mighty who watch'd over you in the Day of Battle, beg Leave to congratulate you on your Return to these your Dominions.

Your Majesty's unwearied Labours for the Honour and true Interest of these Kingdoms, in supporting the House of Austria, and preserving a just Balance of Power, warm us with the highest Sentiments of Gratitude and Affection; and when we behold your Majesty's Arms crown'd with Victory and Glory, we look up with Duty and Veneration to the Guardian and Deliverer of Europe.

The Increase of your Royal Family by the Birth of a Prince, and the Strengthening the Protestant Religion by the Marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa with the Prince Royal of Denmark, are Events full of Joy and Blessings to us and our Posterity.

In Testimony whereof, we have hereto affix'd our Common Seal, at a Common Council held in the Guildhall of our City, the Three and Twentieth Day of December, in the Seventeenth Year of your Majesty's most happy Reign.

*Vienna, Jan. 11.* On the 7th, at Six<sup>1</sup> in the Evening, the Marriage of Prince Charles with the Arch-Dutchess Marianne was celebrated in the Augustine Church adjoining to the Court. The Prince clothed in a kind of Spanish Dress, with a Mantle all of Cloth of Silver, and accompanied by all the Knights of the Golden Fleece, and Ministers of State, with a large Number of Chamberlains, and others of the Nobility, walk'd in Procession to the Church. Next followed the Great Duke in a Dress of Cloth of Gold, and then the Queen, leading the Arch-dutchess. In this Manner they proceeded to Church thro' an incredible Croud of People, and after the Ceremony, which lasted about half an Hour, returned in the same Order. The next Day there was a very grand Opera at Court in the old Imperial Taste, and Yesterday a Ball. On Sunday next there is to be a Masquerade in the Riding-house, which is to be illuminated with 6000 Wax Lights. On this Occasion Sixteen Knights of the Order of the Golden Fleece were created. The Prince and his Consort are to set out, it is said, the 24th of February for Brussels. The Recruits go on extremely well in Bohemia and Moravia. In these two Countries they are forming a Militia of 24,000 Men to be furnished by the Nobility; and, it is said, that the like Establishment will be made for the present in Hungary, viz. 40,000 Men to be held in Readiness, and 10,000 to be immediately formed. General-Post-Office, London, January 12, 1743.

Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the North Mail from Huntington to Stilton, was Yesterday, the 11th Instant, about Six in the Evening, attacked on the Highway at a Place called Stangate Hole, by a single Highwayman, who presented a Pistol to the Post-Boy's Breast, and carried off the following Bags, viz: Durham, Hull, Boston, Falkingham, Lincoln, Horncastle, Louth, Spalding, Stamford, Bourn, and Peterborough.

The Person who committed this Robbery is a lusty Man, and had on a large dark Frock over his Coat, his Face was covered with Black, and he rode on a dark Sorrel Horse with a White Face, and made off for the Biggleswade Road.

This therefore is to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make a Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
