This day passed by this place the *Turmouth* Freighter, having with her a Dutch Caper of five Guns, lately taken by the said Freighter.

The latter end of this Month their Majesties are expected here from their progress. Yesterday the States of this Kingdom are called together at Whitehall, that his Majesty will this winter take another progress through *Lapland* and *Finland*, and he returns hither till next Summer.

Warsaw, Oct. 10. His Majesty's of the Kings arrival in the Army, with the Grand Marshal *Sobieski* and some of the principal Senators, were not yet come thither; and the Army there begins to be great scarcity of Bread and Provisions, so that they will be obliged to march to some other place of greater plenty. The Turks seem to be preparing for us, and have already got a Body of 20000 Men together; The *Bassat Capitan* has made Provision of all things necessary for the defence of that place, and expects nothing more than a Siege. *Dorshenko* has written to the King to offer his Majesty his Service, on certain conditions, very easie for us to grant, but that we have been too often deceived by his pretended Friendship, to have now any reliance on it. It is yet uncertain, whether the King will continue with the Army or not.

Ratisbona, Oct. 16. The Emperors Commissioner here, hath again presented to the Diet a Memorial, by way of exhortation to the States, concerning the conjunction of the Troops of the several Circles, with those of his Imperial Majesty, which he solicites, but all the instances he could make, have had no better success, then those heretofore, not one of the Members having been willing so much as to charge themselves to communicate this Memorial to their Superiours. We are told here of a Treaty on foot between the King of *Sweden*, the Electors of *Bavaria* and *Brandenburgh*, the Dukes of *Nemburgh*, of *Wirtemberg*, of *Brunswick*, *Hainover*, and of *Mecklenbourg Smerin*, the intention of which is, to procure a Suspension of Arms in the Empire, to the end that both Parties may retire their Armies.

Genova, Oct. 18. The 12 instant in the evening his Excellency Sir *John Finch* embarked on the *Conturion* Fregate for *Legorn*, where we since hear his Excellency is safely arrived. The French according to our last advices at *Thoulon*, are fitting out several small Fregats there, to go and cruise upon the Corsairs of *Argiers*, who, it is said, have broke the Peace they had with that Crown. The Popes Gallies are now arrived here, and will in a day or two proceed on their way home. From *Milan* they write; that the Duke d' *Ossuna* their Governour, is very active in visiting their several Frontier places, and causing reviews to be made of the Militia, to the end, things may be in a good posture against all accidents. We had some time since a report, and it still continues, that the Prince de *Ligne*, at present Viceroy of *Sicily*, is to succeed the Duke d' *Ossuna* in the

Government of *Milan*, though we hear not that either of them are as yet on their departure from the Governments they now hold, in order to the making this change.

Acrnhem, Oct. 21. The 18 instant the Duke of *Luxemburgh* passed through this place for *Nimmegen*; Yesterday in the Evening he was expected here again, but came not. The Regiment that lay in Garrison here, is Marched from hence this Morning, consisting of 16 Companies; this night they are to lodge at *Lieren*; and so to continue their march for *Rynberg*. To-morrow or next day the Prince of *Orange* will pass the *Meuse* at *Venlo*, and thence continue his march towards the Electorate of *Cologne*, in order as is said, to a Conjunction with the Imperialists, who are coming down the *Rhyn*.

Venlo, Oct. 21. The Trumpeter which our Governour the Prince of *Mimines* had sent to the Prince of *Orange* is returned, and tells us, that his Highness will be here to-morrow to Dine with his Excellency, so that Orders are now given to lay the Bridge over the River here, in order to the passage of his Highness Troops.

Francfort, Oct. 18. The Imperialists have at present their head Quarters at *Seckback*, a Mile from hence; a considerable part of them are already passed the *Main* here at this place, though it is thought, the rest of the Army will not follow, but march towards *Mentz*, to pass the *Rhyn* there, and so to proceed to *Coblentz*: which this news corresponds that which we have here, that the French are likewise on their march towards the *Rhyn*, having left a sufficient Garrison in *Aschaffembourg*.

Francfort, Oct. 22. The Imperialists that had passed the *Main* here, are come back again, and the Bridge is taken away; they report, that Monsieur de *Turenne* is broken up with his Army, and Marches towards *Dilborg*, to pass thence to *Bergstraet*, which is the way to *Philipsburgh*, but this we cannot give you for certain. The Imperialists march towards *Coblentz*, and will it is said, pass the *Rhyn* there; the Garrisons they had in *Wirzbourg*, and other places thereabouts, are come down. Some days since happened a Rencontre between a party of Imperialists and French, wherein the latter is said to have had the advantage.

Coblentz, Oct. 22. The Gros of the Imperial Army advances as we are told towards *Kingawm* and *Wizbade*, with intentions to continue their march towards *Mentz*, there to pass the *Rhyn*, and so to come down this way. A considerable party of Imperialists passed some days since the *Main* near *Francfort*, to discover the posture of the French, who had their principal Quarters at *Aschaffembourg*; on Thursday and Friday last they repassed the *Main* again, breaking the Bridge down behind them, and are since joyned with the body of their Army. It is said, that Monsieur de *Turenne* is likewise broke up, and that he likewise takes his way towards the *Rhyn*, to keep still an eye upon the Imperialists. The Marquis de *Grana* is arrived here, and hath had Audience of our Elector.

