The following is a Translation of an Edict published by the King of Sweden for preventing the Plague from being brought into his Dominions.

E Frederick, by the Grace of God, King of Sweden, of the Goths and Vandals, &c. &c. Landgrave of Heffe, &c. &c. do make known, That whereas we have been informed that a contagious Distemper hath raged in Sicily, and particularly in the City of Messina, and that it hath fince extended itself to the Terra Firma of Italy and Africa, and that other Powers in Europe have begun to take the proper and usual Precautions to prevent the Infection, which might be communicated to their respective Do-minions by the Arrival of any Vessels coming from such infected Countries, or other dangerous and suspected Places; We having equally at Heart to take all necessary Measures for securing our Kingdom, and the Limits of it, against this contagious and deadly Distemper, have most graciously, by these our Letters Patents, which are to be in Force till further Order, fettled the following Rules to be observed with regard to the Commerce and Navigation between foreign Countries and Sweden, and the Dominions there-

unto belonging, to wit,

I. That no Veilel or Ships coming directly or indirectly from Naples and Sicily, or other Countries and Places, which upon Information to us hereaster given, we may hear to have been in-fected by this Distemper, be for the Space of Six Months allowed to enter into any of our Ports on Penalty of the Ship and Cargo being burnt, and the Crew, Owners, and Factors, and all those who have given Orders for fending such Vessel to the Ports in Sweden, or any other of these Provinces, or who have had Knowledge thereof directly or indirectly, being punished with Death, if fuch Persons can be seized here: The same Law to be observed with regard to any Ship or Vessel, which on Account of the Plague, hath been fent back from the Ports of any other Nation, and which may nevertheless endeavour to enter into Sweden, or any of the Provinces there-

unto belonging. II. As foon as the Pilots perceive any Vessel

and having come up to it, before they enter therein, they are to inform themselves by haling it, whether the Vessel comes from the Mediterranean, and in particular from Naples, or Sicily, or other infected Countries, the Pilots being commanded, in case the Vessel comes from any of the aforesaid infected Places, to give Notice to the Captain to put out to Sea again immediately without entring into any of the Ports in Sweden, or of the Provinces belonging thereunto, on Penalty of the Ship and Cargo being burnt, and the Captain and the Crew being punished with Death. But if the Captain affirms that he comes from other Parts, from whence no Contagion is to be feared, and if the Pilots shall be well affured thereof, he shall be at Liberty to purfue his Voyage without any Molestation.

At his Arrival near the Custom House, or at his first entry into the Ports, and after the Captain with his Vessel, according to the Rules of Navigation, hath cast Anchor at a good Distance from the Shore, and hath been fearched, he is to be conducted to the Custom House for farther Examination touching his Cargo, and Inspection whether he do not bring any Effects or Mer-chandizes which by this Edict are prohibited, or be not defitute of the Certificates hereby re-quired and ordered; In which first Case, the Captain is immediately to return on board, and the Vessel to be carried farther out, and particular Care to be taken that no one enter, or go out of it. That done, the Custom House Chamber is without Delay to inform the Governor of the Place, and He our Council of Commerce, thereof, and then wait for Directions from the faid Council how to proceed with Regard to fuch a Veilel according to this out Edict. But in the last Case, if only the Certificates hereby required and ordered for permitted Merchandizes, be wanting, the respective Judges of the Place shall immediately examine the Affair, and judge of it in consequence of this our gracious Ordonnance, and shall also make their Report to the Council of Commerce upon the Circumstances thereof. But all the Vessels bound for Stockholm and Gefle, shall be examined in the Manner before mentioned by the Inspectors at Dahlaro, Sandhamn, Waxholm, and Kulboda; those for Nykioping by the Custom House from any Foreign Country approaching, they Officers at Hasselo; those for Nor and Suderage to go out to Sea as far as possible to meet it, coping by the Officers at Barefund; for Westerage

wick by those of Sparsund, and for Abo by those of Fagerholm, who shall all act in this Affair after the same Manner with the Chamber of the Customs in the Provinces, and as is hereby

regulated.

iII. Wines, Brandies, Oils, Fruits, Tobacco, Raifins, Corrants, Almonds, Rice, Wax, Coffee Berries, Salt, Olives, Allum, Tartar, Soap, Honey, Manna, Saffron, with all Druggs for Physick, Carduan, all Sorts of Grain, and Things for Dying, are looked upon to be less dangerous, and all permitted to be imported under the fol-lowing Conditions, to wit, That those who un-load them shall be obliged to make Oath before the Magistrate of every Place, and to provide themselves with their Certificates and Attestations, and afterwards of those of our Ministers, Agents, Confuls and Commissaries of every Place in Foreign Parts, that such Merchandizes have been kept there a Year at least in Magazines, but that they were not received into the Vessel at infected Places: But for want of these authentick Proofs, the Vessel and the Cargo upon their Arrival, shall be condemned to be con-fiscated, and the Captain, with the Pilot, or whoever it be, who hath dared to receive on Board the Vessel such Merchandizes, shall be whipt feven Times, and further punished by hard Labour at Marstrand for the Space of three Years; and if fuch Merchandizes be brought packed up in Sacks, Mats, Hay, Straw, Paper, or other like Coverings, the Packing shall be taken away, and afterwards burnt or cast into the Sea: But all Things which are not specifically mentioned in this Paragraph, as well as Bales, 'the Contents of which the Captain is ignorant of, shall be deemed suspected, and confequently shall perform Quarantain under proper Precautions.

IV. All the Vessels which arrive here from other Ports of the Mediterranean, as Smyrna, the Isles of the Archipelago, Malta, and the Coast of Barbary, shall be obliged to perform a Quarantain of Forty Days, before they shall be permitted to come up the Town. But those who come from Venice, and the Isles of the Mediterranean, shall perform a Quarantain of Twenty Days, in the Places appointed for that Purpose. But if any Vessel be suspected of being infected, then the Captain, with the Veffel, the Lading, and the Crew, shall keep at Anchor in the Road, till our Council of Commerce, having been informed of it, and of the Country also from whence the Captain comes, can determine whether such Vessel ought to be sent back immediately, or admitted to perform Quarantain; in which last Case the Time of the Quarantain shall be prolonged, as long as the

faid Council shall think necessary.

No Rags or old Cloaths shall be permitted to be imported into the Kingdom on Penalty of being burnt, and the Offenders being punished with Death.

VI. All the Confiscations which shall be made by Virtue of this Edict, shall belong half to us and the Crown, and half to the Officer

what is above, with our own- Hand, and have caused it to be confirmed by our Royal Seal. Done at Stockholm, this 30th of September, Frederick. 1743.
