whil the Count d' Estrades, Governor of that place, and this day they match again, taking their way towards Nuis.

Amfterdam, Novemb. 3). The Ships expected from the Sound are now arrived in the Texel, having received much damage by the late bad weather. It is reported here, that the Marelchal d' Humieres, now Go-vernor of Lifle, is to come to Hirecht to fucceed the Duke of Luxemburg, who is to go and Command the Kings Troops in Catalonia, From Liege we have advice, that 10000 French were come into that Countrey, The Van of them being arrived at Tongrey; That they were to be tollowed by other Troops tent by the Duke of Luxanburg, and that their intention was faid to be, to observe the motions of the Prince of Grange.

Hague, Noverb. 1. Here hath been Published a Placaet by the States of Hilland and West-Friefland, for the raising again the 200 Penny, which the better to encourage the peopleto da, they tell them in the Preface of the Placaet, 'That the Enemies of this State, continue fill their seful tions y utterly to deftroy it, and bring the Inhabitants into Slavery; propoling in the mean time at the Congress at Cologne, fuch exceffive and intolerable Conditions , that they, the States, cannot confere zo them, without giving up these Countries, as a Prey to be devoured by their Enemies, Ore. the contrary of which, is fo notorioully known, that those who have the least knowledge of what paffes, begin to be fensible of it; and at Cologne the Mediators have declared the Propositions of the two Kings to be very just and moderate, and easily to be acrepted by these States, in case they defired a Peace. We are told of a I rumpeier that hath been fent into England, with Letters to His MajeflyL

Hagne, Nov. 4. The first instant arrived here the Raedi Pentionary of Zcaland, being fent by the States of that Province about affairs relating to the prefent Conjuncture. From Utrecht we have advices that the Duke of Luxemberg was returned thither from Nimmegen, having Commanded the Cavalry he had there to go and joyn the Prince of Conde in Flanders. The last advices from Cologne cold us, that the Prince of Orange was with his Army at Breuil, and that 6000 of the Imperialists, which General Montecuculi had Commanded out of the Army, were come within two Leagues of Bon, in order to their joyning with the Fortes Comman led by his Highness. Here is a Placaet coming out against the importation of French Brandywines, and French Manufactures.

Othent, Off. 31. There has not as yet paffed any confiderable action between us and the French, onely they draw feveral fmall Bodies rogether on both fides, to fettle their Contributions. Great feverity is used over all thefe Countreys against the French, they having been forced to leave the places where they have refided fome upwards of 40 yearss, and had bought their Free-dom, and all their Goods and Eftates consistated. The Prince of Orange is now with his Army in the Electorate of Cologne, where, it is faid, he expects the coming down of the Imperialists to joyn with them. The Zealanders being very backward in the bringing up the Taxes imposed upon them, the Prince of Orange has caufed a Placaet to be published there, in which he tells the Inhabitants, that in cafe they be not more ready for thefuture, in paying in their Moneys, he will fend a Body of 7 or 8000 Men among them, to oblige them to it. From Amsterdam they write, that the Common People mightily complain of the heavy Taxes that are Jaid upon them, though to little purpose, the States having now again ordered the 200 penny to be forthwith raifed; That they have put a very confiderable Garrison into Naerden, and that Count Horn had

placed himfelf with a fmall Body of Men between Weerden and Hircht to hinder the French communication.

Ditio Novemb ... Our Governor the Count de Monterey has iffued out a Placaet for the recalling all the King of Spains Subjects out of the French Territories ; and has forbidden the Subjects of these Countreys to contract with the French for their Contributions for any longer time then three months. Our Letters from the Rhyne tell us, That part of the Prince of Oranges-Army had paffed that River at Cologne, that they had. belieged Breuil, about two Leagues from Cologne, and that it was believed they would beliege Bon, after having joyned with the Imperialists, who are come to Coblents, and flill continue thence their march down the Khyne.

Bruffets, Noucmb. 4. All the French that Inhabid ted here, have according to his Excellencies Placaet left this place. The Prince of Gonde having Matched from Tournay with 6000 Horfe, and fome Infantry, and passed Laufes Choures, Lens, Houre, and St. Denis, on his way to Chanler of hath been furced by reafon of tome indilpolition, to return to Tournay, leaving those boices, under the Command of the Marefhal d'Humieres. Our Troops having ferled the Contributionson the Frontiers, are returned again to the feveral pla-i ces from whence they wen out. It is faid here, that the Prince of Orange is with his Forces at Breuil, not far from Cologne, and that the Imperialistate coming down, in order to their joyning with them. The French came three or four days fince with a party of Hotfe to the very Walls of Mons, and having burne and plundered two or three Villages, in requital to what we had done before, returned again.

London, Ocieb. 29. This day according to the ufurl Cuftom, Sir W. Hooker Knight, Lord Mayor Elect, accompanyed with the Aldermen and Sheriffs of the City, attended by the Master, Wardens, and Liveries of the feveral Companies, went in their respective Barges to Westminster, and having there taken the accustomed Oath returned again to Pauls Wharf, and from thence passed to Guildhall, with the ufual Solemnity : Their Majeflies accompanyed with his Royal Highness, his Highness Prince Rupert, and attended by many of the Principal Nobility, and other perfons of Quality, having been pleafed, according to the humble Invitation of the City, to Honor them with their Prefence, first at the Show in Cheapfide, and afterwards at the Guildball at Dinner, where the Entertainment was very Great and Magnificent in all kinds.
