From Ladenburgh we have advice that so omench, who came from Philipsburgh, intend to p is the e 'er there to morrow, and fo vill contin it their march in order to their joyning with Monsieur de Turense who lies still quariered with his Forces all along the Mrin, from Wertheim as far as Alchaffenburg; Ti e Imperialits begin now to come very near us, some Troops have at present their Quarters at Bischophian; the Margais de Grana is still here, having made feveral Propositions to our Magistrates concerning the supplying the Imperial Army with Provifions, Ore.

Utrecht, Offeb. 19. On Sunday lastarrived a Trumpeter from the Prince of Orange, to release the remaining Dutch Prisoners here, which having done, he parted again with them the Tuesday following; the same day the Duke of Lux-nburgh returned hither from Amerifort, having with him a Convoy of 800 Foot, and two Troops of Horse; and yesterday he went hence again for Nim negen, between which place and Grave we are told of a confiderable Body of Men that are now together there. The Prince of Orange Marched the 16 instant very early in the Morning from Herentale, where he had Lodged fines the 12, he paffed through the Mayery of the Boich towards Vento, but how he will farther proceed from thence, we cannot yet certainly learn; In the mean time the Dutch report, that he will march towards the Electorate of Cologue, to joyn the Imperial Army, or at least with a Party of 6000 Men, who are to be fent down by General Montecucuti; but this we look upon as altogether improbable, for that Monsieur de Turenne keeps too strict an Eye upon him, to let him take so great a march with the whole Army; and on the other fide, that Monte cuculi will not fo considerably weaken himself as to spire 6000 Men, since with the Force he now his, he thinks it not fale to venture a Battle with the French, Our last Letters from Monsieur de Tu eane told us ; that he lay still Encamped with his Forces from Wertheim to Aschiffenbourg, all along the Main; that his Army confilted of 27 or 28000 brive fighting Men, and they in very good Order and Discipline, and desirouse o nothing more then to Fi ht the Enemy.

H e'c, Oct. 19. Our last Letters from the Prince of Orange veredated the 17 instant, and told us, that having lodged the 15 at Herentals, and there joyned 1500 Spanish Horse, and some Insantry, Commandetiby the Marquis d'Assentar, Maistre de Camp General of the Spanish Neatherlands; the next Morning the 16, his Highness broke up from thence, his Army confishing of about 20 thousand Men, and passed through Eindhouen, and the Mayrie of the Bosch, towards Vento, where he will arrive this day, and pass the Meuse to morrow, and so continue, as is said here, his way towards the Electorate of Cologne. Letters from Bruffels tell us, that there had not been any Placaet Published, for the Declating War against the French, but that the Count de Monterey their Governor, had himself said to several persons of his Court totat it was resolved to use all Hostilities against the French, and to look upon them as Declared Enemies, and that at Animerp, and other places, had been Publithed a Placaet by the Governors, to give Notice thereof. In the mean time we hear, that several Parties have been sent out by the Count de Monterey, to ravage in the French Territories, and particularly one of 1000 Horse, Commanded by the Prince de Vaudemont,

who as they give out at Bruffels, lad been as far as Ach, and taken some Prisoners under the Walis of that place, and fo having made a Bravado, returned again with what speed they bould. We now hear, that the States of Molland have nominated Monfieur Schaep, one of the Secretaries of Amsferdam, to go Envoy Extraordinary to the Crown of Sucden, which choice we expect the States General will confirm this day. The States are yet employed about raising of Money for the Expences of the next Year, being not able to agree about the manner of raifing it. They have revoked the permillion they lately gave for the free palfage of Boats, between these Territories and the French Conquelts, because of the great inconvenience they find occasioned thereby, and especially, that segives the Enemy an opportunity to hold a Correspondence with wish all our Garrisous. From Utrecht they write, that the Duke of Luxembureb was returned thither, and had caused a review to be made of the Garrison there, which was composed of 4000 Swiffes and 5000 French.

Amster 12m, Oft. 20. All our men of War who were abroad this Summer, are now laid up, except fome few of the smalleit, who are designed to be kept at Sea this winter, to guard our Coasts and convoy our Merchantmen. One of the Secretaries of this place, Monsieur Schaep by Name, is designed for sweden; we do not yet learn the occasion of his going, farther, then that it is faid, he is to endeavor to diffwade that Crown, from complying with the Treaty made the last year with his most Christian Majesty, though we have little reafon to promise our felves any success in it, for that Government hath on all occisions declared their sledfashness to perform what was stipulated by that Treaty, and some advises tell us, that their Forces are already drawing into a Body, in order to the joyning them with the French, as well to make good the faid Treaty, as to render their Mediation at Cologne the more effectual, which hitherto hath wanted the good effect, that might have been expected, through the obstinacy of the Dutch. The Prince of Orange passed the 17 instant through Einshouen, on his murch towards Vento, where he intended to pass the Meuse yesterday.

Tarmouth, Off. 17. Yellerday morning the Greyhound Fregat brought in the Caper, which we have already told you, she had taken off of this place; the Caper was a square stern Fregat, mounted with 16 Guns and 66 Men, which are all come ashoar, except 6 or 7 that were killed, and 3 or 4 wounded. The Grey hound

had one man killed and one wounded.
