

Palermo, June 21, N. S. very has been made from whence the Plague was brought to Meffina. A Genoese Tartan arrived an Hundred Persons a Day. To the 31st of the there in March last, under Neapolitan Colours, from the Levant, loaden with Wooll that had been bought at Miffilongi, where the Master was furnished with a clean Patent, but asterwards went to Patraffo, where the Infection was, to purchafe Counterband Goods. The Crew opposed this, but on his Menaces they were obliged to land, and bought up Tobacco, and fome Cafes of Cotton Stuffs, and without having his Bill of Health renewed, but with the clean one from Miffilongi, proceeded to Meffina. Before their Arrival, a Sailor, who had touched the faid Cafes, died of the Plague, and was thrown over-board, on which Account the other Sailors avoided going near the Cabin where those Cases On their Arrival at Meffina, they took were. an Oath that they were not infected, and that the Sailor wanting was dead, of a Fever, and had been thrown over-board when they were distant from the Land. Whilst they were under Quarantine, the Master having agreed it with the Guard, landed, in the Night-time, the Tobacco and Cotton Stuffs ; the Sailors, out of Fear, did not discover it, but as the Master died three Days afterwards, and other Sailors fell fick and died of the Plague, the reft of them difcovered what had happened ; upon which the Veffel was burnt, and the Sailors were ftripped naked, and put into the Lazaretto, none of whom to this Time have died. The Magistrates of Health of Meffina omitted to make Search for the Contraband Goods which were concealed, and as the faid Sailors were all in Health, towards the 15th of May, the People who had received the Goods began to fell them, immediately on which a malignant Fever broke out in that Quarter of the Town only. The Senate took no Precautions to prevent the Sickness foreading, but as by the 22d of May it increased, and the Number of People who died was confiderable, a Confultation of the Phyficians was held, who concluded that it was an Epidemical Fever, which Account was written to Palermo. Two Phyficians only faid it was the Plague, and those two were reprimanded and chaftifed, for Fear of

A true Difco- | Prejudice to the Commerce of that City. Towards the 25th of May there died upwards of faid Month the Dead amounted to above Six Hundred, befides those that were fick ; yet the Physicians perfisted in faying it was a malignant Fever only, and not the Plague, because it was not catching. Finally, it has been obferved, that till the 8th of this Month, the Dead amounted to 3000 in the City, and 3000 in the Hospital. The City of Catania fends every Day to Meffina, Corn, Bread, Flower, and other Eatables. There are Letters now at Palermo, that to the 12th of this Month, call the Number of the Deceafed 9000; and the Senate there write, that they cannot hold out any longer for want of a fuffi-cient Number of People, therefore one of the three Vicars General, who were fent to make a Barricade from Melazzo to Taormina, has caufed feveral Ovens to be built at the latter Place, and continually fends Bread and Eatables to Meffina. A Sum of 40,000 Crowns has been fent to him to dispose of as he shall find it con-venient. They write also from Messina, that all the Children whofe Parents are dead, have been put into Magazines, where they are nourifhed by Goats Milk. People here are under great Apprehensions, on being in formed that there are not People in Mession further to bury the Dead, that the Air may be infected; therefore the Magistrates of Health of Palerino have ordered all capital Criminals in the Prifons, as well as those condemned to the Gallies, to be fet at Liberty, and to fend them to Meffina to affift the Sick People. Two Gallies are expected from Naples to guard these Coasts, and the King has fent a large Sum of Money to Iuccour the Poor of that City. The Infection has not yet extended itfelf beyond the City.

Vienna, July 10, N. S. Te Deum was Sung on Sunday last in the Cathedral Church Te Deum was of this Capital on Account of the Victory at Dettingen. The Queen was attended with her whole Court, as usual upon the greatest and most folemn Occasions. There was a Drawing Room at Night, and a Ball followed by a Supper at the neighbouring Palace of Schonbrun. This Court has prepared a Circular Refeript, with

with relation to the whole Tranfaction of Count Seckendorf with Count Kevenhuller. The Garrifon of Reichendal have furrendered themfelves Prifoners of War. Upon the Surrender of Braunau 3800 Men laid down their Arms, and 26 Enfigns, at the Gate. There were 500 Auftrian Deferters amongft them, who were received into their respective Regiments; feveral others took to the Auftrian Service.

