*Stockholm, Nov. 29, O. S.* Yesterday 2000 Muscovites, Part of the Troops under General Keish's Command, marched into this Town, where they are to be quartered this Winter.

*Flague, Dec. 24, N. S.* Letters from Bern of the 14th Instant bring Advice, that it had been debated in the supreme Council of that Canton some Days before, whether they should permit the levying of four new Companies to the Swiss Regiment in the French Service, pursuant to the French King's Ordonnance of the 22d of September last; and that after much Warmth it was carried in the Negative by a Majority of 92 Voices against 17; many of the Members having look'd upon the said Ordonnance as an Encroachment upon the Sovereignty and Independency of the Helvetic Body. By Letters directly from Constantinople, the Progress of the Persians seems to be less considerable than publick Report makes it; nor is it yet confirmed that the Porte has declared War against them.
