Ratisboung, Od. 16. The Emperors Commissioner here, hath again presented to the Diet a Memorial, by way of exhortation to the States, concerning the conjunction of the Troops of the several Circles, with those of his Imperial Majesty, which he follicites, but all the instances he could make, have had no better fecces, then those hererosore, not one of the Members having been willing fo much as to charge themselves to communicate this Memorial to their Superiours. told here of a Treaty on foot between the King of &meden, the Electors of Bavaria and Brandenburgh, the Dukes of Newburgh, of Wirtemberg, of Brun [wick, Hinouer, and of Mecklenbourg Smerin, the intention of which is, to procure a Suspention of Arms in the Empire, to the end that both Parties may retire their

Armies.

Genoua, Off. 18. The 12 instant in the evening his Excellency Sir fohn Finen imbarked on the Conturion Fregat for Legorn, where we fince hear his Excellency is fafely arrived. The French according to our last advices at Thoulen, are fitting out several small Fregats the posture of the French, who had their principal there, to go and cruisc upon the Corsairs of Argiers, awho, it is faid, have broke the Peace they had with that Crown. The Popes Galleys are now arrived here, and will in a day or two proceed on their way home. From Milan they write; that the Dake d' Offuna their Governor, is very active in vifiting their several Frontier places, and causing reviews to be made of the Militia, to the end, things may be in a good posture against all necidents. We had some time since a report, and it still continues, that the Prince de Ligne, at present Viceroy of Sicily, is to succeed the Duke d' Offices in the

Government of Milan, though we hear not that either of them are as yet on their departure from the Governments they now hold, in order to the making this

change.

Acrobem, OA. 21. The 18 instant the Duke of Luxemburgh passed through this place for Nimmegen; Yelterday in the Evening he was expected here again, but came not. The Regiment that lay in Garrison here, is Marched from hence this Morning, confifting of 16 Companies; this night they are to lodge at Lieren; and so to continue their march for Rynberg. row or next day the Prince of Orange will pass the Menfe at Vento, and thence continue his march towards the Electorate of Cologne, in order as is faid, to a Conjunction with the Imperialists, who are coming down the Rhyn.

Venlo, Oct. 21. The Trumpeter which our Governor the Prince of Mimines had fent to the Prince of Orange is returned, and tells us, that his Highness will be here to morrow to Dine with his Excellency, fo that Orders are now given to lay the Bridge over the River here, in order to the passage of his Hignesses

Francfort, OA. 18. The Imperialists have at present their head Quarters at Seckback, a Mile from hence; a confiderable part of them are already passed the Main here at this place, though it is thought, the rest of the Army will not follow, but march towards Mentz, to pass the Rhynthere, and so to proceed to Coblenia: with this news corresponds that which we have here, that the French are likewise on their march towards the Rhyn, having left a fufficient Garrison in Aschaffenbourg.

Francforz, Od. 22. The Imperialists that had passed the Main here, are come back again, and the Bridge is taken away; they report, that Monfieur de Turenne is broken up with his Army, and Marches towards Dilborg, to pass thence to Bergstraet, which is the way to Philipsburgh, but this we cannot give you for cer-The Imperialists march towards Coblentz, and will it is faid, pass the Rhyn there; the Garrisons they had in Wirtzbourg, and other places thereabouts, are come down. Some days fince happened a Rencounter between a party of Imperialists and French, wherein

the la ter is faid to have had the advantage.

Coblent?, Off. 22. The Gross of the Imperial Army advances as we are told rowards King aum and Wizbade, with intentions to continue their march towards Mentz, there to pass the Rhyn, and so to come down this way. A confiderable party of Imperialits passed fome days since the Main near Francfort, to discover Quarters at Alchaffenbourg; on Thursday and Friday last they repassed the Main again, breaking the Bridge down behind them, and are fince joyned with the body of their Army. It is said, that Monsieur de Turenne is likewise broke up, and that he likewise takes his way towards the Rhyn, to keep still an eye upon the Imperialists. The Marquis de Grana is arrived here, and hath had Audience of our Elector.

Strasburg, Od. 23. The 15 instant the Marquis da Vaubrun arrived at Grave with two Regiments of Foot; the next morning he continued his march to Philips-
