South-Carolina. By the Honourable William Bull, Efq; Lieutenant - Governor and Commander in Chief in and over this his Majefly's Province of South-Carolina.

HEREAS his Majefty, to promote and encourage the better Settling of this his Province, has been gracioufly pleafed to direct the Go-

vernor to grant to fuch Protestants, as should become Settlers therein, *Fifty Acres of Land* for every Man, Woman, or Child, free from Quit-Rent for ten Years: And as a farther Encouragement, the Duties payable on the Importation of Negroes, were appropriated as a Fund to supply them with Provisions for one Year, and Tools whereby they were enabled to provide for their own Subfistance asterwards: Upon which Encouragement many Protestants came and settled in the feveral Townships laid out for that Purpose.

¹ And whereas there still remains in the publick ²Treasurers Hands upwards of Fisteen Thousand Pounds current Money, which is applied for the Encouragement of poor Protestants to become Settlers and Inhabitants in any of his Majesty's Townships, or such other Parts as they shall be directed.

These are therefore to make known the fame to all Persons whatever, and more particularly to certify to such as may be inclined to transport themselves from Foreign Parts, and fettle in this Province, that they shall be put in Possible of the faid Lands without any Expence to them; and that there is also allowed, out of the faid Fund, for the Support of such poor Protestants and their Families for one Year, Three Hundred Weight of Beef, Fisty Weight of Pork, Eight Buschels of Corn, Two Hundred Weight of Small Rice, and One Buschel Salt, for every Person above Twelve Years and under Fisty Years of Age; and for every Person under Twebve Years of Age, half the said Quantity; and to every Man One Ax, One Broad and One

Narrow Hoe, to enable them to clear and cultivate their Lands, and raife Provision for the fecond Year: Also to every five Persons One Cow and Calf, and One Breeding Sow.

And also those Persons who come over Servants, will receive the like Bounty and Encouragement, when their Servitude is ended, if they become Settlers in any of the Townships, or such other Parts as they shall be directed to fettle in.

Chateau Dauphin, Oct 10, N. S.

ON the 2d of October M. de la Mina having drawn together his whole Army at Molina, a French Village at the Bottom of the Col de l'Agnel, the French remaining at the Bottom of the Col de St. Veran on the Right, the faid General fent a Detachment of about 200 Miquelets, who being advanced to about one hundred Paces of the Height of the Col, that is to fay, to the Confines of the French and Piedmontefe Dominions, retired, upon obferving that our Vaudois kept a Poft upon our Territory, and were refolved to defend it. The fame Evening, two Officers, who had been ordered to look out, and fome Subalterns commanding another

other Band of Vaudois, mounted up the Col, and having next Morning observed a larger Body of Miquelets, fupported by fome Companies of Gienadiers, retreated flowly, firing very briskly, purfuant to their Orders, being posted there only to look out, and to give Notice to the Army. The Enemy came no farther that Evening than half Way of the Defcent, and our Vaudois diew on towards La Chanal, a Village at the Bottom of the Col, which gives the Name to that Valley. On the Morning this fmall Body setired to Pont, a Village which is nearly in our Center. We faw alterwards, on the 6th, their Army extending itfelf in the Valley, the Spaniards defeending the Col de l'Agnel, and the French that of St. Veran, keeping with their Left to the Mountain de la Corbiere, which rifes from the Bottom of l'Agnel up to our Camp, from which it is feparated by a deep Valley, which encompafies that Mountain, returns to l'Agnel, along the Bottom of Mount Vifo, and is interfected by the Col de Riftolaz, which is on the French Territory. Some Miguelets mounting by the Wood of Patagons, and keeping along the Mountain of La Corbiere, got by the Eminences as far as over-against our Camp above the Village of Pont. We had not thought fit to take Possession of that Mountain and to defend it, because the Posts we were possesfield of on this Side, are furer and nearer at hand for our Subfiftance. This Troop, armed lightly but with good Carabines, made that Day a pret-ty brisk Fire upon the Village of Pont, which lay open to them from above, but however to no great Purpofe. The fame Day M, de la Mina, attended by about fifteen Officers, came on the Right of the Valley under the Mountain of Bellin, to view our Situation, and at the fame Time gave Orders for the Army to march at Break of Day, which accordingly was done on the 7th, they entring the Valley in two Columns as far as the Back Part of the Village of l'Eglife, at half a Cannon Shot of Pont. One of the Columns marched at the Bottom of the Point of St. Verau at the Right of the Valley, along the Valley of Fiontronge, it repatied the Brook of Rareyta, formed itself into about eight Lines of a Batallion in Front, and was followed the fame Day by the Reft of the Spaniards. The French followed on their Left, extending their own Left to La Corbiere, a little more backwards than the Front of the Spaniards. In this Order the Army was for two Hours under Arms. About Eleven o'Clock M. de la Mina detached from his Right a Body of about 2000 Men, most of them Grenadiers and Miquelets, to attack the Heights of Bellin : His Orders were executed with Refolution; the Spaniards afcended with great Bravery that fteep Mountain, till they were received by a Detachment of the Brigade of Guibert, fent thither to defend the Eminences and the Descents. After a very lively Encoun-ter and a very brisk Fire, our Troops repulsed them to the Bottom of the Mountain, where 'they passed the Night under the Shelter of the