Vienna, July 17. Prince Lobkowitz was declared Yesterday Governor of Milan. From Bavaria we hear, that Straubing has not yet furrendered, but was batter'd with 42 Pieces of Cannon.

Petersbourg, June 28. On Sunday laft Prince Czerbatow kiffed her Imperial Majefty's Hand, upon his being appointed to return to the Court of Great Britain, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from this Court : He is now preparing every Thing for his Journey, and proposes to set out in ten or twelve Days, in order to attend the King of Great Britain in Germany, and asterwards to pass over into England in his Majesty's Retinue.

Hambourg, July 17, N.S. Major General Stahl arrived here Yesterday from Stockholm, and in the Audience, which he was immediately introduced to, of the Bishop of Lubeck, he prefented to his Highness a Letter from the King of Swea, in which his Majesty informs that Prince o his Nomin tion to the eventual Succeffion in Sweden. The Bishop having notified his Election in Sweden, by his Grand Marshal M. Pleffe, to the Burgher Mafter Widow, received Yesterday the congratulatory Compliments of the Town from the Syndic Lipftorff and Councillor Brocks, who were deputed to him upon the Occafion. They afterwards waited upon the Dutchefs of Holftein and the Prince Augustus, to assure their Highnesses of the Part they take in this great Event; and the Joy which it causes in this Town, is conspicuous amongst all Ranks of People. The Town offer'd to fend his Highness a Guard, which the Prince waved. It is thought his Highness will wait the Arrival of a formal Deputation from Sweden here in Hambourg. Numbers of Perfons who are attached to the Court of Holftein refort hither with their Compliments of Congratulation.

Whereas upon Information given to their Excellencies the Lords Juftices in Council, that the Ifland of Sicily was vifited with the Plague, their Excellencies, in order to prevent the Infection being brought by Ships or Vellels coming from thence, or other Places in the Mediterranean, into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, were pleafed, by their Order in Council of the 7th of

Veffels, which fhould thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the faid Island of Sicily, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days; and that all Ships and Veffels that were then arrived and not unladen, or fhould there-after arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from any other of the Ports in the Mediterranean, fhould make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days. And their Excellencies the Lords Juffices judging it neceflary, for the further preventing the faid Infection from being brought into this Kingdom, to make feveral Alterations and Additions to their faid Order in Council of the 7th of this Instant, do hereby order, with the Advice of his Majefty's Privy Council, That all Ships or Veffels already arrived and not yet unladen, and all Ships or Veffels which shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from or through the Mediterranean, (except the Island of Sicily) do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days; and all fuch Ships and Veffels as are arrived and not yet unladen, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the faid Ifland of Sicily, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days; which respective Times are to be reckoned from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing such Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places for performing Quarantine by fuch Ships and Veffels bound to the Rivers of Thames and Medway, be *Standgate Creek* on the South Shore of the River Medway, oppofite to the Ifle of Grain; *Sharpfleet Creek*, and the lower End of the *Hope*: And by fuch Ships and Veffels coming into any other of the Ports of Great Britain, be fuch Places as fhall be appointed by the Officers of his Majefty's Cuftoms in fuch Ports, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the fame,

That until and during the Time for making fuch Quarantine, no Perfon coming, or Goods imported in any fuch Ship or Vessel, shall come on Shore, or be landed in any Place within this Kingdom.

That no Pilots shall go on Board any Ship or Veffel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the fame into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Veffel; which Boat or Veffel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Veffel, so to be conducted, as possible: And if any Pilot or other Perfon shall go on Board such Ship or Veffel, such Pilot or other Perfon shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the fame.

