The Troops of Lythuania are not yet come up and joyned with those of this Crown; but only expect Order to to do, being within fome few Leagues of the place of Rendezvous ; upon their arrival there, it is faid we shall have an Army of 40000 Men together, with which we may be able to make fome confiderable attempt upon the Turks, notwithflanding they have taken the Allarm, and begin now to put themselves in the best posture of defence they can'; The Baffa of Caminice, as we hear, by fome perfons come from thence, feems to expect, that that place will'be ere long attacked, and is accordingly providing for it. The Queen is on her way hither again.

Hamburg, Off. 13. From Stockholm they writes that General Wrangel being now perfectly recovered of the great fit of Sicknefs, which he has had for thefe feveral months paft, is now preparing to pafs the Sea, to go to his Government of Pomerants. That their Majesties are at prefent with the Court in Oeland where the King diverts himfelf with Hunting, being extreamly pleased with the Progress he hath hitherto made. From Copenhagen we hear, that the Fleet of Merchantmen which lately failed out of the Sound, had by bad weather been forced back again, two of their company, a Dane and a Flemming having been caft away. All our Greenland Ships are now come home, except one, which was loft. We are here mightily taken up with difcourfes concerning the motions of the two Armies now on the Main ; fome fay, that the intention of the Imperialists is not to hazard a Battel, but to endeavor to to befet the passages, as to keep the French from being fupplyed with all kind of necessaries, but others affure us, that there begins to be already great want of Victuals amongst the Imperialiss, of which the French have good ftore, and that they are fo far from being, able to itraighten the French, that they themfelves will ere long

be reduced to great neceflities. Francfors, Off. 11.
