Stockholm, November 15, O. S.

THE Court of Petersbourg has notified to this, that there is at Riga and Revel a Body from six to ten thousand Men, ready to be transported to Sweden whenever they please. The Day before Yesterday the French Ambassador gave a grand Entertainment on Occasion of the Prince Royal of Sweden's safe Arrival here, besides a Ball and Supper; his House was illuminated, Fire-works play'd off, and Wine given to the Populace. The same was continued three Nights together.

Naples, Nov. 19. According to the Accounts of this Week from the President of the Province of Calabria, who, agreeable to his Directions from Court, went by Sea to the Road of Reggio, to be informed of the true State of that City, and neighbouring Villages, the Sickneſs there seems to take a favourable Turn. A Body of 4000 Men from this Capital, Capua, and other Fortresses, have lately been detached to Pescara, by way of Precaution in the present Situation of Affairs.

Florence, Nov. 26. On the 20th the Magistratate of Health here received Notice, that the Republick of Venice had suspended all free Commerce with Tuscany, in consequence of our Regency having lately re-established the Commerce with the Ecclesiastical State by Land. From Lombardy we do not learn this Week any News of Consequence. Prince Lobcowitz continues his Head Quarters at Rimini. On the 23d a Party of about 120 Austrians, recovered in the Hospital at Revere, joined the Army, as did from Mantua 400 Horse for the Remounting of their Regiments, and 200 Hussars and Croatiens. M. de Gages remains at Fano, and the greatest Part of his Troops are at Pesaro, where he continues fortifying himself; and, by the advantageous Situation he has chose, it is questioned whether the Austrians will attempt any Operations, especially as they must necessarily attack the Enemy in Front, and with the Foot only, there being no Room for the Horse to act (in which the Austrians are far superior) on Account of the narrow Passages. The Spaniards have done great Damage by cutting down Vineyards and Trees in the Neighbourhood of Pesaro, and would have done much more, had not Cardinal

Lanti remonstrated to M. de Gages and the Spanish Generals thereupon. They receive their Forage, &c. chiefly from Ancona. On the 15th a Party of 60 Gunners from Orbitello joined the Spanish Army: However it is observed their Equipages are sending towards Foligno. Both Armies find great Difficulty to get Forage and Provisions, which probably will increase on the Part of the Spaniards, when the two Ships get into the Adriatick, which Admiral Mathews has sent for that Purpose; and which at the same Time will facilitate the Means of furnishing the Austrian Army. Great Part of the Spaniards, that remained at Civita Castellana, have joined the Army, so that only 100 Horse and 300 Foot remain in that Place, amongst which are above 100 Invalids. By all Accounts their Army is represented to be in a very bad Condition, ill cloath'd and paid.

Berlin, Nov. 30. The King of Prussia is not yet come to Berlin. His Majesty arrived last Night at Charlottenburg from Potzdam, and this Day he gives a great Feast in Honour of the Russian Order, of which his Majesty is a Knight.

Berlin, Dec. 3. The King of Prussia arrived here from Charlottenburg on Sunday the 1st Instant.

St. Tron, December 3, N. S. This Day a Party of 200 English Soldiers, commanded by Captain Cockburne, who were left in the Hospital of Mayence and are recovered, pass'd thro' this Town in their Way to Flanders, which closes the March of his Britannick Majesty's Troops to their Winter Quarters.

Hague, Dec. 10, N. S. Good Letters from Basle of the 28th past, confirm the Report of the French having perfected on the 25th their Bridge from the Island to the Continent of Swabia; and that there were no less than three Thousand Workmen employed in raising a Head of a Bridge, and Retrenchments upon the East Side of the Rhine; while the Works in the Island were also carrying on with the utmost Diligence; and the same Advices add, that by the Provision the French had made of Carpenters, Timber, Cranes, and various Sorts of Utensils, it looked as if their Design was to substitute, both between Hunningen and the Island, and between the Island and the Continent of Germany, in the Place of their present Bridges of Boats,

Boats, others built upon Piles, which might be less liable to be incommoded by the Ice, which must be expected to descend the Rhine this Winter. These Letters make no mention of any Motions of Prince Waldeck's to interrupt their Undertakings.

Dublin, November 25.

The Lord Lieutenant having this Morning received the good News of his Majesty's safe Arrival at his Palace of St. James's, the great Guns in his Majesty's Park the Phoenix were immediately fired, by his Grace's Order, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison here: And Advice having been received by his Grace at the same Time of the safe Delivery of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales of a Prince, and of the Conclusion of the Marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa with the Prince Royal of Denmark, the great Guns were fired again in the Afternoon, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments. His Grace sent Notice of these joyful Events to the Lord Mayor of this City; and the Evening concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, ringing of Bells, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