That if, at the Expiration of the Forty Days Quarantine to be performed by any Ship or Veffel that is or fhall be liable thereto, it fhall appear to the Officers of the Cuftoms in the Place where fuch Ship or Veffel fhall be, and the Mafter or other Perfons taking Charge of fuch Ship or Veffel, together with two other Perfons belonging to the faid Ship or Veffel, fhall make Oath **C** before

before the Cuftomer, Comptroller or Collector | Landing any Goods, Seamen, or Paffengers from of the Port where fuch Quarantine shall be performed, or the next Port thereunto, or before any of their Deputies and any one Justice of the Peace near adjoining to fuch Port, that fuch Ship or Vefiel, and all and every Person and Persons therein, have duly performed their Quarantine as aforefaid, and that the Ship or Veffel, and all the Persons on Board, are free from Infection; that then the respective Persons coming in such Ship or Veffel, (a Certificate of fuch Oaths being made by the Perfons before whom the fame fhall be taken) fhall be permitted to go on Shore; but the Goods imported in fuch Ship or Vefiel, together with the Bedding of the Sailors, fhall be landed, opened and aired, and fo remain a Week, and alter may be brought to their Places of Discharge, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw Thrown or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wooll, Cotton Yarn or manufactured, Wooll Raw, or in any wife Wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmenia Wooll, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wooll or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chefts, Thread Stockings, all Goods pack'd with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hatts and Brufhes, Matting and Artificial Flowers: Which the Officers of his Majefty's Cuftoms fhall caufe to remain on Board fuch Ship or Veffel, and not permit to be landed, till an Account thereof shall be given unto their Excellencies in Council, and Orders shall be given concerning the fame.

That the Places for Landing and Airing the Goods imported by fuch Ships or Veffels as are or shall be liable to the Forty Days Quarantine, fhall be fuch Places as fhall be appointed by his Majesty's Officers of the Customs, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the fame.

That whatever Ship or Perfon fhall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Veflel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That fuch Persons as after Quarantine performed fhall be imployed in the Hold of any fuch Ship or Veffel, for the Taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection from Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw Thrown or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wooll, Cotton Yarn or Manufactured, Wooll Raw, or in any Wooll, Cotton wife Wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmenia Wooll, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins and Skins in the Wooll or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chefts, Thread Stockings, all Goods pack'd with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hatts and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers, shall be obliged to perform a New Quarantine of Forty Days.

. That the Captains of every of his Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Veffel coming to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, shall take due Care to prevent the

on Board the fame, until they fhall be put under the Direction of the Officers of his Majefty's Cuftoms.

That the Commissioners, and other Officers of his Majefty's Cuftoms, do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine, before directed, be duly performed.

That the Commanders of his Majefty's Ships of War, as likewife the Commanders of his Majefty's Forts and Garrifons lying near the Sea-Coaft, be aiding and affifting to the faid Officers of his Majefty's Cuftoms in ftopping all fuch Ships as aforefaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in the due Performance thereof. And the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treafury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Mafter-General and the reft of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and his Majefty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. Admirally Office, July 23, 1743. His Majesty's Ships the Monmouth, commanded by Captain Windham, and the Medway, commanded by Captain Cokburne, being on a Cruize off the Canary Iflands, ftood into the Road of Sta Cruz in the Island Gomera, on the 20th of May, in order to deftroy the Forts, and batter the Town. They were fired at from three Forts; but the Ships anchoring within lefs than a quarter of a Mile of them, entirely demolished the Forts, and beat down the greatest Part of the Town, and then put to Sea on their Cruize, having received very little Damage.

Whitehall, July 16, 1743. Whereas fome loofe and diforderly Perfon or Perfons did, in February and March laft, cut down and defiroy great Numbers of young planted Oaks, belonging to Pelfant Reeves, Efg; in the Manor of Aborfield in the County of Berks, and did, on Sunday the Twelfth of June laft, get into the Garden belonging to the Dwelling House of the faid Pelsant Reeves, at Aborfield a-foresaid, and took away and destroyed great Quanti-ties of Fruit, and other Things of Value; And did also on the 19th of the said Month of June come to the said House with the same felonious Intent, but were prevented from doing any further Mischief: In order to the discovering and bringing to Pun shment the Per-sons concerned in the said Crimes, their Excellencies the Lords Juffices are pleased to promise his Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any Person concerned therein, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
