Rome, September 14.

E are informed from Civita Vecchia, that fince the Centinel of that Garrison had discovered the Attempt of the English Men of War to fet fire to the Spanish Shebecks in that Port, the latter had taken the Opportunity of a favour-able fresh Cale of Wind, in the Night time, to fail thence back for Majorca. The Spaniards have introduced into the Fortress of Civita Castellana, belonging to the Pope, the Artillery and military Stores landed by the said Shebecks, and lest a Detachment of Soldiers to guard them. On the 11th Count Spada, the Great Duke of Tuscany's Minister at this Court, was taken ill of an Apoplectick Fit, and died on the 13th. On the 12th the Pope held a Publick Confistory, in which he gave the Hats to the new Cardinals, then declared M. Simonetti his Nunclo at Naples, Governor of Rome, and promoted several Prelates to the many Posts become vacant by the late Promotion of Cardinals. On the 13th the Committee of Health held a Consultation in order to reinforce the Line towards the Adriatick, on Notice they had received that some few Days ago about 70 Persons had sorced the Line in Calabria, and brought the Sickness to Bova and Montebello about five Miles from the Line, but were prevented going farther, and put into Confinement.

Flarenca, Sept. 24. In the last Week the Armies in Lombardy have made some Motions: Large Parties of Croatians and Hussa advanced to the Neighbourhood of Bologna, on Notice, that Parties of the Spaniards had come as sar as Castle St. Pietro, 'tis said, to escorte some Baggage of the Duke of Modena. These Detachments are retited since to their respective Armies, which continue in their former Situations. Marshal Traun, after having quitted and delivered the Charge of the Austrian Army to Prince Lobcowitz, retired to Padoua on his Journey to Vienna. Amongst other Marks of Distinction, the King of Sardinia sent him his Picture set with Jewels, valued at about 8000 Crowns. A Deputation from the Senate of Bologna was sent to compliment Prince Lobcowitz at his Head Quarters at Carpi.

Bern, Oct. 5. On the 24th of last Month, the First Column of the Army, under the Command of Don Philip, began its March, confifting of fifteen Battalions of Spanish and twelve Battalions of French Troops, neither of them near compleat. The Second Column, with the Infant, was preparing to follow. to Letters from Chamberry, of the 30th of September, the whole Army was then in full March, and it was expected there would be an Action the next Day between them and the Piedmontese, who were ready to receive them. Intention of the Spaniards seems to be to penetrate through the County of Nice. By Letters from Prince Charles's Army, the new-made Boats, to form a Bridge, were all ready on the 30th past, and had been carried to different Places along the Rhine. On the Day following there happened a smart Action between 150 Voluntiers of Prince Waldeck's Regiment, and fome French Soldiers posted in a new built Fort opposite to Rheinwiller. The Voluntiers dislodged the French; and 5 or 6000 more French Troops, that came to their Assistance, were very ill treated by the Austrian Cannon; but their Loss is not exactly known.

Stockholm, Sept. 23, O.S. They are making here all the necessary Preparations to oppose an Invasion. His Swedish Majesty intending to command the Army in Person, Orders are given for his Field Equipage to set out To-morrow: And Admiral Riderstolpe has been sent in a Yacht to meet General Keith, who is daily expected with the Russian Galleys, and the 10,000 Men under his Command. The Evening before last arrived here Senator Cedercreutz and M. Nolcken, the two Swedish Plenipotentiaries at the Congress of Abo.

Vienna, October 5, N. S. It having been agreed on the 27th past, N. S. between the Auftrian General and the French Commandant at Ingoldstadt, that a Gate of the Town should be delivered up as on the 1st Instant to the Austrians; certain Advice of the Execution thereof was brought Yesterday, by an Officer preceded by Six Postilions, and the farther News is expected every Moment of the entire Evacuation of that Place by the French and the Bavarians, as on the 3d Instant.

sports with the Artillery from Holstein are all fafely arrived here, though they were separated and dispersed in a Storm: They have landed the Field Pieces, but the heavy Cannon is still kept on board. The Russian Frigate stranded lately upon the Isle of Anholt, is utterly lost, but the Men are saved. Four or five Men of War belonging to the dispersed Squadron of Archangel, which confifted of nine Sail, have dropt in here, and lie now at Anchor before this Place, where
