

ningen, proves to be premature; they having only lodged themselves in an Island in that River belonging to the Marquisate of Baden; where they are said to be fortifying themselves; but hitherto not a Man of them, as far as we hear, has set his Foot upon the Continent of Swabia; though indeed the Branch of the Rhine, which separates this Island from Germany, is said to be far less considerable than that which separates it from Alsace; and over which the French have now thrown their Bridge. The said Island is German Territory; and the Fortifications that were formerly on it, and which the French are raising again, were razed by the Peace of Baden.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of St. Asaph, to elect a Bishop of that See, void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God, Doctor Isaac Maddox, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Worcester; and also to name and recommend to the said Dean and Chapter, the Reverend John Thomas, Doctor in Divinity, one of his Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Dean of the Cathedral Church of Peterborough, to be by them elected Bishop thereof.
