**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Liverpool, in Common Council assembled, most humbly congratulate your Majesty on your safe and happy Return to these Kingdoms, attended by his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, whose gallant Behaviour in the Cause of Liberty has manifested his Lineage to foreign Nations, and endeared him the more to every true Englishman.

Your Majesty's timely Support of an injured Princess the Queen of Hungary, is a Proof of your Zeal for the Liberties of Europe: Your Perseverance to bring the contending Powers to an Accommodation, in order to obtain a general Peace; and your Royal Vigilance to prevent the Wars becoming general, we are deeply sensible of: And when it became absolutely necessary to take the Field, the happy Success attending it we cannot but attribute to your Majesty's known Conduct and Resolution.

Give us Leave, Sir, more particularly to congratulate your Majesty on the glorious Victory at Dettingen, a Victory not to be forgotten; where your Majesty with great Wisdom commanded, and personally animated ally'd Armies in the common Cause; thereby entirely clearing Germany of an inveterate Enemy, and laying a Foundation for establishing the Balance of Power.

Permit us also to testify our Joy to your Majesty, on the Birth of another Son to his Royal

Highness the Prince of Wales: And the Marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa to the Prince Royal of Denmark.

It is with the warmest Duty and Gratitude, we acknowledge your Majesty's unwearied Labours for the Trade, the Commerce, the Good of your People. Nothing shall be wanting on our Part to support your Majesty's Measures. What we can contribute shall be given with Cheerfulness; and we will by all our Actions continue to shew how much we have at Heart the Prosperity of your Majesty, and the Preservation of the Protestant Succession in your Royal House to the latest Posterity.
