Petersbourg, July 30.

Plot has been discovered forme Days ago, in which some Persons of Diftinction are faid to be involved, and particularly two Ladies of the first Rank and Quality, namely, Madam Lapuchin, and Countels Jagolinsky (lately married to the Grand Marshal Bestouchess,) who are both Ladies of the Bed Chamber. By what has been discovered, it has been judg'd sufficient to fecure their Perfons, and to appoint a Commiffion, confifting of three Perfons of Diftinction, namely, the Inquifitor General Ufhakoff, the Attorney General Prince Trobetskouy, and Privy Counfellor Leftocq, to examine them, and to make their Report to her Imperial Majefty. Her Majefty has fignified her Pleafure to the Grand Marshal, that he should remain in the Country until his Lady has been examined, and her Cafe determined.

Stockholm, August 9, O. S. Senators Lowen and Wrangel, who are named to go to the Prince Royal of Sweden with a formal Notification of his Election, and to bring his Royal Highnels over, fet out this Morning on their Journey to Hamburgh by the Way of Yfted and Stralfund. Mefl. Palmfelt and Frederichfdoif, two of the King of Sweden's Lords of the Bed-chamber, are joined to this Commiffion. Several Regiments are commanded to march towards Scania and Gottenbourg, in or-

der to observe the Motions of the Danes. Vienna, August 17. Colonel Trenck with his Pandours, has laid fome Villages in Alface under Contribution, and burnt some others. He passed the Rhine with thirty Pandours and two Pieces of Cannon in Imall Boats, and fummoned the Town of new Brilac to furrender. Whereupon the Governor fent out a Battallion against him, and the Pandours drawing themfelves up in Order of Battle, received the French Fire lying on their Bellies, and after having returned it, fell upon them Sword in Hand, and drove them into the Town. They took under the Ramparts 40 Oxen, and put them into their Boats, three of them jump'd into the River, but three Pandours fwam after them; and brought them with the reft to the Army. Sometime after Colonel Trenck pafled the Rhine again with 130 Pandours, and met 80 French Horie, of which he killed 72, and carried off a Standard and a good Convoy of Provisions. We expect foon to hear that Prince Charles will have palled the Rhine at or near Bafil. The Queen continues as well as poffible.

Mayence, August 19, N.S. On Friday last, Alarm, on Account of a Spanish, or rather about Six in the Evening, the Elector of Ments, French Privateer, which was seen and spoke Mayence, August 19, N. S. On Friday laft, attended by the Officers of his Court, went to

Biberich, and was received by his Britannick Majefty at the Door of the Grand Sallon; where his Royal Highness the Duke, the Nobility, and General Officers were present, and all the Officers of the Court in their proper Stations. His Electoral Highness conferred with his Majefty about 20 Minutes in the Circle, and then took his Leave, and returned to his Palace in this City. On Sunday last his Electoral Highness gave a magnificent Entertainment to his Excellency the Earl of Stair, feveral of the Nobility and General Officers, at the Favourite, a Summer Seat fituate opposite to the Junction of the Mayne and Rhine, about a Quarter of an Eng-lish Mile from this City. Yesterday Brigadier-General Bland, Quarter-Master General to the British Army, and Colonel Robinson, Deputy Quarter - Master General, marked out the Ground for the Encampment of the Troops near this City.

Mentz, August 23, N.S. Yesterday in the Afternoon the three Battalions of British Guards passed the Rhine; the Cavalry, and the rest of the Infantry, as also the Heffians, are now in Motion to follow, and will all be over this Af-The King came from Biberich about ternoon. Seven to the Chartreuse, as did also his Royal Highness the Duke. We have no farther Accounts of Prince Charles's Army fince the 16th, and it is generally believed that he will meet with great Opposition in passing the Rhine, the French Army in Alface regulating their Motions on the Banks of that River according to his Marches and Counter-marches; and it is faid that Prince Charles has given Orders to the Huffars, Pandours and Croats, amounting to about 15,000 Men, to march to Bafil in order to pass the Rhine over the Stone Bridge there.

Copenbagen, August 24. The Danish Fleet is now drawn out into the Road, the Troops seem to be just upon the Point of taking the Field, and the common Talk is of a Camp to be foreedly formed in the Neighbourhood of to be fpeedily formed in the Neighbourhood of Elienore. An Embargo is laid in this Port upon Shipping, and about 400 Transports are already ftopped; as many more, it is faid, are wanted. Count Daneskiold proposes in a few Days to hout his Flag, and to take upon him the Command of the Fleet.

Hague, August 30. We have Letters in Town from Cologn, wrote just upon the Departure of the Post of the 27th Instant, which Report, pretty confidently, that Prince Charles pass'd the Rhine on Saturday last, after having repuls'd the French who opposed him with Loss.
