instant, and the other the Day following.

*Hague, July 19, N. S.* The 3d of next Month, N. S. is fixed by the Council of State, for the First Divisions of Horse and Foot to pass the Frontier of the Republick, and enter into Westphalia, in order to join the Allied Army in Germany under the Command of the King of Great Britain.
