P R E S E N T,

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

Whereas upon Information given to their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council, that the Island of Sicily was visited with the Plague, their Excellencies, in order to prevent the Infection being brought by Ships or Vessels coming from thence, or other Places in the Mediterranean, into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, were pleased, by their Order in Council of the 7th of this Instant, to order, that all Ships or Vessels then arrived and not unladen, and all Ships and Vessels, which should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the said Island of Sicily, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days; and that all Ships and Vessels that were then arrived and not unladen, or should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from any other of the Ports in the Mediterranean, should make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days. And their Excellencies the Lords Justices judging it necessary, for the further preventing the said Infection from being brought into this Kingdom, to make several Alterations and Additions to their said Order in Council of the 7th of this Instant, do hereby order, with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, That all Ships or Vessels already arrived and not yet unladen, and all Ships or Vessels which shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from or through the Mediterranean, (except the Island of Sicily) do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days; and all such Ships and Vessels as are arrived and not yet unladen, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the said Island of Sicily, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days; which respective Times are to be reckoned from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the Place appointed for performing such Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vessels bound to the Rivers of

Thames and Medway, be *Standgate Creek* on the South Shore of the River Medway, opposite to the Isle of Grain; *Sharpfleet Creek*, and the lower End of the *Hope*: And by such Ships and Vessels coming into any other of the Ports of Great Britain, be such Places as shall be appointed by the Officers of his Majesty's Customs in such Ports, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That until and during the Time for making such Quarantine, no Person coming, or Goods imported in any such Ship or Vessel, shall come on Shore, or be landed in any Place within this Kingdom.

That no Pilots shall go on Board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel; which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel, so to be conducted, as possible: And if any Pilot or other Person shall go on Board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That if, at the Expiration of the Forty Days Quarantine to be performed by any Ship or Vessel that is or shall be liable thereto, it shall appear to the Officers of the Customs in the Place where such Ship or Vessel shall be, and the Master or other Persons taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, together with two other Persons belonging to the said Ship or Vessel, shall make Oath before the Customer, Comptroller or Collector of the Port where such Quarantine shall be performed, or the next Port thereunto, or before any of their Deputies and any one Justice of the Peace near adjoining to such Port, that such Ship or Vessel, and all and every Person and Persons therein, have duly performed their Quarantine as aforesaid, and that the Ship or Vessel, and all the Persons on Board, are free from Infection; that then the respective Persons coming in such Ship or Vessel, (a Certificate of such Oaths being made by the Persons before whom the same shall be taken) shall be permitted to go on Shore;

Shore; but the Goods imported in such Ship or Vessel, together with the Bedding of the Sailors, shall be landed, opened and aired, and so remain a Week, and after may be brought to their Places of Discharge, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw Thrown or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wooll, Cotton Yarn or manufactured, Wooll Raw, or in any wise Wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wooll, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wooll or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods pack'd with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hatts and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers: Which the Officers of his Majesty's Customs shall cause to remain on Board such Ship or Vessel, and not permit to be landed, till an Account thereof shall be given unto their Excellencies in Council, and Orders shall be given concerning the same.

That the Places for Landing and Airing the Goods imported by such Ships or Vessels as are or shall be liable to the Forty Days Quarantine, shall be such Places as shall be appointed by his Majesty's Officers of the Customs, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That whatever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as after Quarantine performed shall be employed in the Hold of any such Ship or Vessel, for the taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection from Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk Raw Thrown or Wrought, Linnen, Cotton Wooll, Cotton Yarn or Manufactured, Wooll Raw, or in any wise Wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair Yarn, human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wooll, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins and Skins in the Wooll or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods pack'd with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hatts and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers, shall be obliged to perform a New Quarantine of Forty Days.

That the Captains of every of his Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, shall take due Care to prevent the Landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of his Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners, and other Officers of his Majesty's Customs, do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine, before directed, be duly performed.