Strasburg, Oct. 23. The 15 instant the Marquis de *Vanbrun* arrived at *Grave* with two Regiments of Foot; the next morning he continued his march to *Philipsburgh*.

burg, (which place is about three Leagues from *Grave*) intending to proceed thence to *Niebuysen* to join *Monheur de Turenne*, who hath caused part of his Army to march towards the River *Mecker*.

Antwerp, Oct. 23. We now see our selves actually Engaged in the War, the generality of the People are much troubled at it, and begin to fear the many inconveniencies it may bring with it. The several parties that were sent out against the French, upon the Declaration of the Rupture the 16 instant, are returned, with an account of their several exploits, which amounts not to more then the burning of two or three poor inconsiderable Villages. Here has been published this following Placet, by the Magistrates of this place.

WE Command in the name of His Excellency, That all Natural-born French Men shall within six days depart the Territories of his Catholick Majesty, with their Wives and Children, on pain in case they remain longer, of being counted prisoners at War, and treated accordingly.

Brussels, Oct. 25. Our Governor has ordered a general Confiscation of all Goods as well Real as Personal belonging to the French, that shall be found here; inso-much that several French Merchants, and others, inhabiting in these Countreys, have been turned out of all, and they with their Wives and Children, obliged to quit these Territories immediately notwithstanding some of them have lived these forty years amongst us. On Sunday and Monday last the Prince of *Orange* passed the *Mas* at *Vento*, and thence marched towards the *Rhine*. The Prince of *Conde* being joined with the Troops which the Chevalier de *Fourilles* Commanded, hath sent 5000 Horse from *Pont d'Espieres*, where he lies Encamped towards *Leusi*, with directions to continue their march towards *Châlucroy*, in order, as is said here, to make a Convoy to *Muestricht*. An Express was the 18 instant sent hence to acquaint General *Montecuculi* with the Rupture between us and *France*.

Paris, Oct. 28. The 24 instant the Count de *Molins*, Ambassador from the Crown of *Spain*, took his leave of their Majesties, in order to his return home. The Chevalier de *Fourilles*, is, we hear, joined with the Prince of *Conde* near *Tournay*, having brought with him near 12000 Men Horse and Foot, which were the Troops that came with the King from *Nancy*, so that the said Prince will now have a great Body of Men together; and we may expect to hear suddenly of some action. We are told of an Arrest that is coming out for the raising the price of Money.

Amsterdam, Oct. 27. We hear of much damage occasioned by the late bad weather, and of several Ships that have been lost; amongst others, we hear of a *Caper* of 14 Guns, who went out from *Rotterdam* on Sunday last, being cast away near *Wijk-op-Zee*, all the Men except 18 having perished; In the *Texel* have been lost two or three Merchantmen: Several Ships are lately arrived there from *Norway* and other parts to the Northwards. We have much discourse here concerning the march of the Imperial and French Armies; as likewise of the Forces Commanded by the Prince of *Orange*; and endeavor to turn all things to our advantage, though the contrary is often very notorious.

Hague, Oct. 28. The States of *Holland* continue still Assembled, and as yet we do not hear of any final resolution they have taken concerning the raising the Moneys demanded by the Prince of *Orange*, for the extraordinary expences of the War the next year; It is said indeed, they have resolved to raise 25 Millions of *Liures*, the sum desired by his Highness, but meet with great difficulty to find out the way so to do; the many and heavy Taxes that already lye upon the People, making it a hard thing to know in what manner to impose a new

one. From *Vento* we have Letters of the 26 instant, which say, That the 23 the Prince of *Orange* came thither with his Army, and the 24 and 25, passed the *Mas* there, taking his way towards *Juliers* and *Cologne*; we confidently report here, That the Imperial Army is coming down the *Rhine*, in order to a Conjunction with his Highness. The *Hera Beverning* and the *Heer Odyse* are in few days expected here from *Cologne*.

Cologne, Oct. 27. Our Letters from *Frankfort* tell us, That the 16 instant a great Looy of Imperialists marched towards *Friburg*, who were afterwards followed by four Regiments more of Cavalry, the whole being Commanded by the Marquis of *Baden*, General of the Artillery; being come to *Friburg*, he summoned the Governor to surrender the place, which he refusing to do, a Battery was raised, but at length the French having made what resistance they could, the Imperialists became Masters of the Town. Monsieur de *Turenne's* Forces lye still about *Aschaffenburg*, whither they daily bring great store of Provisions, which they gather out of the places therabouts. The Imperialists are said to be marching towards *Mentz*, near which place they have made a Bridge to pass the *Rhine*. The march of the Dutch and Spanish Troops under the Command of the Prince of *Orange*, does a little Alarm this Countrey, so that the Boors come hither with their Families and Goods for shelter. Yesterday his Highness was not far from *Nuis* with his Army, and some say, he has intentions to besiege that place. Last night a party of Dutch Cavalry appeared very near this City, at a place called *Weyerport*; where they plundered the poor people, taking away their Cattle, and destroying what they could not carry off with them; and its said they have plundered a Convent near this Town. The Treaty here seems at a stand, the Dutch refusing to proceed in the Negotiation, till such time as the Duke of *Lorraine* be received as a Principal into it; and therefore the Mediators having sent to them to desire a meeting at the *Carmes*, they sent their Excellencies word, they had no business with them, and therefore could not condescend to give them a meeting; at which strange way of proceeding, the Mediators were very much offended, and publickly complained of it.
