Petersbourg, August 29.

ER Imperial Majefty has lately declared her Intention of going to Mofcow the latter End of November, or the Beginning of December; and it is supposed that the Foreign Ministers will follow her Majefty thither.

Lisbon, September 18. His Portuguese Majefty sets out for the Baths To-morrow; and as he is better now than he has been fince his first Seizure, the Court flatter themselves his Majesty will receive great Benefit from this Journey.

Spire, Sept. 23, O. S. Yefterday Morning a Detachment of Twelve hundred Cavalry, and as many Foot, were commanded to Gemmerscheim, in order to cover the Peasants from the adjacent Villages, who were employed in demolishing the Lines that were lately raised by the French upon the Queiche, and the faid Lines were accordingly demolished in the Evening, which his Majetty went himself to see compleated : And this Morning the faid Detachment returned to our Camp here.

Hamburgh, Oct. 2. The Prince Augustus of Holstein arrived here the Day before Yesterday from Stralsund, where his Royal Highness the Duke Administrator had embarked the 27th past, N. S. with the Senators Lowen and Wrangel, and accompanied by Count Sparre and the young Count Taube, &c. for Wittauport, to pass from thence on board a Yacht called the Flygarn, which waited here for that Purpose, directly to Sweden. The Admiral Count Taube was at Sea with several Men of War, posted at a Place called Perth off the Island of Bornholm, from whence the Prince would be attended by the Swedish Convoy. The Ceremony of prefenting the Prince Augustus with the Order of St. Andrew, in the Name of the Czarina, is to be performed by the Chamberlain Korff Tomorrow.
