P R E S E N T,

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

Whereas upon Information given to their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council, that the Island of Sicily was visited with the Plague, their Excellencies, in order to prevent the Infection being brought by Ships or Vessels coming from thence, or other Places in the Mediterranean, into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, were pleased, by their Order in Council of the 7th of this Instant, to order, that all Ships or Vessels then arrived and not unladen, and all Ships and Vessels, which should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the said Island of Sicily, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days; and that all Ships and Vessels that were then arrived and not unladen, or should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from any other of the Ports in the Mediterranean, should make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days. And their Excellencies the Lords Justices judging it necessary, for the further preventing the said Infection from being brought into this Kingdom, to make several Alterations and Additions to their said Order in Council of the 7th of this Instant, do hereby order, with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, That all Ships or Vessels already arrived and not yet unladen, and all Ships or Vessels which shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from or through the Mediterranean, (except the Island of Sicily) do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days; and all such Ships and Vessels as are arrived and not yet unladen, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the said Island of Sicily, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days; which respective Times are to be reckoned from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing such Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vessels bound to the Rivers of Thames and Medway, be *Standgate Creek* on the South Shore of the River Medway, opposite to the Isle of Grain; *Sharpfleet Creek*, and the lower End of the *Hope*: And by such Ships and Vessels coming into any other of the Ports of Great Britain, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Officers of his Majesty's Customs in such Ports, who are hereby empowered, and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That until and during the Time for making such Quarantine, no Person coming, or Goods imported in any such Ship or Vessel, shall come

on Shore, or be landed in any Place within this Kingdom.

That no Pilots shall go on Board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel; which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel, so to be conducted, as possible: And if any Pilot or other Person shall go on Board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That if, at the Expiration of the Forty Days Quarantine to be performed by any Ship or Vessel that is or shall be liable thereto, it shall appear to the Officers of the Customs in the Place where such Ship or Vessel shall be, and the Master or other Persons taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, together with two other Persons belonging to the said Ship or Vessel, shall make Oath before the Customhouse, Comptroller or Collector of the Port where such Quarantine shall be performed, or the next Port thereunto, or before any of their Deputies and any one Justice of the Peace near adjoining to such Port, that such Ship or Vessel, and all and every Person and Persons therein, have duly performed their Quarantine as aforesaid, and that the Ship or Vessel, and all the Persons on Board, are free from Infection; that then the respective Persons coming in such Ship or Vessel, (a Certificate of such Oaths being made by the Persons before whom the same shall be taken) shall be permitted to go on Shore; but the Goods imported in such Ship or Vessel, together with the Bedding of the Sailors, shall be landed, opened and aired, and so remain a Week, and after may be brought to their Places of Discharge, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw Thrown or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wooll, Cotton Yarn or manufactured, Wooll Raw, or in any wise Wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wooll, Carpets, Gambles, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wooll or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods pack'd with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hatts and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers: Which the Officers of his Majesty's Customs shall cause to remain on Board such Ship or Vessel, and not permit to be landed, till an Account thereof shall be given unto their Excellencies in Council, and Orders shall be given concerning the same.

That the Places for Landing and Airing the Goods imported by such Ships or Vessels as are or shall be liable to the Forty Days Quarantine, shall be such Places as shall be appointed by his Majesty's

Majesty's Officers of the Customs, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That whatever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as after Quarantine performed shall be employed in the Hold of any such Ship or Vessel, for the Taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection from Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw Thrown or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wooll, Cotton Yarn or Manufactured, Wooll Raw, or in any wise Wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmenia Wooll, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins and Skins in the Wooll or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods pack'd with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hatts and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers, shall be obliged to perform a New Quarantine of Forty Days.

That the Captains of every of his Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, shall take due Care to prevent the Landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of his Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners, and other Officers of his Majesty's Customs, do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine, before directed, be duly performed.

