*Palermo, June 21, N. S.* A true Discovery has been made from whence the Plague was brought to Messina. A Genoese Tartan arrived there in March last, under Neapolitan Colours, from the Levant, ladden with Wooll that had been bought at Missilongi, where the Master was furnished with a clean Patent, but afterwards went to Patraffo, where the Infection was, to purchase Counterband Goods. The Crew opposed this, but on his Menaces they were obliged to land, and bought up Tobacco, and some Cases of Cotton Stuffs, and without having his Bill of Health renewed, but with the clean one from Missilongi, proceeded to Messina. Before their Arrival, a Sailor, who had touched the said Cases, died of the Plague, and was thrown over-board, on which Account the other Sailors avoided going near the Cabin where those Cases were. On their Arrival at Messina, they took an Oath that they were not infected, and that the Sailor wanting was dead, of a Fever, and had been thrown over-board when they were distant from the Land. Whilst they were under Quarantine, the Master having agreed it with the Guard, landed, in the Night-time, the Tobacco and Cotton Stuffs; the Sailors, out of Fear, did not discover it, but as the Master died three Days afterwards, and other Sailors fell sick and died of the Plague, the rest of them discovered what had happened; upon which the Vessel was burnt, and the Sailors were stripped naked, and put into the Lazaretto, none of whom to this Time have died. The Magistrates of Health of Messina omitted to make Search for the Contraband Goods which were concealed, and as the said Sailors were all in Health, towards the 15th of May, the People who had received the Goods began to sell them, immediately on which a malignant Fever broke out in that Quarter of the Town only. The Senate took no Precautions to prevent the Sickness spreading, but as by the 22d of May it increased, and the Number of People who died was considerable, a Consultation of the Physicians was held, who concluded that it was an Epidemical Fever, which Account was written to Palermo. Two Physicians only said it was the Plague, and those two were reprimanded and chastised, for Fear of

Prejudice to the Commerce of that City. Towards the 25th of May there died upwards of an Hundred Persons a Day. To the 31st of the said Month the Dead amounted to above Six Hundred, besides those that were sick; yet the Physicians persisted in saying it was a malignant Fever only, and not the Plague, because it was not catching. Finally, it has been observed, that till the 8th of this Month, the Dead amounted to 3000 in the City, and 3000 in the Hospital. The City of Catania sends every Day to Messina, Corn, Bread, Flower, and other Eatables. There are Letters now at Palermo, that to the 12th of this Month, call the Number of the Deceased 9000; and the Senate there write, that they cannot hold out any longer for want of a sufficient Number of People, therefore one of the three Vicars General, who were sent to make a Barricade from Melazzo to Taormina, has caused several Ovens to be built at the latter Place, and continually sends Bread and Eatables to Messina. A Sum of 40,000 Crowns has been sent to him to dispose of as he shall find it convenient. They write also from Messina, that all the Children whose Parents are dead, have been put into Magazines, where they are nourished by Goats Milk. People here are under great Apprehensions, on being informed that there are not People in Messina sufficient to bury the Dead, that the Air may be infected; therefore the Magistrates of Health of Palermo have ordered all capital Criminals in the Prisons, as well as those condemned to the Gallies, to be set at Liberty, and to send them to Messina to assist the Sick People. Two Gallies are expected from Naples to guard these Coasts, and the King has sent a large Sum of Money to succour the Poor of that City. The Infection has not yet extended itself beyond the City.

*Vienna, July 10, N. S.* Te Deum was Sung on Sunday last in the Cathedral Church of this Capital on Account of the Victory at Dettingen. The Queen was attended with her whole Court, as usual upon the greatest and most solemn Occasions. There was a Drawing Room at Night, and a Ball followed by a Supper at the neighbouring Palace of Schonbrun. This Court has prepared a Circular Rescript, with



with relation to the whole Transaction of Count Seckendorf with Count Kevenhuller. The Garrison of Reichendal have surrendered themselves Prisoners of War. Upon the Surrender of Braunau 3800 Men laid down their Arms, and 26 Ensigns, at the Gate. There were 500 Austrian Deserters amongst them, who were received into their respective Regiments; several others took to the Austrian Service.

*Vienna, July 17.* Prince Lobkowitz was declared Yesterday Governor of Milan. From Bavaria we hear, that Straubing has not yet surrendered, but was batter'd with 42 Pieces of Cannon.

*Petersbourg, June 28.* On Sunday last Prince Czerbatow kissed her Imperial Majesty's Hand, upon his being appointed to return to the Court of Great Britain, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from this Court: He is now preparing every Thing for his Journey, and proposes to set out in ten or twelve Days, in order to attend the King of Great Britain in Germany, and afterwards to pass ovet into England in his Majesty's Retinue.

*Hambourg, July 17, N. S.* Major General Stahl arrived here Yesterday from Stockholm, and in the Audience, which he was immediately introduced to, of the Bishop of Lubeck, he presented to his Highness a Letter from the King of Swea, in which his Majesty informs that Prince o his Nomin tion to the eventual Succession in Sweden. The Bishop having notified his Election in Sweden, by his Grand Marshal M. Pleffe, to the Burgher Master Widow, received Yesterday the congratulatory Compliments of the Town from the Syndic Lipstorff and Councillor Brocks, who were deputed to him upon the Occasion. They afterwards waited upon the Dutchess of Holstein and the Prince Augustus, to assure their Highnesses of the Part they take in this great Event; and the Joy which it causes in this Town, is conspicuous amongst all Ranks of People. The Town offer'd to send his Highness a Guard, which the Prince waved. It is thought his Highness will wait the Arrival of a formal Deputation from Sweden here in Hambourg. Numbers of Persons who are attached to the Court of Holstein resort hither with their Compliments of Congratulation.

