Rome, Octob. 7.

He Mulcovian Envoye being gone hence without the Popes Letter to the Czar his Master, because he refused to give the faid Letter which was intended to be put into the hands of this Envoye, shall be sent to our Nuncio in Poland, to be by him conveyed by Messenger Express to the Court of Moscowy. His Holine's continues very strong and healthful, to the great joy of the Court, and Particularly, of his Relations. We have many discourses concerning the filling up the vacant places in the Colledge of Cardinals, but as yet they have not been disposed of, his Holiness being resolved to stay till such time as he may be able to gratify several pretenders at once. From Geneua they write, That Signior Duguzze is gone hence for France in quality of Envoye Extraordinary, and we promise our selves, his Negotiation will have the defired effect, in the final composing the differences- with that Crown.

Grate, Octob. 18. The second instant the Emperor arrived here, having been received with all the fo-Icmnity this place was capable of, The 13 the Imperial Bride came to Gratimien, two Leagues from hence; upon notice whereof, the Emperor immediately parted hence to fee her: About three in the afternoon his Imperial Majesty arrived at Gratimien, where, as he lighted out of his Coach, he was met by the young Princels, and the Arch Dutchels Dowager her Mother, the former puring her felf upon her knees from whence the Emperor presently raised her with his hand, and Conducted her, accompanyed with her Mother, to his Apartment; That Evening his Imperial Majesty returned hither again, and the Princess came to Egernberg, three quarters of a Mile from hence; The next Morn-ing all the persons of the greatest Quality, and the States of Spirin, went to salute her Highness, and returned again about noon; After Dinner the Emperor went likewise, being followed by above 60 Coaches, with 6 Horses apiece, and came back hither in the evening. The 15 about two in the afternoon, all the No-bility went to Eggenberg, (their feveral Trains and Equippages having been extraordinary rich and magnificent) to conduct the Imperial Bride hither, where } -they made their Entry again about seven in the evening: In the mean time the Emperor performed his Devotions at the Church of the Fathers of the Society, where he received the Princess, without the Church Gate, the being again on her knees, till his Imperial Majesty took her up; The Emperor preceding a little, and the Dutchess being led by the Prince of Dietrichstein, Great Maller of her Houshold, they entred into the Church, where the Popes Nuncio, affisted by four Bishops, and 14 Abbots in their Pontifical Habits, performed the Ceremony of Marriage; which ended, their Imperial Majesties, attended by this noble Company, went to the Palace, where was prepared a great Feat, for their Imperial Majesties and all the Nobility that were present at this falcinnity.

Franc fort, Sept. 25. Our advices tell us. /That the Imperial Army lies at present near Migence, their General Montecuculi having his Quarters at Michiden that part of the Arthy was to pass the Rhin there, and that the other part of it was marched towards Coblenty likewise to pass the Rhyne near othat places Monsieur de Turenne having drawn his Troops out of Wertheim and the other places in Franconia ois marched towards Ladenburg, belonging to the Elector Pa-latine, and scituate on the Necker, between Heydelberg and Manheim, where it is thought he will pass that River, and so continue his march towards Philipsburg. to joyn the Marquis de Vanbrun, who expects him there with a confiderable reinforcement. The French having quitted Aschaffenburg, it is faid, General Montecuculi will put a Garrison into it; In the mean time we talk varioully concerning the intentions of the Imperial Army, though most conclude, that they will march down the Rhyne to joyn with the Dutch and Spanish Troops, Commanded by the Prince of Orange.

Cologue, Off. 28 Lastnight the Spanish and Dutch Troops, under the Command of the Prince of Ocauge, came and encamped within two Leagues of this City, his Highness having his Quarters in a Monastery of Benedictins at Brewelers, who were obliged to redeem the quartering of Soldiens upon their Lands, with 3000 Rixdollurs; in the night his Highness had a loss by a Barntaking fire in his Quarters, wherein were burnt 15 of his best Horses, with all the furniture belonging to them. The Imperialities are coming down, with intentions, as is said, to Attack Treve.; and the French Army, under the Command of Monsieur de Tu-

renne, is marched towards Philipsbourg.

Ditto, Od. 31. Our last Letters from the Imperial Camp tell us, That General Montecuculi had caused two Bridges to be laid over the Rhyne, the one at Openheim, and the other at Miyence for the passing his Troops there; which would take up feveral days, because of the great nu ber of Waggons that attend the Army; and that Monsieur de Turenne has taken his way towards Philipsburg: The Army Commanded by the Prince of Or nge, continues still encamped within two Leagues of this City, being distributed in seven Villages, where they are lodged, 10, 12 and 14 in a House; the whole Army is in a bad condition, and particularly the Cavalry, who are very ill mounted, and befides, very much haraffed by their march, having had very bad weather; the account we have here of their strength, is, that they make up abou 11000 Horse, and about 74000 Foot; and that they have with them fix finall Field-pieces and one Mortar-piece. It is reported that they have some intention to Attack Bon, bur that place has so good a Garrison in it, and is so well fortified, that we believe they will not venture to attempt it. We have nothing new to tell you concerning the Treaty here; things continuing in cle same posture we acquainted you in our last. Monsieur Odyke, and the Heer Van Bevenning, are returning home, as they

fay, to look after their private concerns.

1 isga, Navember 3. The 31 past, the Mareshal d'Humieres arrived at Maestriche, with nine thouland Men, under his Command; That day he dived.

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