That the Commanders of his Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of his Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea-Coast, be aiding and assisting to the said Officers of his Majesty's Customs in stopping all such

Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for the Performance of their Quarantine, and in the due Performance thereof. And the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and his Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

*Naples, July 9, N. S.* The last Letters from the Government of Messina, which are dated the 19th of last Month, bring Advice, That the Plague continues raging there in a most dreadful Manner; that the Confusion and Terrors of the People were not to be described; that the Number of dead Bodies in the Streets and the publick Places was so much increased, that Eight Carts were not sufficient to carry them off; that the Government had released the Galley Slaves, and had appointed them to bury the Dead, but that the greatest Part of them had sicken'd thereupon, and died; that those who had escaped Death, were not able to undergo so dangerous a Fatigue above a Day and a half, declaring they had rather be executed than continue in that Employment, and thereby greatly terrified such as had been able to support the sad Spectacle of so many dead Bodies that were abandoned and mangled by the Dogs; that there were five or six Curiares, and 40 Vicars, dead, who had attended the Sick in their last Moments, and that afterwards several of the regular Priests, who had been willing to succeed them in that Office, had shared the same Fate; that no Religious Services could any longer be performed, and that there were not any Servants, Chaplains or Surgeons left in the Hospitals; in short, that there was not either Spiritual or Temporal Comfort to be had; that the Troops had suffered considerably from the Rigour of the Plague; that the Hospital in the Lazarette had been set apart for them, and that although the Governor had taken all possible Care to redress so many Calamities, yet, in the Confusion in which every Thing was, there daily escaped some Person or other, who had been appointed to execute the Governor's Orders. In this Kingdom two Accidents have lately happened, which have occasioned great Uneasiness. The first is, That in the exterior Calabria, in the Terra de Fossa, which joins the State of Bagnura, from the 25th of the last Month to the 2d Instant, 14 Persons died, and upon some of them very suspicious Marks were found. It was supposed, that some Persons had stolen away privately from Messina, and landed there: As soon as this was known, the Magistrates of Health, and chiefly the President of Cantunzaro, ordered very streight Barriers to be erected there, and set a Guard of 300 of the Inhabitants over them. But upon the 28th a Man escaped, and being pursued by the Guards, ran into a Chapel, in which the Day following he was found dead;

dead; and that no one might touch him, the Chapel and the Body were both burnt. The Inhabitants of that Neighbourhood have been ordered to leave their Houses, stript naked, and lodged in a Barrack erected for that Purpose, where they are furnished with Cloaths and Provisions. The Guards have been doubled, and Orders have been given to erect a second Barrier inclosing the first, which has been pallisaded; that if any Person should escape the first, he may be stopt by the second; and a third is also erecting, which is to reach quite across the Country from Squillacee to St. Euphemia, and separate all this Kingdom from the Province of Catanzaro. The other Accident is, that in the Terra de Palmi, certain Persons landed in the Night out of a little Bark from Faro, who having clamber'd over a Mountain, which was thought inaccessible, were stopped and shut up together, though they all continue as yet in good Health: But a Prosecution is preparing against them, and the King has been petitioned to give Leave to the President of that Jurisdiction to proceed against them by the Rules of War. They continue at this Place to use all necessary Precautions for preventing the Communication of the Infection.

*Hanau, July 18, O. S.* Prince Charles of Lorraine, accompanied by Marshal Khevenhuller, Prince Esterhafi, and M. Wafner, arrived here on the 15th Instant, about Two in the Afternoon; his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland immediately sent a Message to compliment him thereupon, which the Prince returned by Lieutenant-General Browne. Then the Nobility and General Officers paid their Compliments to his Highness upon the same Occasion; and about Seven he went to the Palace in the Old City to wait upon the King, and was introduced to his Majesty by the Right Hon. the Earl of Holderness the Lord of the Bed-chamber in waiting. His Highness was received by his Majesty in the most gracious Manner, and staid at Court till about half an Hour past Eight, and then returned, accompanied by his Excellency the Earl of Stair and Marshal Khevenhuller. The next Day, about Five in the Afternoon, the King, accompanied by Prince Charles of Lorraine, Princes William, George, and Frederick of Hesse, Field Marshals Stair, Khevenhuller, Neipperg, and Prince Esterhafi, and the greatest Part of the Generals of the combined Army, together with several of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, went from hence to the Camp, where the whole Army was drawn up at the Head of the respective Lines, and rode from the Left of the Front Line to the Right, and then to the Right of the Second Line, and passed on to the Left of the same; when, after having reviewed the Whole, his Majesty returned to the Castle, and expressed his entire Satisfaction at the fine Appearance they made, as did also the several Persons of Distinction above mentioned. Prince Charles dined with the King this Day, and having taken his Leave of his Majesty about Four, set out for the Austrian Army, now encamped in the Mar-graviat of Dourlach.