Their Excellencies the Lotds Justices in Council.

Whereas upon Information given to their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council, that the Island of Sicily was visited with the Plague, their Excellencies, in order to prevent the Infection being brought by Ships or Vessels coming from thence, or other Places in the Mediterranean, into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, were pleased, by their Order in Council of the 7th of

this Instant, to order that all Ships or Vessels then arrived and not unladen, and all Ships and Vessels, which should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the said Island of Sicily, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days; and that all Ships and Vessels that were then arrived and not unladen, or should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from any other of the Ports in the Mediterranean, should make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days. And their Excellencies the Lords Justices judging it necessary, for the further preventing the said Infection from being brought into this Kingdom, to make several Alterations and Additions to their said Order in Council of the 7th of this Instant, do hereby order, with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, That all Ships or Vessels already arrived and not yet unladen, and all Ships or Vessels which shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from or through the Mediterranean, (except the Island of Sicily) do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days; and all such Ships and Vessels as are arrived and not yet unladen, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the said Island of Sicily, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days; which respective Times are to be reckoned from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing such Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vessels bound to the Rivers of Thames and Medway, be *Standgate Creek* on the South Shore of the River Medway, opposite to the Isle of Grain; *Sharpfleet Creek*, and the lower End of the *Hope*: And by such Ships and Vessels coming into any other of the Ports of Great Britain, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Officers of his Majesty's Customs in such Ports, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That until and during the Time for making such Quarantine, no Person coming, or Goods imported in any such Ship or Vessel, shall come on Shore, or be landed in any Place within this Kingdom.

That no Pilots shall go on Board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel; which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel, so to be conducted, as possible: And if any Pilot or other Person shall go on Board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That if, at the Expiration of the Forty Days Quarantine to be performed by any Ship or Vessel that is or shall be liable thereto, it shall appear to the Officers of the Customs in the Place where such Ship or Vessel shall be, and the Master or other Persons taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, together with two other Persons belonging to the said Ship or Vessel, shall make Oath

before the Custom, Comptroller or Collector of the Port where such Quarantine shall be performed, or the next Port thereunto, or before any of their Deputies and any one Justice of the Peace near adjoining to such Port, that such Ship or Vessel, and all and every Person and Persons therein, have duly performed their Quarantine as aforesaid, and that the Ship or Vessel, and all the Persons on Board, are free from Infection; that then the respective Persons coming in such Ship or Vessel, (a Certificate of such Oaths being made by the Persons before whom the same shall be taken) shall be permitted to go on Shore; but the Goods imported in such Ship or Vessel, together with the Bedding of the Sailors, shall be landed, opened and aired, and so remain a Week, and after may be brought to their Places of Discharge, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw Thrown or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wooll, Cotton Yarn or manufactured, Wooll Raw, or in any wife Wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmentia Wooll, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wooll or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods pack'd with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hatts and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers: Which the Officers of his Majesty's Customs shall cause to remain on Board such Ship or Vessel, and not permit to be landed, till an Account thereof shall be given unto their Excellencies in Council, and Orders shall be given concerning the same.

That the Places for Landing and Airing the Goods imported by such Ships or Vessels as are or shall be liable to the Forty Days Quarantine, shall be such Places as shall be appointed by his Majesty's Officers of the Customs, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That whatever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as after Quarantine performed shall be employed in the Hold of any such Ship or Vessel, for the Taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection from Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw Thrown or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wooll, Cotton Yarn or Manufactured, Wooll Raw, or in any wife Wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmentia Wooll, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins and Skins in the Wooll or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods pack'd with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hatts and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers, shall be obliged to perform a New Quarantine of Forty Days.

That the Captains of every of his Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, shall take due Care to prevent the

Landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of his Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners, and other Officers of his Majesty's Customs, do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine, before directed, be duly performed.

That the Commanders of his Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of his Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea-Coast, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of his Majesty's Customs in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in the due Performance thereof. And the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and his Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

His Majesty's Ships the Monmouth, commanded by Captain Windham, and the Medway, commanded by Captain Cokburne, being on a Cruize off the Canary Islands, stood into the Road of Sta Cruz in the Island Gomera, on the 20th of May, in order to destroy the Forts, and batter the Town. They were fired at from three Forts; but the Ships anchoring within less than a quarter of a Mile of them, entirely demolished the Forts, and beat down the greatest Part of the Town, and then put to Sea on their Cruize, having received very little Damage.

*Whereas some loose and disorderly Person or Persons did, in February and March last, cut down and destroy great Numbers of young planted Oaks, belonging to Pelbant Reeves, Esq; in the Manor of Aborfield in the County of Berks, and did, on Sunday the Twelfth of June last, get into the Garden belonging to the Dwelling House of the said Pelbant Reeves, at Aborfield aforesaid, and took away and destroyed great Quantities of Fruit, and other Things of Value; And did also on the 19th of the said Month of June come to the said House with the same felonious Intent, but were prevented from doing any further Mischief: In order to the discovering and bringing to Punishment the Persons concerned in the said Crimes, their Excellencies the Lords Justices are pleased to promise his Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any Person concerned therein, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.*