That the Commanders of his Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of his Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea-Coast, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of his Majesty's Customs in stopping all such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in the due Performance thereof. And the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and his Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Petersbourg, July 2. Wednesday last being the Festival of St. Peter, and his Imperial Highness the Great Duke's Name Day, the same was celebrated here with extraordinary Magnificence. It is currently reported, that the Preliminary Articles of Peace were signed some Time ago at Abo by the Russian and Swedish Plenipotentiaries, and that, in Consequence thereof, a Suspension of Hostilities was proclaimed on Board the Russian Fleet of Gallies, lying in Aland Haff, on the 19th past. The Russian Ministers are in hourly Expectation of a Courier from Abo, with the News of the Bishop of Lubeck's being elected Successor to the Crown of Sweden, the Day of Election having been fixed for the 21st past. It is generally believed that her Imperial Majesty intends to return to Moscow the Beginning of next Winter, to go from thence the following

Summer to Kiow to perform her Vows, and afterwards to come back to this City by the Way of Smolensko, Plefco, and Riga.

Stockholm, July 8. On Wednesday, Yesterday and To-Day, the States have met upon the Affair of General Lewenhaupt, whose Friends have made a last Effort to save him, or rather to delay his unhappy Fate. The Point chiefly insisted on, in order to gain Time, was, as we hear, that the States should make a Revision of all the Protocols and Acts of that General's Process: But, after long and very violent Debates, it was resolved, amongst the Nobles, that his Sentence only should be read. As to the three other Orders, they have been unanimous in confirming the Sentence of the Commission and Court Martial, and would not allow of any Representations being made in favour of the said General. M. Degenfeldt, the Hessian Minister, set out from hence, a few Days ago, on his Return to Cassel.

Stockholm, July 12. The Business of the two Generals under Sentence of Death, is what takes up the chief Attention of the Senate and Diet at present. A few Days ago Lieutenant-General Bodenbroke had Notice to prepare himself to die, next Saturday the 16th Instant being fixed for his Execution. Within these few Days his Swedish Majesty has received Petitions from several of the principal Districts of Dalicaria; wherein they acknowledge their Crime, and beg for Mercy.

Naples, July 9. Their Sicilian Majesties returned this Day from Portici, to celebrate the Queen's Birth-day To-morrow in this City; but the Diversions, which were prepared upon this Occasion, and for her Majesty's happy Delivery and Recovery, are suspended upon account of the Plague at Messina, which continues to rage, and has almost desolated that Town. Some Persons have escaped from thence to the opposite Shore of Calabria, and brought the Infection with them into a small Village; but the Place is now surrounded by Guards, to prevent their having any Communication with the Neighbourhood. No Port in Italy, except Venice, will admit of any Vessel from Messina to Quarantine.

Hanau, July 13, O. S. The King has been pleased to promote Brigadiers General Richard Onslow, Francis Fuller, Henry Pulteney, Charles Howard, Philip Bragg, John Huske, Henry Ponsonby, and Charles Frampton, to the Rank of Majors General of his Majesty's Forces.

Hague, July 30. By a Ship just arrived at Rotterdam from Genoa, we have Advice, That upon the 12th Instant Admiral Matthews arrived in the Road of that City very near the Port in his own Ship, accompanied by Six other Ships carrying 70, 80, and 90 Pieces of Cannon, three Bomb Ketches, and two or three other Vessels full of Bombs, &c. and that five other large English Vessels were seen coming in: That the whole City was in so great a Conternation at this Visit, that no Trade was carried on that Day, and all the Soldiers and Gunners were up on the Batteries. That the Admiral sent an Express on Shore to demand two Gallies of the Republick to pilot him into the Port, whenever he should think proper to enter it. That the Town saluted the Flag with 31 Pieces of Cannon from

the Ramparts, but the Admiral did not return the Salute. That there were in the Port of Genoa, behind the Mole, 17 Barks or Xebèques laden with Ammunition for the Spaniards, all which the Admiral had demanded to be delivered up to him; and that, in case of Refusal, he had threatened to bombard the Town; but that it was thought the Republick would give up the Xebèques. The Letter adds, that upon the 13th the Genese saluted the English Squadron with 50 Pieces of Cannon, which the Admiral returned with 46.

The second Division follows the first through the same Places at two Days Distance, as the third does the second, the fourth the third, and the fifth the fourth; so that the last Division is to be at Warendorff the 22d of August. The Dutch East-India Company has just lost a new Ship bound from Amsterdam to Batavia, with M. Imhoff, Brother to the Governor of that Name, and his whole Family, on Board, and with a very rich Lading; which Ship was cast away upon the Rocks of Scilly, and not a Man saved.
