May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgeses of Nottingham, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty upon your safe Arrival in your British Dominions; and upon the happy Recovery, and safe Arrival, of his Royal Highness the Duke.
