Whitby, Offeb. 11.

Yesterday and this day, his Holiness, according to his usual custom, gave Audience to the several Ambassadors, and other Forreign Ministers.

Venice, sept. 30. A Corsair of Dulcigno having lately meea Vessel on the Coast of Naples belonging to Dalmatia, and manned with the Subjects of this State, they not only feized the Veffel, but very barbaroufly murchered the Men, tying them two and two together, and so throwing them overboard into the Sea; which adhumane usage has provoked our Captain of the Gulfa, to use the Time cruelry towards them, having fince taken tour of those Corfairs, and Treated them in like fort; the Christian Galleys continue to do the Tunks great damages, infomuch that a Vessel cannor pass the Archip lago, withoutfalling into their hands; The Grand Signior upon the reiterared Complaints of the Merchanes, hath resolved to ser out a very great Fleet of Galleys, and hath sent his Mandate to all the Corfairs of Barbary, to fit out their Galleys, in or-der to the joyning them With his Fleet, but they flave, it is faid zilefmed to be excused.
