AT the Council Chamber *Whitehall*, the 11th Day of *August* 1743.

P R E S E N T,

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

Whereas their Excellencies the Lords Justices, by their Order in Council of the 21st of last Month, did Direct and Require, that all Ships and Vessels coming into any of the Ports of this Kingdom from or through the Mediterranean, and bound to the Rivers Thames and Medway, should perform their Quarantine either in Standgate Creek, Sharpfleet Creek, or the lower End of the Hope: And whereas it hath been this Day represented to their Excellencies at this Board, that the Hope is not a proper Place for that Purpose, in regard great Numbers of Foreign Ships, Coasters, Fishing-Vessels, &c. are constantly passing and repassing, insomuch that it is very difficult, or hardly possible to prevent their having Communication with the Ships and People under Quarantine there, and that Standgate Creek is the most convenient Place, as being more retired, and free from the above-mentioned Inconveniencies, as also capable to contain a greater Number of Ships than can be expected to arrive at any one Time; Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council are therefore hereby pleased to order, that Standgate Creek, on the South Shore of the River Medway, opposite to the Isle of Grain, be from henceforth the only Place where Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, bound to the Rivers Thames and Medway, are to perform their Quarantine. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Petersbourg, July 26. On Sunday Night her Imperial Majesty returned from Peterhoff to her Residence in the Summer Palace in this City, and was followed Yesterday by his Imperial Highness the Great Duke and the whole Court. There is a Report in Town, that the Fleet at Revel, under the Command of Count Gollowin, is gone out to Sea again.

Stockholm, August 5, O. S. Several Persons having been sent towards the Sea Coasts, with Orders to make a strict Search into all Boats or Vessels which should pass by, and in Case General Count Lowenhaupt should be found in any of them, to secure him and bring him back

to Stockholm, an Express came on Wednesday Morning last, with Advice, that the said General, disguised in a Sailor's Habit, had been found and taken by Captain Graman, in a little Yacht, as it was carrying him on board a Privateer that lay at the Dahlers. The same Day in the Afternoon, the General was brought back to Town, and the next Day was led, under a strong Guard, to the Place of Execution, and beheaded, pursuant to the Sentence pronounced upon him. His own Servant, and that of Major General Wrangel, who had help'd him to make his Escape, have likewise been taken and committed to Prison.

Mentz, Aug. 20, N. S. All the News we have from Prince Charles's Army, is, that his Hussars have passed and repassed the Rhine two or three Times. Part of them engaged a Body of the French, to give an Opportunity to the rest to fall upon their Baggage in their Rear, which they plundered.

Mentz, August 21, N. S. Our Army has begun to pass the Rhine this Morning. The Hanoverians will have all passed over this Day on the three Bridges which we have laid. The British will pass To-morrow, as well as the Hessians. The Baggage and Artillery will be all over the Rhine before Saturday Night. His Majesty will take up his Head Quarters at the Grand Chartreux, if it can be made convenient for his Reception, To-morrow or Friday. We had Letters from Prince Charles Yesterday of the 16th Instant, N. S. from his Head Quarters between Fribourg and Brisach, and he gives us Reason to think that he will be able in a few Days to pass the Rhine. He will have a Train of Great Artillery with him, which he takes from Fribourg.

Copenhagen, Aug. 20, N. S. The Charlotta Amalia, a Ship belonging to the Danish Asiatick Company, is arrived here from Tranquebar; and the Sleswick, a Ship from China, about which the Company was in some Pain, is daily expected in this Road, having appear'd, 'tis said, upon the Coast of Norway. This is all the News stirring here at present, but the Scene is like to grow more busy very soon, the Preparations for War being earnestly carried on, with an Intent, to all Appearance, of beginning to act still before Winter.

Hambourg, Aug. 21. The Senators Lowen and Wrangel are expected here within a few Days, as Deputies from the Swedish Diet, to accompany the newly appointed Successor to that Crown to Stockholm. In the mean while, several Swedes arrive here daily to make their Court to that Prince.
