HIS Day the following Address of the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of York, in Council affembled, was prefented to the King by George Fox, Efg; one of their Reprefentatives in Parlia ment, who wa introduced by the R t Hon. the Lord H 1 rneis, one of the Lords of his Majefty's Bed Chamber in Waiting : Which Addrefs his Majefty was pleafed to receive very gracioully.

To the King's most Excellent Majefty,

The humble Address of the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of York, in Council affembled.

May it pleafe your Majesty, WITH the greatest Duty and Sincerity, we beg Leave to join, in the united Voice of the reft of your Majefty's faithful Subjects, in congratulating your fafe Return into this your Kingdom. Safe, under the immediate Care of Providence, from those Dangers, which, for the Security of thele your Dominions, you exposed your facted Person to.

We congratulate your Majelty on that Succefs which the British Arms, animated by your Presence, and inspired by your Conduct, have lately obtained in Defence of the Liberties, not only of this Nation, but of the Common Caufe of Europe.

The Alliance which your Majesty has lately created by the Marriage of one of the Princef-fes, is an Indication of your Wildom, and of your Care, not only of this prefent, but of fu-ture Ages; and the Increase of your Family here at home, by the Birth of a Prince, makes the Bleffings of your Majefty's Reign more valuable to us, through the Prospect of their continuance, and by being an Omen that what we at prefent enjoy, fhall bereafter be the Lot of our Posterity, by having your Family perpetuated o us, the only Channel through which the Liberties of a free People can most naturally flow.

That there may never, to the lateft of Days, be wanting a Prince, defcended from your Majefty, Inheritor not only of your Crown, but of your Royal Virtues, are the Wifhes and Prayers of us your Majefty's most dutiful Subjects.

Petersbourg, Dec. 3. Ringwicht, Councellor of the Regency of Pomerania, and his Swedifh Majefty's Minister to the King of Great Britain, left this Place on his Journey to England, by

the Way of Ysted and Stralsund. Bern, Dec. 21.
