South-Carolina.

By the Honourable William Bull, Esq; Lieutenant - Governor and Commander in Chief in and over this his Majesty's Province of South-Carolina.

WHEREAS his Majesty, to promote and encourage the better Settling of this his Province, has been graciously pleased to direct the Governor to grant to such Protestants, as should become Settlers therein, *Fifty Acres of Land* for every Man, Woman, or Child, free from Quit-Rent for ten Years: And as a farther Encouragement, the Duties payable on the Importation of Negross, were appropriated as a Fund to supply them with Provisions for one Year, and Tools whereby they were enabled to provide for their own Subsistence afterwards: Upon which Encouragement many Protestants came and settled in the several Townships laid out for that Purpose.

And whereas there still remains in the publick Treasurers Hands upwards of Fifteen Thousand Pounds current Money, which is applied for the Encouragement of poor Protestants to become Settlers and Inhabitants in any of his Majesty's Townships, or such other Parts as they shall be directed.

These are therefore to make known the same to all Persons whatever, and more particularly to certify to such as may be inclined to transport themselves from Foreign Parts, and settle in this Province, that they shall be put in Possession of the said Lands without any Expence to them; and that there is also allowed, out of the said Fund, for the Support of such poor Protestants and their Families for one Year, *Three Hundred Weight of Beef, Fifty Weight of Pork, Eight Bushels of Corn, Two Hundred Weight of Small Rice, and One Bushel Salt* for every Person above Twelve Years and under Fifty Years of Age; and for every Person under Twelve Years of Age, half the said Quantity; and to every Man *One Ax, One Broad and One Narrow Hoe;* to enable them to clear and cultivate their Lands, and raise Provision for the second Year: Also to every five Persons *One Cow and Calf, and One Breeding Sow.*

And also those Persons who come over Servants, will receive the like Bounty and Encou-

agement, when their Servitude is ended, if they become Settlers in any of the Townships, or such other Parts as they shall be directed to settle in.

In Testimony of which, I have hereunto set my Hand, and caused the Great Seal of his Majesty's Province to be affixed at Charles Town, this Ninth Day of April, *Annoque Domini* One Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty-three, and in the Sixteenth Year of his Majesty's Reign.

Stockholm, October 4. The Prince Royal of Sweden is not arrived here, nor expected before the 10th or 11th Instant, as his Royal Highness travels slowly, and now and then goes out of the Road to see the principal Towns which lie between this and Carelsrona. General Keith has been hourly expected for these several Days, but is not yet arrived. We hear from Upsal, that M. Benzelius, the Archbishop of that Place, died there on Friday Se'nnight.

Copenhagen, Oct. 15. The Military Dispositions here have received a great Alteration, by the Orders that were suddenly dispatched last Saturday to send the Troops into Winter Quarters. Hereupon the Camp is broken up, and Yesterday the Regiments belonging to this Garrison entred the Town again. The Corps that were marching hither, as also the Cavalry in general, return to their former Stations, but the Infantry cantons in this Island. They are all, however, to keep themselves still in Readiness to march upon the first Notice, the Field Allowances being continued, and every thing remaining, as yet, upon the Foot of War. The like Measures are observed with respect to the Fleet. The Ships are going to be laid up in Port, and the Powder, Provisions and smaller Tackling to be removed, but the Cannon and larger Cordage will

will be left on board, and all the Seamen are to be retained. The Holstein Artillery is to be disembarked and brought into the Town. The Embargo on Shipping is taken off, and the Transports, which are engaged for this Month, will probably be dismissed at the End of it, if not sooner. The Prince Royal of Denmark sets out To-morrow for Holstein, being to remain at Dragoe till he hears about what Time her Royal Highness the Princess-Louisa of England may be setting out from Hanover, and then to go to Altona in order to meet and receive her Royal Highness upon the Frontier of the Danish Dominions.

Copenhagen, October 19. The Prince Royal set out the 16th Instant, N. S. early in the Morning, in order to meet the Princess, his future Consort: Her Royal Highness is to lodge the first Night after her Arrival at the Palace of Fridericksberg, about a Quarter of a Mile off. And the next Day, she is to be conducted from thence into this City, with the Ceremony of a Publick Entry, for which great Preparations are making.

Bern, October 12. A strong Party of the Vaudois having penetrated into the Maurienne, with an Intention to seize some Magazines the Spaniards had left in those Parts, have taken Prisoners a Captain and Thirty Men of the Regiment of Arragon, as also, at some Distance from thence, a Detachment of twelve Dragoons and fifteen Grenadiers of the Regiment of Pavia, who had been sent to reinforce the former; but Don Juan de Villalba, the Spanish Governor of St. Jean de Maurienne, by sending a fresh Supply of Troops, has prevented the Vaudois from executing their Design upon the Magazines. M. de Marcieux, who commands a Body of French Troops in Dauphine, has published an Order strictly forbidding the Subjects of the King his Master, to admit any Piedmontese or Savoyards into that Province, under any Pretence whatsoever, either with Passports or without; and the French Militia, posted on the Frontiers of Savoy, are now absolutely under the Command of M. de Villalba.

Hague, October 25, N. S. By Advices from Mentz of the 21st Instant, N. S. we hear, that the Winter Quarters of the Confederate Army are regulated as in the following Plan.

All the Letters from Chambery and Geneva agree in the important News of the Spaniards and French having been repulsed with the Loss of some Hundreds of each Nation, in the Attempts they made the 8th and 9th Instant to force the Pass of San Pedro in the Valley of Vraita; and that in Consequence of this Disappointment, and the growing Inclemency of the Season, the Infant had abandoned his Project of penetrating into Piedmont, and was returning to winter in Savoy. Letters from Florence mention, that Prince Lobkowitz was advanced with his whole Army into the Neighbourhood of Bologna, and had taken up his Head Quarters at the Char-treux, a Convent at a small Distance from that City.