*Whitehall, July 27, 1743.*

This Day arrived Lieutenant Bonnefoy, with Dispatches from Vice-Admiral Matthews, dated on board the Namur in Genoa Road the 6th Instant, O. S. giving an Account, That he, the Vice-Admiral, having had Intelligence that a Spanish Bark and 14 Shebecks bound for Genoa with Artillery and Ammunition for the Use of the Forces of that Crown in Italy, had been chased by his Majesty's Ship the Kennington, but escaped by Means of a Calm and Night coming on, and got safe into the Harbour of Genoa, where they had been permitted to land their Powder; he did thereupon himself on the 26th of June set Sail from Hieres Road with the King's Ships the Namur, Barfleur, Norfolk, Princess Caroline, Ipswich, Revenge, and three Bomb Vessels, and arrived on the 1st Instant in the Road of Genoa, and that the Day following, the Senate having deputed some of their Body to compliment him upon his Arrival, he had acquainted them with the Motives of his coming thither, and demanded, that the said Bark and Shebecks, with their Stores and Artillery, should either forthwith be obliged to depart out of that Port, in order to pursue their Voyage, they having pretended to have been driven in there only by Strefs of Weather, or that upon their refusing to do so, the Republick should sequester the said Stores and Artillery, in such Manner that they should not be returned to the King of Spain, his Ministers or Agents, before the Conclusion of a Peace. And that after some Conferences, the Deputies from the Senate having obtained a full Power for that Purpose, had agreed with the Vice-Admiral upon the Terms of a Convention for depositing the said Spanish Stores and Artillery in the Castle of Bonifacio in the Island of Corfica, till the End of the War, and had signed the same on the 6<sup>th</sup> Instant with the said Vice-Admiral, as Plenipotentiary from his Majesty; a Translation of which Convention is here inserted.

*Translation of the Convention signed at Genoa, the 17th of July 1743, N. S. by Vice-Admiral Matthews, with the Deputies of the Senate of Genoa.*

WHEREAS his Excellency Vice-Admiral Matthews, his Britannick Majesty's Plenipotentiary to the Princes of Italy, and Commander in Chief of his Naval Force in the Mediterranean hath made the most strong and pressing Remonstrances, concerning the Entry which hath been granted into the Port of Genoa, to the Bark and to the 14 Shebecks, which came from the Ports of Spains, laden with Artillery and Powder for the Service of his Catholick Majesty, and concerning the Protection which the said Vessels enjoy there, to the great Prejudice of his Britannick Majesty and his Allies: And whereas the said Vice-Admiral hath declared, that the King his Master could not but look upon the longer Stay of the said Artillery and Ammunition in the said Port, as an Infringement of that exact and impartial Neutrality which the Republick of Genoa hath engaged to observe with all the Powers now at War; the most Serene Republick being

being equally desirous to make more and more known to his Britannick Majesty, the Sincerity of her Conduct and Intentions, and to remove every Motive to that dangerous Resentment, the immediate Execution of which the said Vice-Admiral hath more than once threatened, and to obviate the terrible Disorders which she has Reason to apprehend from thence, hath, thro' the Means of her magnificent Patricians, the Sieurs Augustin Grimaldi, and Jean François Brignoli, her Deputies, sufficiently authorized for that Purpose, consented to the Draught prepared by the said Vice-Admiral Matthews, the Conditions of which are as follow.

1. That all the Cannon and Artillery whatsoever brought from the Ports of Spain, which now are in the Spanish Bark and 14 Shebecks now lying in the Port of Genoa, shall be taken out of the said Bark and Shebecks, and immediately put on board neutral Vessels, and be transported to Bonifacio in the Kingdom of Corfica.

2. That all the Powder which was brought by the said Bark, and the said 14 Shebecks, and which is now on Shore at Genoa, shall also be put on board neutral Vessels, and transported at the same Time with the Artillery, to Bonifacio in the Kingdom of Corfica.

3. That his Excellency Vice-Admiral Matthews shall give a sufficient Convoy of the Vessels of his Britannick Majesty for the Security of the said Imbarcation and Transport.

4. That upon the Arrival of the said Imbarcation at Bonifacio, the Artillery and the Powder shall all be deposited in the Castle of that Town, in the Presence of the Officers which the Vice-Admiral shall name for that Purpose, as also in the Presence of an Officer or Commissary on the Part of Spain, in case the Minister of his Catholick Majesty residing at Genoa shall desire it.

