Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

Whereas their Excellencies the Lords Justices, by their Order in Council of the 21st of last Month, did Direct and Require, that all Ships and Vessels coming into any of the Ports of this Kingdom from or through the Mediterranean, and bound to the Rivers Thames and Medway, should perform their Quarantine either in Standgate Creek, Sharpfleet Creek, or the lower End of the Hope: And whereas it hath been this Day represented to their Excellencies at this Board, that the Hope is not a proper Place for that Purpose, in regard great Numbers of Foreign Ships, Coasters, Fishing-Vessels, &c. are constantly passing and repassing, insomuch that it is very difficult, or hardly possible to prevent their having Communication with the Ships and People under Quarantine there, and that Standgate Creek is the most convenient Place, as being more retired, and free from the above-mentioned Inconveniencies, as also capable to contain a greater Number of Ships than can be expected to arrive at any one Time; Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council are therefore hereby pleased to order, that Standgate Creek, on the South Shore of the River Medway, opposite to the Isle of Grain, be from henceforth the only Place where Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, bound to the Rivers Thames and Medway, are to perform their Quarantine. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

G O D save the KING.

Petersbourg, July 23. Last Wednesday Night the Empress came to Town from Peterhoff, to see a new Palace which is finishing with all possible Expedition for her Imperial Majesty's Residence, she intending to celebrate here the Festival of the Peace on the 25th of the next Month, for which great Preparations are making. Her Majesty returned Yesterday Morning to Peterhoff. On Tuesday next Prince Sherbatow is to set out for Hanover, with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from her Imperial Majesty to the King of Great Britain.

Stockholm, July 29. The Nobles came to the Resolution, in the Plenum on Tuesday last, to send a Deputation to the three other Orders, to intercede in Favour of General Lowenhaupt, but the Clergy and Peasants absolutely refused mitigating the Sentence pronounced upon him; so that the necessary Preparations are making for that General's Execution To-morrow.

Stockholm, August 2. Last Saturday, being the Day appointed for General Count Lowenhaupt's Execution, several Detachments of the Horse and Foot Guards were posted round the Scaffold, as is usual on such Occasions. The Executioner was likewise there; but when the Detachment, ordered to conduct the said General to the Place of Execution, came to receive him, they were told he had, the same Morning, made his Escape through a Hole that had been cut under his Bed, and led into an Apartment which belongs to Major General Wrangel, the Colonel of the Guards. He was out of Town, but a Person, with whom he always leaves the Keys, and who is gone off with General Lowenhaupt, was persuaded to come into this Contrivance, in order to save the condemned General. This Affair raises a great and general Murmuring here. Two Nights before General Lowenhaupt made his Escape, he was allowed to be without a Guard in his Room.

Vienna, August 14, N. S. The Queen of Hungary was safely delivered Yesterday in the Afternoon of a Princess.

Hague, August 23. By Letters from the Empire we have an Account, that the British Army

Army was still at Biberich the 19th Instant; that Marshal Noailles was retiring from the Banks of the Rhine to post-himself between Landau and the Spirebach; and that M. Mentzel, with his Body of Hussars, was reported to have penetrated quite to the Saar. They mention likewise that Prince Charles had advanced up the Rhine as far as Newenburg.