great Woods that hid them from us. At the fame Time twelve Battering Pieces, placed three and three together, were deftroying fome Works of Defence, railed in Hafte in the Village of Pont, which we abandoned in the Night, as well as the Rock, where there were only 60 Men, whom we did not think fit to facrifice, a bare Parapet of Fascines not being able to protect them against the least vigorous Attack; we quitted that wretched Poft with fo much more Indifference, as it was never intended to defend it any longer than for one Day, and because by our Situation the Enemy hazarded his all, having penetrated as far as our Center, whilst we kept the Eminences both of our Right and Left; accordingly M. de la Mina did not dare to attempt it. On the next Day, the fame Detachment, which had attacked the Mountain of Bellin, having been reinforced with about 1000 Men, returned to the Charge again, but were received with the fame Firmness by our Men, who chased them farther down than the Day before, notwithstanding they held a much brisker and longer Fire. According to the Report of their Deferters, and by what we can judge, these two Attacks have cost them upwards of 500 Men of their best Troops. Their main Army was under Arms, formed, as the Day before, on two deep Columns, expecting only a favourable Moment for attacking our Center, making a continual Fire of their Artillery and Carabineers from the Rock of Pont upon our advanced Batteries, and our Camp on the Left. Whilft our chief Attention was fixed upon taking Care of our Left and Center thus attack'd, we faw on the Right the Brigade of Anjou, confifting of five Battalions, 1000 Spaniards, and 200 Miquelets, descending from Ristolaz, who ranged themfelves in order of Battle oppofite to our Intrenchments, ready to attack them, for above two This Project, if vigoroufly executed, Hours. might have been advantageous to them, because our Right being thus kept in Awe, we durft not weaken it by fuccouring the Center, if it had been attacked. We were greatly aftonifhed when we faw this whole Corps turning about on a fudden along the High Way at the Bottom of the Valley between la Corbiere and our Camp; an extraordinary Step that had no Defign in it, but cost them 4 or 500 Men and Part of their Equipages; for as foon as we faw them entring the faid Valley, all the Grenadiers and the Piquets of the Battalions intrench'd on the Eminences of our Right and Center, refolutely leaped out of their Intrenchments, and prefented themfelves within a little Musket-fhot, ming briskly and continually upon this Column, which in a Manner run the Gantlet as far as Pont, where it was afresh exposed to a still brisker Fire from our Artillery, and from our lower Intrenchments on the Left, and faved itfelf only by the Help of a Body of Grenadiers and Carabineers, and of their Artillery, which advanced to protect this precipitate Retreat. We loft during those Days but two or three Officers killed, four or five wounded, and about 100 private Men killed or woun el.

wounded. The King, who had carefully vifited the remotest Posts of the Right and Left, notwithstanding a violent Swelling in his Face, and the Coldness of the Weather, kept in the Center, as the most important Post, where he was nearest at Hand to give his Orders every where; his Preferice augmented the Confidence of the Troops, who being used to see him at their Head, fhewed an incredible Ardour and Bravery. On the 9th, the Day paffed without any thing material, the Enemy being taken up with fecuring their Cannon with Gabions, and to prepare Roads on their Right, as if they intended to carry Artillery that Way to play upon our Centre where the King was : But this Morning, being the 10th, we had Reafon to judge that they were preparing for their Retreat, their Deferters afluring us, that upon the very first Fire of our Artillery, they were thrown into great Diforder, and loft many of their Men ; that they burnt the Hut, which the fixty Men upon the Rock at Pont had raisen to shelter themselves, as alfo fome Straw which they had brought together for the Ufe of the Camp they intended to form; that they faced about with a Defign, as was conjectured, of forming themfelves fo as to let the Artillery pass, and make a Rear Guard. Accordingly we learn, that after Midnight they carried off their Artillery, having without doubt had Advice of our having received Yesterday 20 Field Pieces, and feveral Battalions, which, befides the real Losses they have fustained, probably determined them to retreat fooner than we expected; for every thing was well difpofed on our Side for their Reception this Morning. We have fome Prifoners, and above 600 Deferters, befides those who are continually arriving. Our advanced Troops have also taken fome Horses and Equipages. This Moment we learn from our Spies, and fome Parties we have fent out to observe the Motions of the Enemy, that they are paffing the Agnel; feveral Chefts of Ammunition and some Equipages of Officers, left in their We fee Camps, confirm all those Advices. their Rear, confifting of 20 or 30 Battalions, itill behind La Chanal, the last Village in the King's Dominions, and there is Reafon to believe that To-morrow they will all have paffed the Col.

Naples, October 1, N.S. By the laft Difpatches which the Court has received from Calabria, dated September 27, we have the Satisfaction to hear, that the Sickness at. Reggio is greatly adated, and that all possible Precautions, are taken to prevent its increasing in the Suburbs and Neighbouring Villages. At Messina there are fcarcely any Symptoms of it left.

Berlin, Oct. 22. The King of Prussia came to Town this Morning, and, after staying two Days, goes to Reinsberg.

Liege, Oct. 25, N.S. The Duke of Arembergh, who is at prefent invefted with the Command of the Combined Army, has wrote to his Highnefs our Bifhop, to demand Paffage for his Troops through this Principality, in their Way to the Auftrian Netherlands; and our Correspondents upon the Rhine inform us, that a Bridge having been laid over that River on the 19th Inftant at Biberich, those Troops which lay neareft, began to pafs, and will be followed inceffantly by the reft of the Army. Hague, Oct. 29, N. S. M. Wafner arrived here this Morning on his Way to England, and will fet out again To-morrow, in order to go over with the first Packet-Boat. M. Oforio is expected hourly.