5. That the most Serene Republick of Genoa shall always keep a sufficient Garrison in the said Place, and that she shall protect and defend the said Artillery and Ammunition against all Powers whatever, that might attempt to take them away from the said Fortrefs of Bonifacio, as far as she shall be able; and in Case of an Attack, or upon the least Suspicion of Violence, the most Serene Republick engages to give immediate Notice, either by herself, or some of her commanding Officers in Corfica, to the British Consul residing at Genoa, as also to the said Vice-Admiral, or the Commander of the Fleet of his Britannick Majesty in the Road of Hyeres.

6. That all necessary Diligence and Expedition shall be used towards the Execution of the said Embarkation, and the depositing of the said Artillery and Ammunition in the Castle of Bonifacio, where the whole shall remain in the Hands, and under the Care of the most Serene Republick of Genoa, till such Time as the present War in Italy is determined by a definitive Peace, without any Part thereof returning, or being restored to those of his Catholick Majesty till that Time, upon any Pretence whatever.

7. That in Consideration of the above-said Conditions, the Spanish Bark and Shebecks which

now are in the Port of Genoa shall have full Liberty to go out of it, at what Time, and to what Places they shall think fit, without any Ship belonging to the King of Great Britain under the Command of the said Vice-Admiral, being allowed to molest them in any Manner, or to follow them for the Space of Twenty-four Hours after their leaving the said Port of Genoa.

In Witness whereof the ab e-mentioned magnificent Patricians the Sieurs Augustin Grimaldi, and Jean François Brignoli, Deputies of the most Serene Republick, by virtue of the Power wherewith they are invested for that Purpose, have signed and sealed the present Convention, a Duplicate of which shall also be signed and sealed by his Excellency the above-mentioned Vice-Admiral, in Proof of his Acceptance thereof. Done on board the Winchelsea in the Port of Genoa, the 17th of July 1743, N. S.

Vice-Admiral Matthews adds, that upon the Account which he had received of the raging of the Plague at Messina, he had given the strictest Orders for preventing any of the Ships under his Command from visiting or approaching any Ship or Vessels coming from infected Places; and that he had sent Directions to Leghorne for the Folkestone Man of War, which was gone in quest of a Spanish Privateer that had taken several of our Ships in the Archipelago, that she should upon her Return immediately repair to Minorca, there to perform a strict Quarantine, without joining him, or any of the Ships of his Majesty's Squadron, in case she should have touched at Malta, or on the Coast of Calabria, and so have come back to Leghorne thro' the Fare of Messina; all which Precautions he had judged necessary for preventing the communicating of the Infection to the Squadron under his Command, which hitherto continued to be perfectly healthy.

*Whereas it hath been represented to their Excellencies the Lords Justices, that several private Men, belonging to his Majesty's Regiment of Foot under the Command of Hugh Lord Sempill, had concealed themselves in the Highlands, when the Regiment was ordered to march for South Britain, or had deserted before the Arrival of the Regiment in Nottinghamshire; and that such Deserters had expressed their Concern for deserting his Majesty's Service, and most humbly prayed they might be pardoned upon their Return to their Duty with the Regiment; Their Excellencies are therefore pleased to promise his Majesty's most gracious Pardon to all such Deserters as aforesaid, who shall return to their Duty and surrender themselves to Lieutenants John Mackenzie, Alexander Macdonald, George Ramsay, or either of them, now employed on the Recruiting Service for the said Regiment, on or before the 10th Day of September next.*

## LINCOLN RACES.

HIS Majesty's Plate of One Hundred Guineas will be Run for on Tuesday the 6th Day of September next, on the Round Course on the South Side of Lincoln, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, being no more than Six Years old last Grass, carrying Twelve Stone, three Heats: To be shewn and entered at the Nag's Head at Waddington on Monday the 5th of September in the Evening, before they run. And if any Difference shall arise, either in Betting or Running, the same shall be determined by his Grace the Duke of Ancaster, or whom he shall appoint, according to such his Majesty's Orders, which shall be then and there produced.

On Wednesday the 7th will be run for on the same Course, the City's Plate, a Purse of Fifty Pounds, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, that never won a Plate or Purse before, and no more than Five Years old last Grass, as must be certified under the Hands of the Breeders; to carry Ten Stone, three Heats, four Miles each Heat, and to pay three Guineas Entrance; the Stakes to go to the second best Horse, &c. for this Plate to be shewn and entered at Mr. Bateman's, at the Red Lyon below the Hill in Lincoln, on Monday the 5th of September, betwixt the Hours of Six and Twelve in the Forenoon.
