Our most earnest and ardent Prayers and Wishes are, and ever shall be, that your Majesty may long be preserved to disappoint the Disturbers of the Peace, and Invaders of the Rights of Mankind; to secure the Liberties of Europe, and protect the British Constitution and Commerce; and that your Royal Progeny may rule

over an happy and free People in these Realms to the latest Ages.
